TO BUILD RAILROAD FROM FT. WORTH TO PLAINS

Application to the Interstate Commerce Commission and the Texas Railroad Commission for a certificate of public necessity, a requisite permit of construction, for a railroad from Fort Worth into the Plains section of Northwest Texas, will be made early next month by business men of this city through the Chamber of Commerce.

The request will be filed by W. M. Massie, president that body, immediately following the proposed meeting in West Texas of representatives of all cities interested. This meeting will be held soon after the first of the year.

No decision has been reached yet as to where the meeting will be held, but it is considered likely that the gathering will assemble at Lubbock, Plainview or Crosbyton.

It had been planned to hold the meeting during the West Texas Chamber of Commerce convention in Plainview, but, since that has been postponed until April to permit com-

pletion of an auditorium, the railroad meeting will be a separate affair.

Application for the permit to build will be made before any attempt is made to finance, the proposed railroad, Massie said, and all that is needed for this is the assurance that West Texas cities and counties are willing to co-operate to the full extent in bringing about actual construction.

Several tentative routes have been proposed for the contemplated rail line, but the one meeting most favor perhaps, is the one north-west from Fort Worth through Azle, Springtown and Jacksboro, thence via a completed line between Perrin and Seymour, through Benjamin, Knox County; Guthrie, King County, and on north to a point east of a terminal midway between Crosbyton and Plainview.

From this point the line might branch, one line going to a station between Crosbyton and Lubbock and the other to Plainview.

Other routes contemplate an almost directly western line from Graham across the Plains through Borden, Scurry and Fisher Counties.

However, no route has been selected nor will be until all of West Texas has spoken through representatives at the proposed meeting in January.—Star-Telegram.

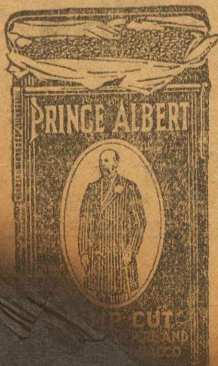

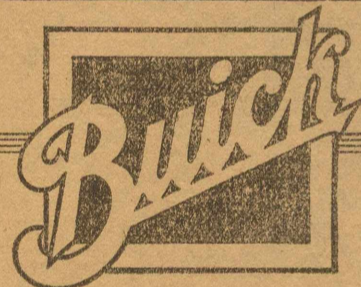

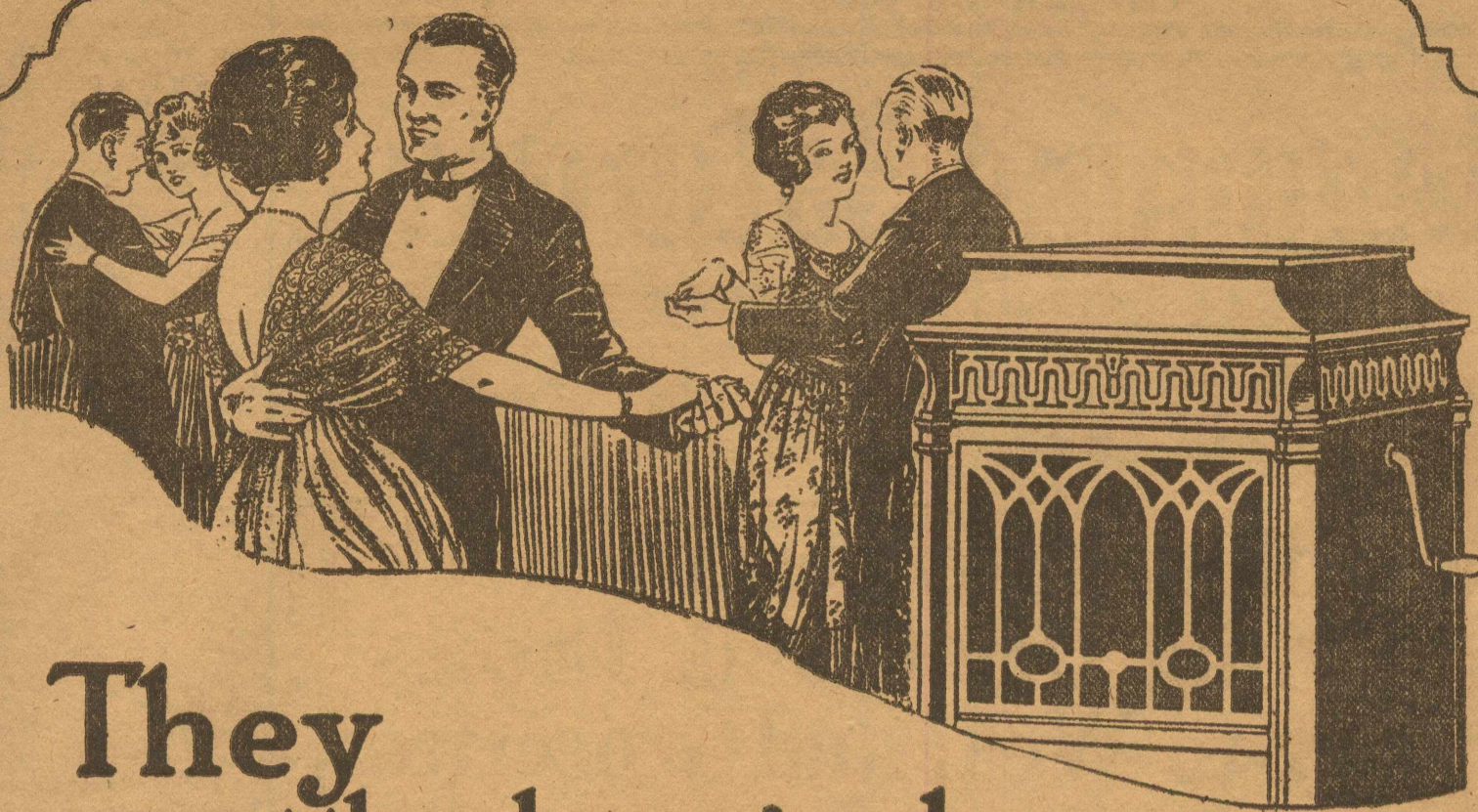

**Trade in Spur—
BUSINESS GROWING STEADILY
BETTER SURVEY INDICATES**

WASHINGTON, Dec., 7.—Continued improvement in business conditions in October reflected notably in increased output of iron and steel and textile products and also a widespread stimulation in building and its related industries, was reported by the department of commerce today in its "survey of current business." While prices continued to decline slightly during October, the survey showed, the relative stability of prices as compared with preceding months and the improved banking situation as evidenced by smaller loans and lower interest rates were cited as conditions favorable to continued business improvement. With the exception of metals, the quantitative production in the important industries was shown by the survey to be equal or greater than before the war average of 1913, many lines, including pig iron and cotton and tobacco manufactures, showing an increase of about one-third over the minimum production for the current year. An increase of 70 per cent over minimum was reported in the production of bituminous coal, while the output of wheat flour, cement and wool products was shown to have been approximately double the minimum figures.—Star-Telegram

This institution now has two hundred and fifty nine children in it and the present property value is in round numbers \$300,000.00, but it is hoped that the capacity of the institution can be increased within the next five years to accommodate not less than six hundred children. The present Campaign is the first definite step toward accomplishing this end.

COTTON MARKET LETTER

The market declined today, owing to the Government estimate of the total crop of 8,340,000 bales. This was larger than expected, BUT the Government also gives a total production of 3,939,403,000 pounds, which in 500 pound bales is equivalent to 7,978,800 bales of cottons. We firmly believe the latter figures to be much more sensible therefore, look for an improvement in the market later.

We are advised that the Railroads have voluntarily agreed to a 10 per cent reduction in the rates on cottons and other commodities, to become effective January 1, 1922.
