#### HAIL STORM SWEEPS COUNTRY DEVASTATING A BIG AREA

A hail storm swept this section of country Friday night of last week, completely wiping out hundreds of acres of growing crops and damaging hundreds of other acres of crops. It was one of the greatest calamities to befall this territory within the history of farming.

The devastated area covers a territory approximately eight miles wide by fifteen miles long, beginning ten miles west of Spur and extending six or seven miles to the east, three miles north of Spur and five miles south.

C. D. Copeland is probably the biggest loser in the country, he having eight hundred acres completely destroyed, with not a dollar insurance. Saturday his neighbors and friends came to his assistance and throughout Saturday, Monday and Tuesday twenty seven planters were putting new seed in the ground.

Throughout the week in every part of this hail district farmers have been running verters, and by the end of the week every acre destroyed will robably be replanted.

This was a real calamity, the total loss of the country being inestimable, but there are but few long faces, the big majority taking it philosophically and every individual exerting himself. to relieve the situation by getting seed into the ground and crops growing again, and with the fine season now in the ground and with continued favorable conditions it is predicted that from a half to three fourths of a bale of cotton may be produced within the devastated area.

#### NATIONAL DEMOCRATIC CON-VENTION MEETS MONDAY

State delegates are now going to San Francisco, California, for the national democratic convention which convenes Monday.

The democrats are pretty much like the republicans were at their convention—leaderless, and seem to be shy in talking until the real leaders show their hands and indicate which way the wind blows—fearing possibly that any premature statements made may not conform to the ideas and intents of the powers that be. One or two have ventured the assertion that the high cost of living and profiteering is more entitled to become a paramount issue than that of the league of nations, stating that the league proposition should be settled immediately in accord with a majority opinion of the senate and house rather than that of the president alone.

Wilson and Bryan are looked upon as the two main leaders, and the question in the minds of delegates and the public is whether Bryan can carry out his ideas above those of the pres-

McAdoo has announced that he will not accept the nomination for president, and it is unknown whether Wilson will attempt to secure the nomination for the third term. Cox, of Ohio, now seems to be the leading candidate for the nomination, with some talk of Bryan as a possible nominee. Personally ,we would like to see Bryan president one term, because we believe that he is the cleanest and straightest man in high politics today, but since he will not cater to the interists he makes himself impossible as a nominee.

The country will anxiously await the selection of a presidential democratic nominee as the running mate of Governor Harding as the republiian nominee.

Two new vegetables have been propagated at the Missouri botanical garden at St. Louis, it was announced by Dr. George T. Moore, director of the

One has been named the "arracacha" and the other the "dasheen." Both resemble the potato and are said to be about equal in food value to it.

Doctor Moore explained the arracacha, when cooked, is a bit darker than the sweet potato and tastes like the parsnip. It is a rapid grower, he said.

Dasheens, cooked in cream, taste like cauliflower, and when baked have the flavor of a roasted chestnut. Doctor Moore amplified. They are related to the Egyptian taro, commonly refer-red to as the "elephant ear," Doctor Moore said.

The announcement was made to delegates who attended the convention of the American Association for the Adwancement of Science, which ended recently.



ZENS WRITE FRIENDS To the Texas Spur and its many readers: I will tell some of my experiences

in the oil fields; I have had the good and the bad. I commenced working the first of last September for Sinclare Company at Caddo, Texas, and worked for them sixty days. I had five teams and cleared some good money. On the 10th of November I moved to Brecknridge and went to work for the County and worked till the 15th of March. I started with five teams and quit with ten teams and several thousand dollars ahead. 1 commenced work for the Texas Company on the 191! of May with a prinise of a year's work at \$11.00 a day

We are all in good health. I am in better health than I have been in since I was fifteen years old.

Now I will tell you some of our bad luck. I lost my big gray horse on the 20th of February and that just left me with three big horses, so I put a mule with the horses and was very fond of my team. My 11 year old daughter was staying in camp and doing my cooking and came out on the works at five o'clock and drove the plow team in to the camp where there was a large tank. She was afraid to drive the horses into the water, so I hung the lines on the hames and let them go in to drink, which I had done very often, but they had become very fond of wading water, and made a rush for the center of the tank where the water was twenty feet deep and they were drowned in two minutes. I tried to go to them and came near drowning myself. I will advise any one to never turn a team loose in water if they are fond of wading. My team came to the top in one hour, and it was a sad sight to see. I think a horse is next thing to human.

I will close by wishing the Texas Spur and my friends of Dickens county good health and prosperity.

I hope to visit you people some day.
