### Savings Bonds Sales Total Is \$44,578 in May

Sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds are at an all-time high, according to Guy Peyton Parker, Chairman of the Eastland County Savings Bond sales committee. Savings Bond sales during the month of May in Eastland County totalled \$44,578. For the first five months of 1967, sales in this county amounted to \$104,336 which is 28 per cent of the yearly goal of \$370,000.

Total phases of Series E and H Bonds in Texas for the month of May totalled \$14,036,065 — 9.7 per cent increase over May of 1966.

Nationally, during May new purchases of E and H Savings Bonds amounted to \$438 million — a 22 year peak — and an increase over May 1966 of 6 per cent.

### CLASSIC BARBWIRE DISPLAY IS FIRST PERMANENT ITEM IN HISTORICAL COLLECTION

Mr. Berry Greenwood who lives nine miles south of Carbon has the first barbed wire collection for the Eastland County Historical Museum. Mr. Greenwood said he started his collection in November of 1966 but did not really get started until after the first of the year.

This reporter asked Mr. Greenwood about himself. He said, "Nothing of the ordinary." He said his grandfather settled the homestead where he now lives in 1883. Mr. Greenwood now lives on the adjoining place.

He said he attended an antique convention in Brownwood to help get the idea going. He said people have donated various types of wire to get the display started. Mrs. Charles Morgan of De Leon was given credit for donation of the wire and labeling the wire that is now on display at the Eastland National Bank and will be on display in all county banks and the County Courthouse.

A booklet, written by J.

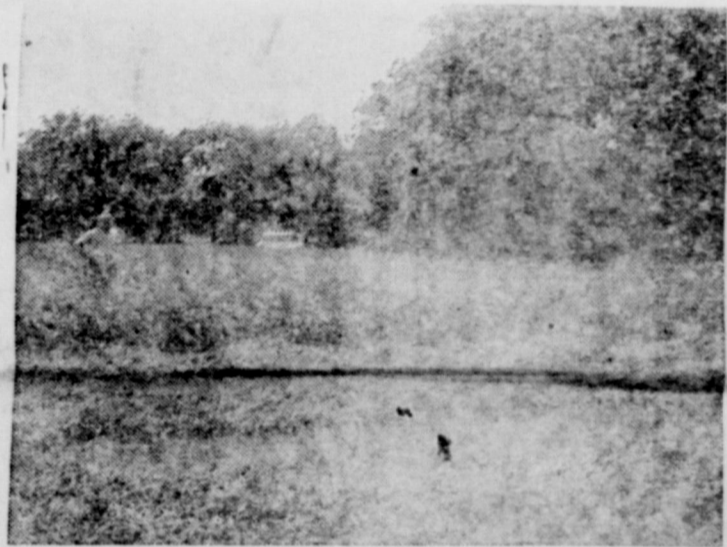
Jenkins, was given to the Historical Committee that has several pictures and illustrations of wire.

Fifty-six pieces of wire are on display at the bank. Mr. Greenwood said, "If there had been room for more, the collection would have been larger." He has started another display that will be made in the out-line of the map of Texas.

The standard length of the species of wire is 18 inches. He has over sixty pieces of wire to put on this collection. Mr. Greenwood said he hoped to have Mrs. Morgan assist him in labeling the wire.

Some of the wire dates back to about 1869. The collectors have paid as high as \$31 for the wire, an 18 inch piece, being bought by a collector in Kansas. There is still some of the wire being used in Eastland County.

This being the first piece for the museum, the committee is looking forward to other items given to the museum.

### County Oks FM Road North From Eastland

Monday the County Commissioners signed an agreement with the State to provide right of way for a farm-to-market paved road beginning at the intersection of Highway 80 and College in Eastland and running in a north-westerly direction for two miles. (Hollywood-Vassarrette is located on College St. in Eastland.)

Plans call for the road to continue to an intersection Highway 163 in the future.

County Judge Scott Bailey announced that the preliminary survey has not yet been

completed and that actual construction will begin in the spring of 1968.

Judge Bailey said, "Part of the land involved is within the city limits of Eastland and the city will bear responsibility for obtaining right of way on that portion of land. The county will provide the other right of way and the state will construct the road."

R. P. (Buddy) Haun, resi-

dent engineer and Jack Kirby of Brownwood, superintendent right of way engineer, of the State Highway Department, met with the commissioners court.

Commissioners Buck Collins, Dick Foster, C. B. Dill, and Danny Woods, and Judge Bailey also met Tuesday and Wednesday for the yearly Board of Equalization considerations. About 40 county property owners met to hear their tax valuations discussed. Judge Bailey stated that those who received notice to appear and failed to meet with the commissioners forfeited their right to appeal.

## HOMEMAKERS HINTS

Many high school graduates will begin to start thinking about their college wardrobe. Although tuition and living costs have increased this year at many colleges, much of the total college expense can be

According to the Extension Service clothing specialist, found in a girl's closet, wardrobe costs for women were estimated by a survey to range from \$200 to \$500. Incoming freshmen generally bought more than the returning upperclassmen.

Most of the freshmen shopped at home, using the family charge accounts, and left fill-ins to be purchased in local college shops. Upper class women tended to wait until their return to campus because they were familiar with the local stores.

The survey further revealed that the longer a woman is in college, the less she buys. As she approaches graduation, wardrobe content decreases

and types of garments tend to be less campus-oriented in favor of clothing which can be used for a job.

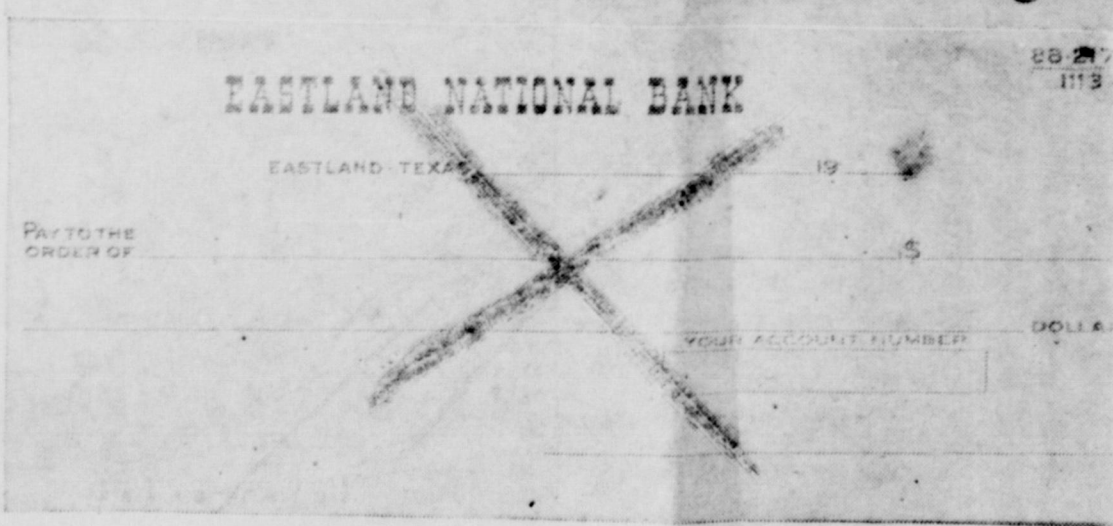
