HOW TO SOLVE A MURDER

Every few days, we hear that an American soldier or two has been killed in the war in South Vietnam.

As you know, our soldiers are there to help defend South Vietnam against the Communist guerrilla attacks from North Vietnam. The fact that the Communists are the aggressors is obvious — and so the deaths of Americans can be correctly labeled as murders.

But how is it that the Communists are able to continually probe into free world defenses? How do they finance their many aggressions — in Laos, Berlin, Korea, etc.? Are there accessories to these murders that we don't know about?

ACCESSORIES IN FACT

Yes, there are. The North Vietnamese aggressors are receiving help in the form of foreign aid from Communist Poland. This aid has been going on for some time now and provides the Communist guerrillas with all of the equipment and facilities necessary to carry on their war against South Vietnam and our American soldiers.

But how can Poland finance such a war? They are a Communist country, too. And all Communist countries have their hands full just feeding their own people. Where do they get the money with which to help North Vietnam slaughter our soldiers?

And here's where the rub comes in. They get it from us. For several years, we have been giving foreign aid outright to Communist Poland. Now the Poles are using that aid to finance a war against us in South Vietnam.

WE FINANCE MURDER

And so we are the accessories to the murders of our own soldiers in South Vietnam. We are financing a war against our own country. We are paying for the assassination of our own sons and brothers. Does this make sense?

If it doesn't make sense to you, then perhaps you should look deeper. Consider the fact that we have virtually armed the Yugoslavian Army and Air Force. Consider too that we sold the Soviets critically-needed machine tools — without even receiving cash for our trouble.

We have allowed the Communist to steal our nuclear secrets. We have sold them wheat at cut-rate prices — shared our agricultural knowhow — and fought their enemy for them in Katanga.

OUR POWER TO STOP IT

There's a simple, powerful way to stop all of this. To force the Communists to live off their own impractical system — and not off the fruits of our abundance — we must stop helping them.

The way to do this is to break off all diplomatic relations, trade and aid with all Communist countries — including the Soviet Union. This will put an end to the folly of financing our own destruction.

In fact, it's obvious that the Communists couldn't last six months if we were to stop doing business with them. For in no time at all, a combination of weakening Communist governments and inspired captive peoples would destroy the Communist empire from within.

Let's quit being accessories to the assassination of America. Let's tell our government to break off all relations with the Communist countries — so that we may soon begin to live in an era of true peace and brotherly love.

Vehicle Inspection Must Be Made By Monday, April 15

Time is running out for those who have yet to get the Official Inspection sticker on the windshield of your vehicles. State law requires that the inspection sticker be on your vehicle windshield by midnight, April 15.

Cornett has not been arrested as yet, but was indicted on the testimony of the other two men. They admitted breaking into the Gardner barn and taking 300 burlap bags, demolishing doors to the house and barn and doing considerable other damage to the premises.

The two Coleman men were arrested a few days later by the Coleman Sheriff's Department.

Also indicted were the three Negro women arrested several weeks ago. They were charged with taking a number of dresses from a Coleman store. These women are also wanted in Ballinger, San Angelo, Fort Stockton and possibly other places.

DRIVER TRAINING COURSE

Plans are being made to again operate the summer course in Driver Education at Santa Anna High School. Students should enroll in the course beginning April 15. The teacher will be Kenneth West, an assistant coach in Coleman High School. The cost of the summer

course will be \$30, which will pay all costs for the instructor, automobile, films and instructional supplies. The automobile used will carry a complete insurance program for the protection of students and parents.

The program is in two parts: classroom instruction and in-car instruction, either as an observer or driver. This provides opportunities for boys and girls to acquire knowledge, established attitudes, develop skills and practice habits that will lead to intelligent traffic behavior. The course is designed to develop self-discipline in driving safely.

Upon satisfactory completion of the minimum program the student is eligible for driver's license benefits and reduced insurance rates of 10% per year until he is 25 years of age.

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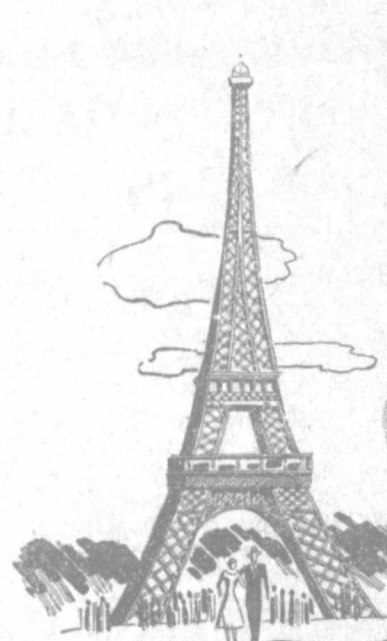

Accent on Health

It is a sad thing to disillusion those who cherish the myth of their "immunity" to poison ivy or oak or sumac, but the season of prevalence of these toxic plants is fast approaching and forewarned is forearmed.

Botanical scientists say it is doubtful that anyone is absolutely immune to their poisonous substance. More and more authorities agree that susceptibility is a mere matter of degree, varying with the condition of the individual, the condition of the plant, and the circumstances of exposure.

Texas has its fair share of the 100-plus plants and plant products known to be capable of causing sometimes severe skin irritations. Among them are the parsnip, lady-slipper, cultivated primrose (especially when in flower), lily bulbs and stalks, stinging nettle, and vanilla beans.

But by far the most common cause of plant dermatitis in Texas and elsewhere in the United States is poison ivy, known to botanists by the tongue twisting name of Rhus toxicodendron. A cousin — poison sumac, by name — is common to the swampy regions of eastern Texas, and can sometimes produce severe reactions.

For all practical purposes, poison ivy and poison oak are the same thing. Poison oak is simply ivy that grows as a bush rather than a vine.

Poison ivy is an unusually inconsistent species of plant. Besides growing as a bush and a vine, the size of its berries and the outline of its leaves often vary widely. Its leaves are characteristically egg-shaped and pointed, but the edges may be smooth and unbroken or saw-toothed. Moreover, these variations might occur on a single plant, or the leaves on an entire plant may be similar.

But in one matter, poison ivy is almost invariably consistent — its leaves practically always grow in clusters of three.

Thus ivy poisoning is best prevented by learning to recognize the plant and avoiding it. And, of course, it is always prudent to wear protective clothing such as leggings and gloves when going into areas where

poison plants are known to flourish. Once exposed, immediate washing with laundry soap and water helps to remove the resin.

As a final word of caution: Never burn poison ivy vines! The smoke can be just as venomous as the leaves.

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Marketing Year For Wool and Mohair Changed

College Station — Texas sheep and goat producers are reminded by Ed Uvacek, extension livestock marketing specialist, that the marketing years for wool and mohair have been changed from an April 1 - March 31 year to a calendar year basis.

In order to make the transition from the April - March base to a calendar year, the 1963 marketing year will consist of only nine months — April through December. The first full calendar marketing year, therefore, will be 1964, explains Uvacek.

These changes are important to sheep and goat producers, says the specialist, since the selling time of their clips and the amount of incentive payments they receive are involved. The incentive payment rate, he explains, is based on the difference between the national average price received by producers and the incentive prices announced by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

The incentive level for wool in the marketing year 1963 — April through December — is 62 cents per pound, while that for mohair has been set at 76 cents per pound, Uvacek says.

Change In Coast Guard Academy Examination

Washington, D. C. — A change in the date of the annual examination for admission to the U. S. Coast Guard Academy, New London, Connecticut, has been announced by the Coast Guard.

Beginning in 1963, the examination will be administered in December of each year. The examination will consist of the December administration of the College Entrance Examination Board tests which will be given this year on 7 December 1963. Applicants living in the United States should apply before 8 November 1963 to take the test, while those living overseas should apply before 4 October 1963 to take the test.

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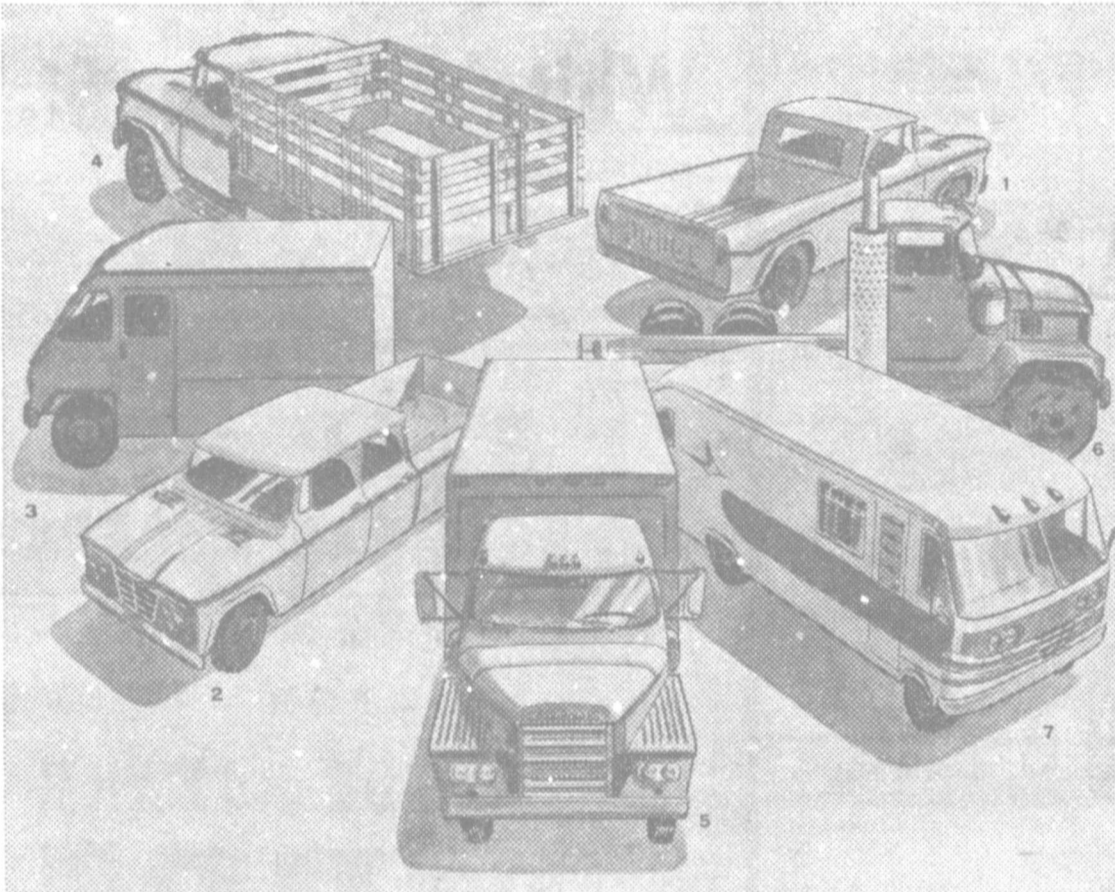

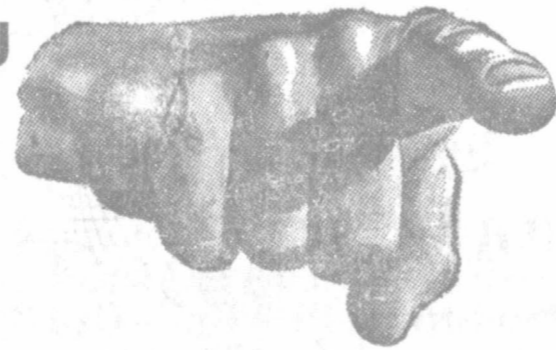

State Capitol NEWS

Austin — Clean up the roadsides is a message being delivered by the Texas Good Roads Association and the Texas Junior Chamber of Commerce.

Project is described as an "important contribution to the pleas of Governor Connally and the Legislature to seriously and systematically promote tourist travel into and through Texas."

Texas Junior Chamber will encourage its members to join in a project to remove debris and litter from city streets, country roads and state highways.

Texas Good Roads Association will give the junior chambers money prizes for the best local progress to make their areas more attractive to visitors of Texas.

WATER

Final legislative action is near on the bill by Sen. George Parkhouse of Dallas and Rep. Eligio de la Garza of McAllen to set up machinery for the state to help out financially on big water projects.

Both Houses have adopted the bill, with a small difference. Sen. Ralph Hall of Rockwall added an amendment to give money to county commissioners courts approval power on recreation facilities planned at reservoirs built under the program. Since no county money will be involved, the House took out this provision.

Voters approved the plan last November by which the Texas Water Development Board will be allowed to use up to half of its \$100,000,000 borrowing power to pay for, or contract to pay for, the building of added height on dams to be built by local or federal agencies.

Highly complicated procedures were written into the bill to safeguard the money. Cash from future sales of water or storage space will repay the state bonds issued to finance the projects.

INDUSTRY PLAN

State loans would be available for building new, or expanding old, factories in Texas, if the House and the voters approve a plan by Sen. Martin Dies Jr. of Lufkin.

Dies got the Senate to approve his plan for a \$200,000,000 state bond issue from which loans would be made.

Theory is that the industries would repay the loans with interest, and this would repay the state's debt, also with interest. State's borrowing power is such that it would have lower interest rates, and the difference in interest would pay costs of administering the program.

TAX CUT

While legislators begin consideration of tax increases to help finance state government activities, mainly the growth in higher education, two industries are about to get tax cuts.

Both Houses of the Legislature passed a bill to reduce the tax on sulphur producers.

House also has passed; and favorable Senate action is expected, on a bill to exempt state banks from the sales tax and the corporation franchise tax.

Both groups are putting up persuasive arguments. Sulphur lobbyists say that Louisiana's tax on sulphur is only \$1.03 a ton, so Texas should cut its rate

to that level.

Owners of state-chartered banks argue that national banks are exempt from state sales and franchise taxes, so state banks ought to be, too.

Apparently, the tax program of Gov. John Connally for the rest of the Texans is gathering support. It calls for expansion of the new sales tax by eliminating exemptions on low-cost clothing and farm implements, and for extending the corporation franchise "surtax" which has been in effect on a "temporary" basis for four years.

CRIMINAL LAWS

Senator Dorsey B. Hardeman of San Angelo piloted through the Senate a 389-page revision of the code of criminal procedure — the first complete revision in a long, long time.

Purpose of the code, as drafted by a State Bar committee and revised by Hardeman, is to remove some of the loopholes and uncertainties in present criminal procedure.

House action is expected, since lawyers from all sides of criminal practice are agreed that reforms are needed.

SCHOOL LAW

Texas has come a long way along the road to an attitude of normalcy on racial desegregation.

That's what Rep. Don Gladden of Fort Worth told the House State Affairs Committee.

Gladden's bill, co-sponsored by 49 House members, would abolish the law passed in 1957 requiring that school districts get voter approval before desegregation.

Under that law, districts which do not call elections before integrating face the loss of state funds.

Bill now is in subcommittee.

PADRE ACTION

Both Houses of the Legislature have passed, and Governor Connally has signed, the bill to give the state's approval — and some of its land — to the Padre Island National Seashore project.

U. S. Dept. of Interior will build the vast recreational area, designed to preserve 81 miles of Padre Island in its natural state. Texas had to give about 40,000 acres in Laguna Madre as a part of the project.

CONGRESSMEN

The House spent a long day of back-and-forth debate on the bill by Rep. Rayford Price of Frankston to reapportion Texas for congressional purposes.

Major points in the bill are the abolition of the fourth district in North Texas — long represented by the late Speaker Sam Rayburn — the creation of a second congressional district in Dallas County.

Under the House version, a new South Texas district, with no present congressman, would be formed.

U. S. Reps. Wright Patman of Texarkana and Ray Roberts of McKinney would be placed in the same district. Otherwise, present congressmen may have their districts altered somewhat, but still will reside in their present districts.

SLANT DRILLING

An additional 14 civil penalty suits for alleged slant oil well activities were filed in Travis County District Court by Attorney General Waggoner Carr.

Suits ask \$1,000 per day penalty for alleged violations of the rule and regulations of the Railroad Commission.

POOLING BILL PROGRESSES

Controversial oil and gas pooling bill by Rep. Wayne Gibbons of Breckenridge was approved by the House Oil, Gas

and Mining Committee.

It is now on the House calendar.

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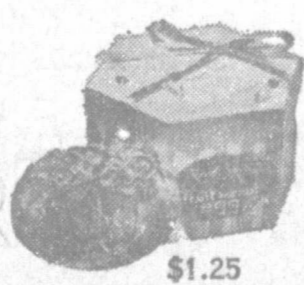

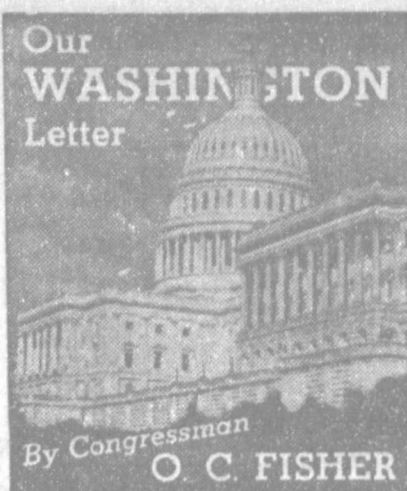

Exemptions

Ellis Campbell Jr. of the Dallas Internal Revenue office explained today that exemptions on Federal income tax returns are never prorated because of the birth or death of a dependent during the taxable year.

If a child was born alive at any time during the year, you may claim the full \$600 exemption if all other dependency tests are met. This is true even though the child may have lived only momentarily. It is also true for a child born on the last day of the year. An exemption may not be claimed for a stillborn child.

If a dependent died during the year and all other dependency tests have been met, the full \$600 exemption is allowable. For example: -- Your mother died on January 15, 1962. She had no income and you furnished all of her support until the date of death. You may claim the full \$600 exemption.
