GERMANY TOLD TO APPLY TO MARSHAL FOCH FOR ALLIED TERMS OF ARMISTICE

GERMAN PEACE DELEGATES TO MEET MARSHAL FOCH AT 5 P. M. THURSDA

ceived over the wire in Spur Thursday terms offered by Foch and the allies, and in their falling bury under their afternoon announces that a German she can hold out against the armies ruins the power of monarchy which shal Foch's headquarters at 5 o'clock times over. p. m. Washington time, to discuss the armistice terms with him.

The supreme war council has been in session several days at Versailles, and on November 5th announced that the armistice terms to be offered Germany had been agreed upon unanihously and signed by the representatives of the allied governments.

The terms announced were "Surrenler and immediate end of the war, dictation of the victors."

The full text of the armistice terms have not been made public, but the allies have decided that Germany must ply to Marshal Foch, the allied comoder-in-chief of the armies, for the rmistice terms.

Austria-Hungary has accepted the peace terms offeerd by the allies and hostilities have ceased on all Austro-Hungarian fronts, retaining only sufficient forces to maintain order within their own borders, all invaded territory since the beginning of the war having been evacuated. The terms giving the allies the right to use all railways, etc in prosecuting the war against Germany.

There is little doubt but that Germany will accept the terms of the armistice offered by Foch, since her strongest ally is now out of the fight.

The European war is now practically ended. Even should Germany re-


