vey Committee will dedicate the marker, Pioneer Physiclan, at the grave of the late Dr. J. D. Windham in the Tecumseh Cemetery, 20 miles south of Clyde, on Sunday, May 23, at 3 p. m., according to an announcement here. Dr. Windham was born on

Feb. 13, 1816, and died January 11, 1901. He was the first practicing physician in Brown County in 1865. He moved west to Callahan County in 1874 and established a truly needed outpost at Tecumseh. He owned a general store and the only post office for miles around.



Be Careful When You Spray For Bugs, Insects Are the bugs eating up your

garden?

Most insects can be knocked out with sprays, powders and other poisons, but the unwary gardener sometimes can suffer from the effects of bug sprays too.

Some tips on use of insecticidescides are offered in Today's Health, the magazine of the American Medical Association.

Read the directions on the container carefully and follow them. The manufacturer spells out the proper usage and safety precautions.

If the directions call for rubber gloves, protective clothing or goggles, leave this alone, unless you are an expert.

Store the insecticide in its original container, with original label, in a safe, locked compartment, away from children and pets.

Destroy empty container s immediately.

Apply downwind, to avoid inhaling sprays and dusts. Stay out of freshly sprayed areas.

Do not smoke while spray-ing or dusting. Some of the chemicals are flammable.

If chemicals are spilled on skin, wash immedately and thoroughly.

Cover bird baths, dog dishes and fish pools before spraying. Pour left over spray down a drain or into the soil. Don't leave it around in pans or pails.





Form ASCS 406 Has Been Mailed **To All County Wheat Producers**

Form ASCS 406 has been mailed to all wheat producers who did not sign up to participate in the 1967 wheat program, according to Jesse G. Meredith, office manager of Eastland County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

The ASCS office needs to know the wheat acreage on farms for the purpose of establishing future wheat allotments, Mr. Meredith said. Failing to furnish this information will result in a reduction in future wheat allot ments, he added.

Producers who have signed to divert acreage under the feed grain or cotton program are reminded that no crop can be harvested and no grazing is permitted between April 30 and Nov. 1, according to the ASCS office.

Failure to divert intended acreage or stay within permitted acreage will cause a drastic reduction in payments. In order to be eligible for price support pay ments on cotton and feed grain on permitted acreage the crop must be planted and worked in a workmanlike manner, Mr. Meredith said.

He added that since planting time for peanuts is almost here, every farmer should check carefully the 1967 allotment notice to pre-

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vent over-planting. In many cases it will be smaller than for 1966 due to the limited acreage under the release and reapportionment provision.

June 23 is the final date set to aerial spray mesquite, Mr. Meredith stated. Funds are currently available for costshare on this practice, he added.


