There is a dire possibility that at least two newspapers will fold, meaning that many of Powers' own members, as well as hundreds of other employees, may have no jobs to return to after the strike.

As of February 26, (provided that strike has not been settled meanwhile) the 22,800 employees will have been out of work twelve weeks, for a wage loss in excess of \$30 million. This means that each employee already has lost an average of \$1,-600.
