BOOM OR BUST PLANNERS

One segment of American thought considers the prospect of recession about as fearsome as nuclear war. Generally, this thinking insists that government provide guarantees against such calamity. It was therefore both concession and pressure when President Kennedy looked a group of bankers in the eye recently and promised the nation a recession unless the tax cut goes through. Has Mr. Kennedy taken up soothsaying? If so, why are his planners blind to dangers of government induced economic chaos? Either kind of collapse would surely bring thoroughgoing government-managed economy. Perhaps that is the real goal.

When the economic indicators revealed a slow-down last summer, we heard this same plea: there would have to be a tax cut to starve off recession. Then, with the economy stepping along briskly at the year's end, it was said that the future would require a tax cut. Now that we're on a plateau and nothing spectacular is occurring to set off a boom, we are told that we have only two choices, either we cut taxes or we face a recession. (A free economy always faces recession.)

Boom Obsession

Another obsession among the planners is that we require incessant economic boom. They decree that our growth must proceed at some predetermined but furious rate, with never a backward look nor pause for readjustment. But the complex economic life of the nation is not going to gee and haw at command from Washington. The government can meddle with the currency and inflate it to the bursting point, but after that the meddling ceases. But if we seek complete planning and control we encourage the tyranny of the state.

Although it has been tried before, deficit spending has never accomplished much as anti-recession medicine. It would seem that if national deficits are worth anything in achieving economic prosperity, we would have had no ups and downs at all. But we have had our peaks and valleys for five years, during which our habit of deficits has piled up some \$30 billion in debts. Our nearly thirty years of deficit spending in peacetime has produced nothing except debt and cheap money, unless it has been a more vigorous interest in the pork-barrel.

Where Cuts Are Needed

People have grave doubts that tax cutting such as that proposed by the President will prevent recession or stimulate growth. Many believe that cuts in the low income brackets would not have any effect at all upon our economy. There is doubt whether this would stimulate consumer spending. What will people do with a tax refund? They may choose to pay off debts, or hide it under the mattress. Cuts toward the top brackets, however, along with corporate tax relief, could produce more action toward stimulating enterprise and expanding business.

A big question remains. Can we expect business itself to go off on a wild spree of expansion as long as the federal government controls prices, encourages the wage spiral, and keeps the dollar in jeopardy by its domestic and foreign policies? Can even Mr. Kennedy suppose that the steel industry will charge out of the corner in which he stood it a year ago, beaming with confidence and raring to build new plants that will hire the unemployed? Do Administration economists think that Big Steel will build more capacity just because they say the word "boom"?

Confusion or Sense?

The truth is that the Kennedy money policies tend to produce caution and confusion. People may not understand what White House Adviser Walter Heller means by "deficits of strength," but they do understand that a tax cut is supposed to mean less revenue for the government to spend. People are aware that a tax cut with deficit spending is, after all, not a tax cut in the full sense of the picture. If the government cannot afford the loss of revenue, our citizens would just as soon forget about the tax cut.

To be sure, when high taxes confiscate capital that would be used to create jobs, it is time to talk about relief for enterprise. But the President proposes limiting deductions and alter-

It will be only self-defeating to tax so that government can spend so that more taxes are required to pay for bigger deficits of bigger and bigger government.

Billy Graham's Film To Be At 1st Baptist Church

Evangelist Billy Graham's newest feature-length dramatic film, "Shadow of the Boomerang", will have its Santa Anna showing May 7 at 8: p. m. at the First Baptist Church.

Starring vivacious Georgia Lee and television's Buffalo Bill Jr., Dick Jones, "Shadow of the Boomerang" is an outdoor action picture with all of the excitement and breath-taking scope of the land, "Down Under." Setting for the screen drama is Australia's "Outback," the continent's vast interior region where some of the world's largest cattle stations are located.

The two young Americans head an All-Australian supporting cast, playing brother and sister roles in a turbulent story of homestead life. Their arrival in Australia to manage newly acquired family holdings, plunges the couple into strange surroundings and situations with which they find it difficult to cope. The brother is immature and impetuous, slow to accept Australian ways. His sister is much more democratic, readily accepted by her new friends with whom she joins in an attempt to instill understanding and tolerance in her brother.

New Bids Asked On Four Flood Control Projects

Invitations for bids to build Sites 9, 10, 14 and 15 in the Northwest Laterals Watershed in the vicinity of Rockwood and Talpa are being reissued. The floodwater retarding structures were advertised in February of this year, but the contract was not awarded by the Contract Section of the Soil Conservation Service in Temple, according to E. J. Hughes, Area Conservationist at Brownwood.

The four floodwater retarding structures are being advertised under one contract.

Land rights and easements for construction of the floodwater retarding structures are furnished by the Central Colorado Soil Conservation District with operation and maintenance to be performed by the Coleman County Commissioners Court. Conservation treatment on farm and ranch land in the watershed will be performed by farmers and ranchers in cooperation with the Central Colorado Soil Conservation District and the Coleman Work Unit Office of the Soil Conservation Service.

Invitations for bids are to be opened at 2:00 p. m. May 20, 1963, by the Soil Conservation Service in Temple Texas. Construction will commence within 20 calendar days from the date of the award and is scheduled for completion within 255 calendar days. John P. Curtis, Project Construction Engineer, Coleman will supervise construction of the work, Hughes said.

County Savings Bond Sales Reaches \$116,649

Savings Bond sales for the first three months of 1963 in Coleman County totaled \$116,649. Of this amount \$42,124 were purchased in March according to a report released by Robert I. Bowen Jr., Chairman of the County Savings Bonds Committee.

Sales in Texas for the first quarter of 1963 amounted to \$15,387,951, which represents 26.7% of the state goal of \$150,600,000. "Right now the Freedom Bond Drive is going on... this is an opportunity for every family to purchase at least one Savings Bond before the Fourth of July. Traffic Accident Situation Now Termed Critical

Austin — The Texas Safety Association today labeled the traffic accident situation in Texas "critical" and called on the citizens of the state to help stop the increasing trend in traffic accidents and fatalities.

"The traffic accident situation in Texas has reached a critical period," J. O. Musick, General Manager of TSA, said. "During the first three and one-half months of this year, traffic fatalities increased about 17 percent over the same period last year. Traffic accidents increased approximately 12 percent."

The safety director said it was going to take "an all-out effort on the part of every driver to stop the needless waste of lives, the human suffering and the economic loss caused by accidents." He also pointed out the urgency of checking the increasing accident trend.

"Vacation time is just around the corner, and if something isn't done to stop the traffic accident trend, it won't be safe for anyone to get out on our streets and highways," Musick said.

He urged individual drivers to increase or work toward developing skills and attitudes to meet every driving situation and appealed to all civic clubs and other organizations to encourage safe driving.

"Each driver can help himself and other drivers by driving carefully and courteously. Civic clubs and other organizations can aid the cause of traffic safety by initiating and supporting safety campaigns.

"So, let's all drive safely and talk safety," Musick concluded. "The life you save may be your own."

Brady Creek Dam Is Completed

The new lake on Brady Creek a few miles up stream from the city of Brady, is ready for a rain. When filled, this lake will contain 1,610 surface acres of water and will have a shore line of 25 miles. The average depth of the lake will be about 15 feet and the maximum will be 64 feet. The dam is 107 feet high. The most convenient approach to Lake Brady is over FM RD 2028 out of Brady.

Because of the newness of Brady Creek and the lack of water, accommodations for picnicking, camping, loading ramps, boats, motors and the usual needs of the recreation seekers have not had time to be developed. They are expected to be provided as the need arises.

Texas Game and Fish Commission Fisheries Biologists have made their surveys and recommendations. Under the leadership of the Mayor and City Council of Brady, arrangements were made and the waters in McCulloch County were treated to remove the undesirable fish.

As soon as sufficient water is impounded, the Fish Hatches of the Game and Fish Commission will begin stocking with game fish.

It's Time For... EYE CARE

 DEPTH PERCEPTION

There is a great deal of misconception about depth perception. It is possible to enjoy this phenomenon even if he has only one eye.

The use of two eyes, naturally, heightens the effect of depth perception, but if you were to lose an eye, you would regain monocular depth perception very quickly. The employment of two eyes when viewing an object, enables us to "see around" it. That is, you see one side with one eye and the opposite side with the other. This increases your perspective because you see the object from two different angles.

Some one-eyed people are able to achieve a simulated type of normal depth perception by moving their eye rapidly from side. This gives an illusion of depth.

Once a person adapts to his one-eyed condition, his depth perception is almost as keen as the normal viewer. Some of you may recall Wiley Post, the famous aviator. He wore a patch on one eye to cover his blind eye. Even with this handicap he became one of America's most outstanding air pioneers.

Although the one-eyed person does have a restricted visual field, there are many animals whose eye placement is different from humans and who see the world vastly changed from the manner in which we view it. The horse and the rabbit are two common examples of this. They do not use the two eyes together but they have a much wider field of vision.

It is only when the eyes are placed in front of the head that the two will work together and provide binocular, or two-eyed depth perception.

Austin — If the 58th Legislature's final version of a loan shark law is that which passed the House, folks who do business with the money men still would pay charges up to 500 percent on the smallest, shortest-term loans.

Small-small loans — those under \$100 — would be regulated by an amendment to Corpus Christi Sen. Bruce Reagan's bill which provides that on loans from \$19 to \$35, the lender could collect a flat 10 percent charge plus a \$3 handling charge for each month of the loan, up to no more than two months.

In addition to this, lenders also could collect \$3.50 per month up to four months on loans between \$35 and \$70, and \$4 per month for up to six months on loans from \$70 to \$100.

The over-\$100 clause sets these rates per year per \$100: \$19 up to \$100; \$16, from \$100 to \$200; \$13 per \$100 between \$200 and \$300. This is scaled to the rate of \$7 per \$100 on loans between \$1,000 and \$1,500.

Rep. Joe Cannon of Mexia called the House-passed bill "a Robin Hood in reverse bill — it robs the poor and gives it to the rich."

A work-out on the measure — which carries 19 Senate amendments and 23 by the House — is expected in a Senate-House conference committee, but it won't take long if Gov. John Connally and Speaker Byron Tunnell have their way. Both want a loan bill passed this session, and neither wants an extended — or a special — session.

COLLEGE BILLS

Governor Connally, Speaker Tunnell and Lt. Gov. Preston Smith all are anxious to see the Pan American and San Angelo college bills passed. Bills finally were pulled out of the House State Affairs Committee, chaired by reluctant Rep. John Allen of Longview.

Allen threatened to resign over the pressure (committee-men kept him from doing so) because he couldn't see the money in sight to support the 20 colleges already in the state family.

RAILROAD COMMISSION CHANGE PROPOSED

A plan to take the railroads and trucks away from the Railroad Commission has been proposed by Henry Grover of Houston, who told the House:

"Recent developments indicate that the Railroad Commission is overworked, and has more to do than it can handle."

Grover inferred that these indications are the slant-hole oil well scandals and the conflict-of-interest resignation of former Commissioner William J. Murray Jr.

Grover introduced H. B. 1041, to ease some of the workload by removing the commission's authority over the transportation

industry, and leaving it with just oil and gas regulatory authority.

The "Texas Commerce Commission", to regulate railroads, bus lines, truck lines, and so forth, would be made up of three \$15,000-a-year commissioners.

Railroad Commission was set up in 1891 to regulate the railroads. But authority over oil and gas, since 1917, has caused most of its time and attention to turn in that direction.

CONGRESSIONAL REDISTRICTING

A crowd of witnesses from the late Speaker Sam Rayburn's 4th Congressional district is due to oppose the Congressional redistricting bill which would abolish the old 4th, and relocate it in South Texas.

Sen. Ralph Hall of Rockwall succeeded in delaying Senate committee action on the measure to May 7, so the opponents can come to Austin.

House passed the bill to the Senate, over protests from Rep. Don Hefton of Sherman. Delay on the hearing may put the redistricting proposal, authored by Rep. Rayford Price of Frankston, in jeopardy.

Governor Connally has said he saw no need for Congressional redistricting this session. He thought it could be handled in 1965.

Meanwhile, U. S. Congressman Ray Roberts, who now represents the old 4th, doesn't seem worried about losing his job. He's looking for a press liaison man for his Washington office.

AT-LARGE ELECTIONS SUGGESTED

Eighty Texas counties, in which two county precincts or more, represent a fraction of the total county vote, would be affected if a constitutional amendment by Rep. Lindsey Rodriguez of Hidalgo ever comes to a favorable vote by the public.

Under Rodriguez' plan, if the total number of votes cast in two or more commissioners' precincts amount to less than 20 percent of the total vote cast in the election of all four commissioners, the commissioners in the small precincts would be

required to run on a countywide -at-large basis.

Rodriguez described the most extreme example of a situation he's trying to cure — that in Kleberg County where two of the county's four commissioners' precincts "are behind locked gates" on the King Ranch, where 80 voters reside.

Witnesses from around the state appeared in favor of Rodriguez' proposal.

But Gaines County Judge Charles Lawrence said the County Judges and Commissioners Association is opposed.

ONE-DAY SESSION

A special, one-day (\$8,000) session of the Texas Legislature would be held on December 1, 1964, under a House approved resolution by Rep. Bill Dungan of McKinney.

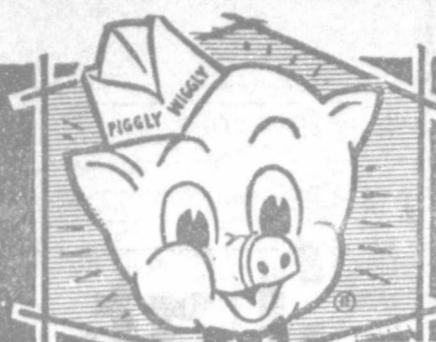
