### RAINS CONTINUE AND THE COUNTRY WET TO THE BOTTOM

It rained again Sunday and Monday and showered Tuesday and Wednesday, the total rainfall amounting to more than 2 inches over the whole country. In some sections the rainfall was much heavier. At McAdoo a water-spout is reported, and it is estimated that as much as fifteen or twenty inches of rain fell Sunday and Monday.

During the month of April and to the present time in May more than seven inches of rain has been registered by gauges in Spur and at the Experiment Station. The fact is that the entire country is now wet to the bottom and promises to produce the biggest crops in the history of farming. Practically every farmer had his land prepared and in good shape for planting, and now with a few days of sunshine, seed for the varied crops will be put in the ground.

At no time and in no country has better and more promising prospects for bumper crops prevailed than in the Spur country at the present time. We are this year going to make the

biggest crops ever harvested anywhere.

### LARGE COTTON SEED WAREHOUSE TO GO IN AT SPUR

Sam Williams, of Elk City, Oklahoma, and president of the Rule-Jayton Cotton Oil Company, and C. M. Francis, general manager of the same company, spent several days of this week in Spur arranging the details for the construction of a one thousand capacity cotton seed warehouse in Spur.

The warehouse will be built on lots acquired several years ago for that purpose, near the depot and along side of the railway trackage.

In connection with the cotton seed warehouse will also be added a feed store room for the storage of maize and other feeds produced in the surrounding territory.

This cotton seed warehouse will be of great material benefit to the town and country, since in connection with the storage and warehouse facilities, the Rule-Jayton Cotton Oil Company will also establish and maintain a market in Spur for cotton seed and feed stuff.

### TWENTY INCHES OF RAIN FALLS IN McADOO COUNTRY

From Sunday to Monday night fully twenty inches of rain fell at McAdoo on the plains in Dickens county. This is a great volume of water, but the report can be verified. H. C. Eldredge, who is known for truth and veracity as well as good and substantial citizenship, told us that twenty inches of water fell during the time. He, with other members of his family, retired to the storm cellar when the storm clouds came up. After the rain had been falling only a short time the country was completely covered, the storm cellar began to fill with water, and they were forced to seek higher ground. Upon coming out of the cellar they had to wade water two or more feet deep. He was in Spur Thursday and stated that water was still running six inches to a foot deep in his field at McAdoo.

The rainfall was measured up to nine inches, but for lack of deeper vessels an accurate record could not be had.

Canadian, Texas, April 27.—"I am surprised at the prosperous-looking country over which I have gone on my trip to West Texas and the Panhandle," declared Governor Neff today. "I did not realize that there were such vast fields of production in this part of Texas. The miles of fields in cultivation, the sections dotted with hogs and cattle and the beautiful scenery of this part of the state is a revelation." Neff predicted a great future for Western Texas and the Panhandle.

### J. C. STEPHENS SHOT AND KILLED MONDAY AT ABILENE

Friends and acquaintances of J. C. Stephens in the Spur country were shocked to learn of his death Monday at Abilene. He was shot six or seven times by his grandson, Wylie A. Stephens, who is now under \$7,500 bond charged with murder or manslaughter. The remains of J. C. Stephens were brought to Dickens county Wednesday and interred in the Midway cemetery near his old home.

J. C. Stephens was among the old residents of Dickens county, having settled on his farm in the Afton section in 1901. About two years ago he traded for hotel property in Abilene and moved with his family to that place.

From all accounts, whisky brought about the killing. It is said that J. C. Stephens had been drinking considerably. On Sunday before the killing Monday morning, it is said that Mrs. Stephens, wife of Wylie, went to the J. C. Stephens home to call on Grandma Stephens. While there J. C. Stephens, being intoxicated, it is said, asked his granddaughter if she didn't think he was a pretty good man. She replied no, that she did not think he was a good man the way he was doing, whereupon he abused and threatened her with a pistol. The following morning the husband and grandfather met and the killing occurred.

J. C. Stephens was seventy seven years of age, was an ex-Confederate Soldier and was among the early settlers of Western Texas.

The entire country deplors this occurrence, and the members of the Stephens families have the sympathy of friends in their troubles.

## FOOD FOR THOUGHT

### Read It

**DOES DIVERSIFICATION PAY?** If it does not, why do people diversify when in financial distress? If it helps us out of financial troubles, it will help us to stay out.

The best information that we can get indicates that there have been at least 5000 hogs shipped and sold from Dickens county farms during the past twelve months. Figure these hogs at a low average of 150 pounds each at 8 cents per pound and you will begin to realize just what this little side-line has already done for the prosperous farmers of Dickens county and to the country as a whole.

The above figures does not take into consideration several thousand head of hogs that were killed on Dickens county farms for home consumption.

The hog industry, as we view it is only in its infancy, due to the fact that people are just now waking up to the vast importance of some side-lines on the farm and to the fact that alfalfa (the great pork producer) is no longer an experiment. It has been grown successfully the past nine years on the experiment station and the past few years by some of our wide awake and now prosperous farmers.

We have been wonderfully blessed with good rains, so why not take advantage of the opportunity and sow from one to ten acres in alfalfa, thus enabling you to reduce the cost of hog production 50 per cent or more. Then you would get enough hay to feed from one to five dairy cows.

A small patch of alfalfa near the house for the chickens would increase your egg production from 50 to 75 per cent during the winter months.

The baby beef feeding contest that is being carried on by the club boys and girls under the direction of our good friend and county agent, Mr. R. B. Johnston, has thoroughly convinced us that our home grown calves can be very successfully finished on our home grown feed. When you see these calves on the 15th of this month and learn that these boys and girls are making from \$15.00 to \$25.00 clear profit on each calf, we venture the assertion that you will go back home with a full determination to feed a few next winter and spring. At least it going to be an eye opener to most of us. A little extra feed planted now will assist you in out your good determination.

The hen, the sow, the cow, a garden and a few baby beeves for side lines will put Dickens county on the map, and you on the road to prosperity. If you don't believe it try it.

Whereas, The Board of Commissioners of the City of Spur, Texas, have passed the following resolutions, to wit:

Be it Resolved, By the Board of Commissioners of the city of Spur, That

Whereas, on this the 29th day of April, A. D. 1922, the Board of Commissioners of said city by resolution directed the improvements of a portion of Burlington Avenue between Harris Street and Fifth Street, as above described, by constructing sidewalks, curbs, and gutters on the east side of said street in front of the lots and block herein named, And

Whereas, in accordance with said resolution, specifications for the said work were duly prepared by the city engineer and adopted by the Board of Commissioners; And

Whereas there after the bid of Charles Whitener was received and considered by the Board of Commissioners, and the said bid of Charles Whitener for the improvement of said street was accepted by the Board of Commissioners; And

Whereas the said improvement is to consist of improving the said street, within the said limits, by constructing a concrete sidewalk, curb and gutter, in front of the said lots named herein in said block, in accordance with the specifications prepared by the city engineer and on file in the office of the city secretary of the city of Spur, a duplicate thereof being made a part of said contract between the City of Spur and Charles Whitener; And

Whereas, said Charles Whitener has entered into a contract with the city of Spur for the construction of said improvements, which contract has been duly approved by the Board of Commissioners of the city of Spur, as follows, to-wit:

abutting on said street to be improved, and against the property in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 11, Title 22, Texas Revised Civil Statutes of 1911, and the said Board does hereby declare such necessity.

(3) That the portion of the cost of such improvement which may be assessed against such property owners and their property shall be assessed by ordinance of said Board of Commissioners, passed after notice to such owners, and others interested parties, and a hearing to them, and the said amounts when assessed shall constitute a lien against the property of the said owners, and shall be declared to be a personal liability of said owners in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 11, Title 22, Texas Revised Civil Statutes of 1911. That the said assessment against owners of property abutting said street, and their property, shall be made in proportion as the frontage of the property of each on the said street is to the whole frontage to be improved, provided that if it appears that this rule of apportionment is unjust or unequal in any respect then the said Board of Commissioners shall adopt such rule of apportionment as shall be found to be equal, considering the equities of the various property owners, and the benefits of their property, and provided that no assessment against any owner or his property shall be made in excess of the enhanced value of said property by means of said improvement.

**TO THE VOTERS OF DICKENS CO.**

Why I want the county judges office First this is my aim in life. It has been my aim for the last ten years to practice law, as it is your's to be a farmer, doctor, merchant, preacher, school teacher or any other profession of life. I believe that we all have a place to fill and a calling in life and that is the only one that we can fill and do it as we should. And that it takes all that we can do to fill it properly, as it should be. To do this I have spent the last 8 years of my life studying law to be able to do something for my self, as well as others. I went before the Board of Examiners last year at Austin. Take on the examination made all my subjects except two. Will go back and make them this fall.

All lawyers will tell you that the examination is just about ten times as hard to make as it was even ten or twelve years ago. Which I think is is all right. For as Blackstone writes "a little law is poison to any man."

The office of county judge does not require that a man shall have license to practice law. But it does require that he shall be learned in the law.

I am not asking the people to give me the office because I am entitled to it any more than other man or that I am a poor man. But the office belongs to the people. And will have to be filled by some one.

And the people will give me their support. I will feel that my best as a man, and as an officer could only pay. and that justice is done to all parties without favor toward any one or any class.

Now the office of county judge and of school supt. is combined and should be until the county is thicker populated and the people have more money to pay with.

As for my interest in the schools I dont think their is a man in the County that could feel the need of them any more than I do. If I had of even had the same schools that we have now when I was a boy I would not be here asking you people for the office that I am.

If you handy cap the schools, you handy cap civilization and block the current of all progress. And we can handy cap it without any effort on our part just set down and let it alone I have three children and I expect to raise and educate them in Dickens County. I am sure that I want to give them the best the country affords.

To have good schools we must first have good teachers. And then the hearty cooperation of all the parents. And our schools have got to be kept up with progress of time and the need of today no 50 years ago. I say with out fear of contradiction, teachers are the poorest paid of any public servant according to the service that he renders.

We are either building up or on the decline. A man that is not building up for something higher is just about done as far as the country is concerned. A dead fish can float down stream, but it takes a live one to go up. The only thing that we can give our children that the world can't take away from them is an education. If parents could feel the interest in their children that the teachers do, we would have better schools and less gray headed school teachers.

You can find people in all walks and profession of life that have retired from their profession with ample money to sustain them. But I have never seen one teacher do this yet after they have rendered the county their service. And helped thousands of boys, and girls to noble higher life. Our schools are just what we would have them be. The fountain can rise no higher than its

source. The office of superintendent requires the service of the man that fills it. As well as the office of the judge does.

With no more county court business than Dickens County has the man that fills the place should spend half of his time in the interest of the schools any way.

There is one way to have court and is to have the attendance of the witnesses, and the jury and to run the court the way the law intended it should be on no other way.

If the people will favor me with their votes I will not come back to them two years from now with any excuses on my part. And will not blush with shame for failing to do my part as a citizen, or as an officer. And I will not be like the good man that was praying to God to send him a certain blessing that he needed telling him if he would grant it that he never would be guilty of calling on him again.

I don't expect to stop and start at the same place. If I did I could already see my finish.

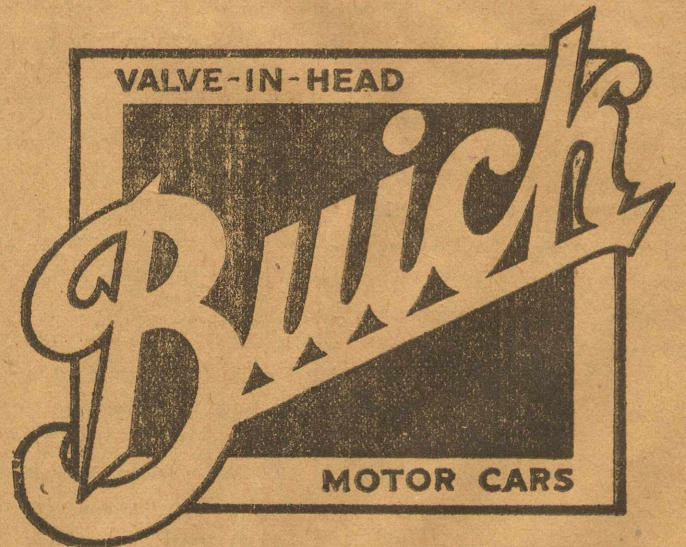

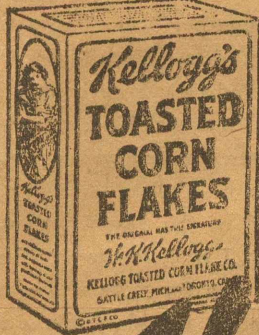

#### CATTLE FEEDING.

From present indications it appears that over 1,000 head of calves will be fed in Dickens County next year. A grain sorghum crop is practically assured. If those contemplating feeding cattle will be sure to grow enough cane to properly feed them for a period of six months the cost of producing the finished animal will be materially lessened.

As a usual thing in this country milo heads sell for less than they are worth and bundle cane for much more than it is worth. A successful feeder should be careful to produce enough roughage to properly finish his.

Feeders should plant two acres of cane for every three calves fed. Under average conditions this will probably give a little surplus cane but it is better to have a little left over for other farm animals than to have to buy from a neighbor.

#### TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN

It appears the impression has gone out that I closed the City Meat Market, A. A. Parnell Prop. and in justice to this market I make the following voluntary statement.

I did not close this market nor order it to be closed, but made some recommendations as to the rearrangement of the slaughter pen furnishing this market as well as other slaughter pens furnishing Spur with meat. So that they would comply with the Rules and Regulations of the Food and Drug Division of the State Board of Health.
