C. J. Fenwick Dies In Gorman

Charles Junior Fenwick, 61, was dead on arrival at 10 a. m. Tuesday at the Gorman Hospital after a heart attack at his home.

Funeral was held Wednesday at 3 p. m. in Higginbotham Funeral Chapel with Rev. Marian Dennis, Congregational Methodist Church Pastor, officiating. Burial was in Howard Cemetery near Desdemona.

He married Ines Raspberry March 29, 1935 who died in 1965 while the couple was living here. He moved to Gorman about one year ago. He was a member of the Congregational Me. Church. Survivors include 7 brothers and 3 sisters.

The Kendrick Amphitheater is located midway between Eastland and Cisco on U. S. Highway 80. Its stage is 325 feet in length and houses 12 separate stages built of crystal white aggregate stone.

Included on the stage is a running River of Jordan, the Sea of Galilee and the Mount Calvary.

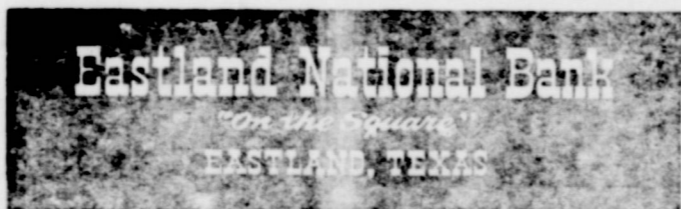

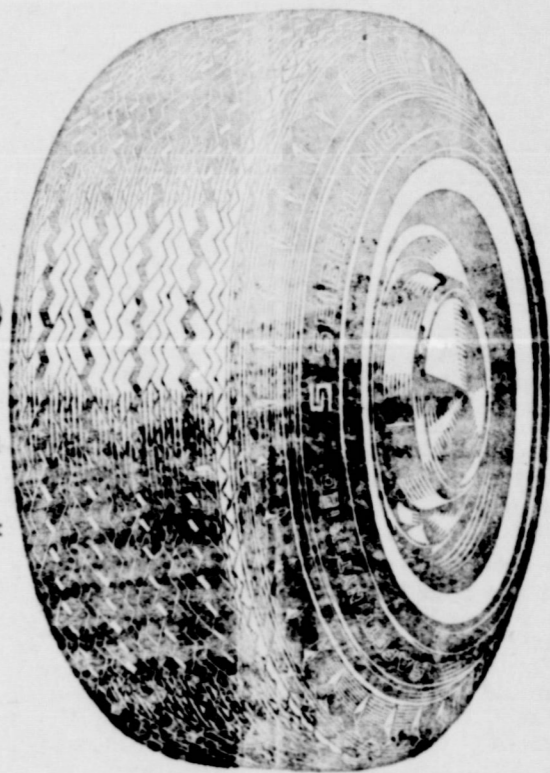

HOMEMAKERS HINTS

Eastland County Home Demonstration Agent

The list of new cordless appliances and gadgets is growing. Here are some points to consider when buying them. Portability is their major asset. Cordless cleaning devices, for example, allow you to maneuver in areas otherwise awkward to reach. And, of course, anything cordless can be used out of doors, miles away from the nearest electrical outlet.

Cordless appliances use power stored in batteries rather than power drawn, via a line cord, from an electrical outlet. Some are run on primary cell batteries that are replaced when they run down; others use rechargeable batteries that can be recharged at minimal cost.

Safety is a major factor when you consider cordless versus plug-in appliances.

The cordless ones are especially safe for two reasons. They require lower voltage, and virtually eliminate electric shock hazard. This means that the appliances are safe to use in traditionally damp areas — even if you're standing in water.

Disadvantages of cordless appliances vary from one item to the next. Generally speaking, the rechargeable batteries have limited power; the appliances they run can be operated only for limited periods. The added weight of the batteries makes a few units uncomfortable to work with. And, not surprisingly, cordless appliances usually cost more than their plug-in equivalents, though the rechargeable ones may actually save you money in the long run because they cost less to operate.

THE GORDON SPOT

March came in with unseasonable warm weather. Most people I have talked with believe this is going to be harmful to our fruit trees. Some people have told me their peach trees are beginning to bloom now. We are very likely to have some freezing weather that would ruin a fruit crop if the trees are in bloom.
On the way to Houston last week I saw several trees that

were in bloom. They have had some rain in that part of the state and their weather is warmer.

Some people have been asking if it is too late to put out young trees. Dr. Fred Brisson, one of the most respected Horticulturist in the State, recently told me March was a good time to put out pecan trees. So if you want to put out more trees this year I would suggest you put them out this month.

Now is an excellent time to look ahead to the Spring months and the time for buying transplants or nursery stock. Later troubles can be

eliminated by purchasing only disease-free, healthy plants.

If possible, root systems should be checked to detect such disease as rots, galls or knots. Avoid buying any plant that does not have a healthy appearing root system.

Stems of plants also merit checking to assure that they are healthy in appearance. Dead areas or cankerous-type lesions often found on stems may later develop and kill the plant. Then too, disease can be carried to healthy plants already growing by planting those with diseases.
