

MACHINERY HAS ARRIVED FOR ANOTHER TEST WELL FOR OIL

The Spur Oil Company has received its machinery for the second test well for oil and will begin drilling immediately, since the derrick is already up on the Albin place ten miles west of Spur, and the machinery is now being placed for activities.

The Davis well is now about 500 feet, having just gone through 7 feet of sand in which was an oil showing.

SURROUNDING COUNTIES HAVE WEIGHED MANY BALES COTTON

Up to this week the cotton yard at Jayton has weighed seven thousand bales of cotton, and the Girard yard has weighed four thousand bales of cotton in Kent county. Approximately half of this cotton is now on the yards at Girard and Jayton, awaiting the lifting of the shipping embargo.

Earlier in the year it was thought that if Kent county had as much as five thousand bales during the year it would be a good crop. Already eleven thousand bales have been weighed and there remains many more bales yet to weigh, some of which is still unpicked in the fields while many bales are being stored by farmers at their homes, awaiting both the lifting of the embargo and higher prices.

20,000 BALES COTTON EXPECTED FROM THE 1919 CROP YEAR

The gins of Spur have ginned up to date a total of 10,802 bales of cotton. The Afton gin has ginned 1,500 bales; and the Dickens and McAdoo gins more than 2,000 bales. There are hundreds of bales yet to pick in the fields. It is estimated that 20,000 bales will be produced in Dickens county, of the 1919 crop, much of which has been ginned and marketed outside of the county.

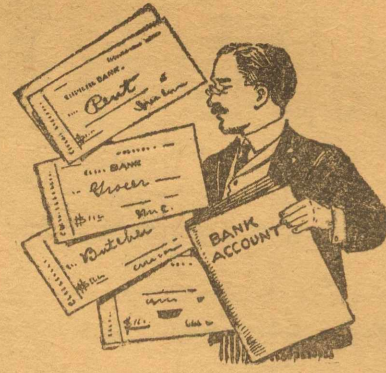

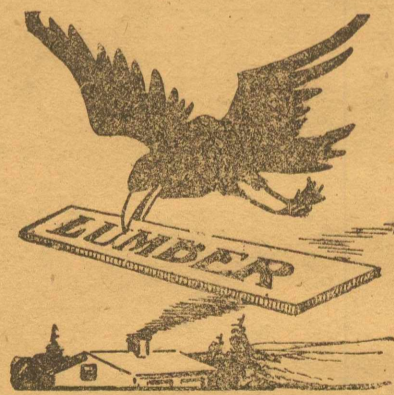

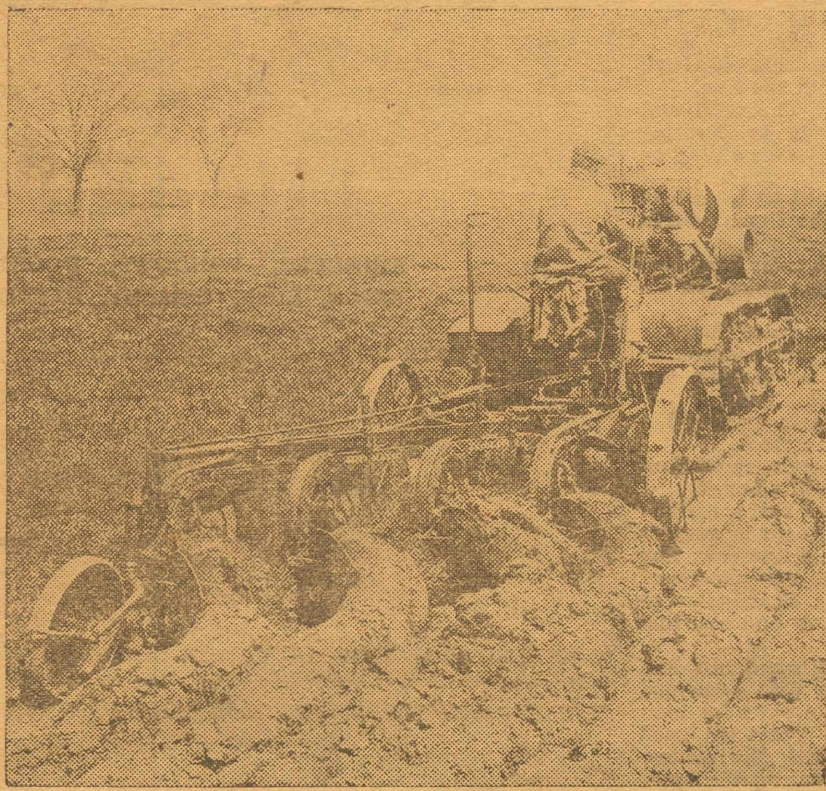
