Savings Bonds Sales Total Is \$44,578 in May

Sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds are at an all-time high, according to Guy Peyton Parker, Chairman of the Eastand County Savings Bond sales mittee. Savings Bond saes during the month of May in Eastland County totalled \$44,-578. For the first five months of 1967 sales in this county amounted to \$104,336 which is 28 per cent of the yearly goal

of \$370,000. Total graphases of Series E and H Bonds in Texas for the month of May totaled \$14,-036,665 - 9.7 per cent increase over May of 1966.

Nationally, during May new purchases of E and H Savings Bonds amounted to \$438 million — a 22 year peak — and an increase over May 1966 of

CLASSIC BARBWIRE DISPLAY IS FIRST PERMANENT ITE HISTORICAL COLLECTION

Mr. Berry Greenwood who lives nine miles south of Carbon has the first barbed wire collection for the Eastland County Historical Museum. Mr. Greenwood said he started his collection in November of 1966 but did not really get started until after the first of the year.

This reporter asked Mr. Greenwood about himself. He said, "Nothing of the ordinary." He said his grandfather settled the homeplace where he now lives in 1883. Mr. Greenwood now lives on the adjoining place.

He said he attended an antique convention in Brownwood to help get the idea going. He said people have donated various types of wire to get the display started. Mrs. Charles Morgan of De Leon was given credit for donation of the wire and labeling the wire that is now on display at the Eastland National Bank and will be on display in all county banks and the County Courthouse. A booklet, written by J.

Jenkins, was given to the Historical Committee that has several pictures and illustra-

Fifty-six pieces of wire are on display at the bank. Mr. Greenwood said, "If there had been room for more, the collection would have been larger." He has started another display that will be made in the out-line of the map of Texas

The standard length of the species of wire is 18 inches. He has over sixty pieces of wire to put on this collection. Mr. Greenwood said he hoped to have Mrs. Morgan assist him in labeling the wire.

Some of the wire dates back to about 1869. The collectors have payed as high as \$31 for the wire, an 18 inch piece, being bought by a collector in Kansas. There is still some of the wire being used in East-

land County. This being the first piece for the museum, the committee is looking forward to other items



Jordan Reunion Is 1st in 15 Years


