OUR FREEDOM CONTRACT

Not one American in a hundred has ever read the Constitution of the United States. Yet that is his prime protection for his personal freedom which is the source of his prosperity, security and happiness.

Not one American in a thousand has ever studied his Constitution to understand how it limits the Federal Government by checks and balances to prevent any group of politicians from gaining too much power over his life. Yet this is the source of our power as a nation and our independence and prosperity as a people.

Not one American in five thousand seems to know that Fabian socialists in our government for the past 30 years have been working to destroy our Constitutional form of government and our free enterprise system which resulted from it, in order to create a socialist "welfare state," with a planned economy where they will be "the planners," the ruling class.

Violating Constitution

One of our greatest statesmen, Senator Robert Taft once said, "The whole trouble with the New Dealers is that they believe that whatever they desire the (Supreme) Court should hold to be Constitutional. They do not care what happens to the fundamental principles on which this country was founded. Most of them would be willing to abolish the states and turn over all local government to federal control. All of them favor the delegation of legislative power to the President and seem to forget that this was the first step in the growth of autocracy in Germany and Italy.

The Constitution provides that the Congress pass the laws, control tariffs, taxes and Federal spending through appropriation bills. The Fabian socialists seek to take all of these powers away from Congress and give them to the President, which would give him dictatorial power. They have already succeeded in accomplishing much of this through the Federal bureaus, such as the Department of Agriculture, which have created laws by regulation and by edict in open violation of the Constitution.

Supreme Court Packed

In the Judicial branch of our government, the Supreme Court has been packed with political appointees for years. Thus, most of the Supreme Court justices today favor Fabian socialism and uphold the unconstitutional acts of the socialists in the executive branch.

You tell the average American this and he shrugs his shoulders indifferently and says, "I don't want to get involved." He is very unlike the original patriots who founded our republic and said, "And for the support of this (cause), with a firm reliance upon the protection of Divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our lives, our fortunes, and our sacred honor."

Present-Day Apathy

Another great patriot, Dr. C. S. Polling of Arizona, says, "Our present-day apathy presents a frightening spectacle. In this year of our Lord 1963, we have people who claim all the benefits and protections of our Constitution and freedoms, going about the country speaking in our churches, schools and on our university campuses, who openly express contempt for our flag, the symbol of our liberty and sacred charter; subversives and foreign agents, insulting and sneering at our duly constituted Congressional committees and courts invoking protection for their acts of treason through an amendment to the Constitution they hope to destroy."

If we can get just 10 percent of the American people to become aroused from their apathy, informed on their Constitution and dedicated to its protection, we can still save our Constitutional form of government — so necessary to our individual freedom, private property, national independence and our opportunity for individual prosperity, security and happiness.

Game and Fish Hearings Scheduled

Austin — Sportsmen, landowners and others interested in wildlife conservation will have an opportunity to hear proposed hunting and fishing recommendations for the coming year at public hearings scheduled in June.

Technicians of the Game and Fish Commission will present their recommendations at meetings held in all counties presently participating in the Commission's Regulatory Authority program. These recommendations are based on actual field studies and are proposed in the interest of wildlife conservation.

Each hearing will be recorded and a summary presented to the Commissioners prior to their final regular meeting in July, when they will issue hunting and fishing proclamations for the coming season.

Some Monthly Dependency Benefits To Increase 10%

Approximately 45,000 children and 30,000 dependent parents of deceased veterans will receive an increase of about 10 percent in their monthly dependency and indemnity compensation.

Glyndon M. Hague, Manager of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Waco said today.

Authorized by the 88th Congress, the increased payments will be automatic, and will be included in the July checks mailed to reach beneficiaries about August 1, Mr. Hague explained. There is no need to write the VA.

A child, now receiving \$70 a month, will receive \$77 per month under the new law, he pointed out.

Two children, currently receiving dependency and indemnity compensation checks amounting to \$100 per month, will receive \$110 equally divided between them under the new law.

Three children, receiving \$130 per month, will receive \$143 per month equally divided between them. If there are more than three children, each additional child, now receiving \$25 a month, will receive \$28 a month under the new law.

In the case of dependent parents living together with an annual income of less than \$1,000, their present payment of \$50 each will be increased to \$55 each under the new law, Mr. Hague said.

Peace Corps Tests To Be Given in June

This spring's last Peace Corps Placement Test will be given Saturday, June 8, at 815 Civil Service testing centers throughout the United States. The next test is not scheduled until August 24.

This is a revised version of the Peace Corps Placement Test, and it has been cut to about one-fourth the original length. It is composed of a one-half hour general aptitude test and a one-half hour language aptitude test. Applicants with any competence in Spanish or French should take an additional one-hour language achievement test.

Applicants are not permitted to take the new test if they took the old one.

The tests will commence at 8:30 sharp, local time, but applicants are advised to be at the testing centers at least 20 minutes early. They should plan on remaining for at least two hours, and up to 3½ hours if they take the Spanish or French tests. Extra time is needed for instruction and filling out forms.

Applicants should bring with them a completed Peace Corps questionnaire — available at local post offices. Information concerning the locations of the testing centers is also available at post offices. Applicants without completed questionnaires may take the test, but will be asked to stay and fill them out before leaving.

The Peace Corps Placement Test is non-competitive. There are no passing or failing grades, and scores will not be released to applicants. The Test is used to help the Peace Corps in assigning applicants to the most appropriate projects in accordance with their ability to learn a foreign language, to teach, and the like. Anyone may take the test, regardless of his educational level. No official word from the Peace Corps is necessary.

All Peace Corps applicants must be U.S. citizens at least 18 years of age. There is no upper age limit. Married couples without dependents under 18 may qualify to take the test.

Plenty of Sugar For Everyone

"Sugar already on hand or committed to the United States for 1963 totals 500,000 tons more than last year's entire national consumption," reported Under Secretary of Agriculture Chas. S. Murphy in comments made recently regarding the upswing in domestic sugar prices.

"These new commitments have been made within the past few days," he added, "and the speculative bubble in sugar is bound to burst in the face of this plentiful supply."

"Spectators may be able to keep the bubble going for a while, but not for very long," he declared.

At the same time, he warned that people who load up high priced sugar may sustain losses when the price goes down.

"Current Congressional hearing on the sugar situation," he said, "will show plentiful supplies and this will help restore stability in the sugar market."

He noted that a relatively tight situation in world sugar supplies early this year created uncertainty in the market, and gave spectators a chance to bid up prices.

State Capitol NEWS

Austin, Tex. — Rumors concerning a special session continue to bounce around the Capitol.

Most persistent rumor is that Gov. John B. Connally will "line item" veto the appropriations bill, which he contends "short-changes" higher education... then call a special session in the fall.

In a "line-item" veto he

would strike out items he considers unnecessary. Then try to convince Legislators that the money should go to higher education instead.

Some lawmakers think they will be called back in September. Others pick October. Those who predict a fall session believe they again will have to tackle the subject of congressional redistricting. They didn't agree to a solution in the regular session.

Speaker Satisfied

House Speaker Byron Tunnell of Tyler thinks a summer session is possible.

Tunnell said he is making no vacation plans until he is certain he won't be called on to preside over the House in late June or July.

But the Speaker stated he was well satisfied with the budget passed by the Legislature. He said, "They apparently did what they thought was right, and I for one will stand behind them."

"The 58th Legislature met its challenge and did its work," Tunnell said proudly.

There were many times during the 58th session when the Speaker and the House seemed at odds. But when the session ended most House members agreed that Tunnell had been a good referee.

"I have never asked anything but the right to take my position and give another man the

same right," Tunnell stated when the bustle of the 58th dissolved into post-session silence. "That is what I really like about the House: There is such a mixture of philosophies, ranging from liberals like Bob Eckhardt to mine. Somewhere in between may be where the answer lies."

Instant Railroad Commissioner
Many nice things have been said about Jim C. Langdon since Governor Connally appointed him to the Railroad Commission to replace Bill Murray. One thing for sure, he adapts to changes easily.

In two short hours, Langdon resigned as chief justice of the El Paso Court of Civil Appeals, withdrew from the race for the State Supreme Court place that Judge Frank Culver of Fort Worth is expected to leave; was sworn in as Railroad Commissioner; re-announced as a candidate for re-election in 1964; and went right to work.

Then he and Commissioner Ben Ramsey made the announcement the oil and gas industry was waiting for — a 28 per cent allowance for June.

Governors' Choice
Langdon's appointment was the third he has received during three administrations.

Gov. Allan Shivers appointed him 112th District Judge in 1954. He was elected to that bench twice. Then Gov. Price Daniel appointed him Chief Justice of the El Paso Court in 1959. This post he resigned to accept Governor Connally's appointment.

Bills Versus Laws
A quick tabulation of the results of five months of labor by the 181 members of the 58th Legislature reveals that only about 31 per cent of the bills passed both House and Senate, to become laws.

A total of 1,723 bills were introduced. Of these, 543 were passed to law. Most of the weeding-out was done by committees. They reported as favorable only 786 bills as compared with 906 in 1961.

Supreme Court Backs Commission
State Supreme Court upheld the Railroad Commission's right to authorize an operator to conduct a particular oil field to a survey of another operator's

well to determine if it were illegally slanted.

Case at bar was L & G Oil Company (headed by H. G. Lewis Jr. of Kilgore) versus the Railroad Commission et al. L&G charged that a Railroad Commission order permitting Tidewater Oil Company to authorize Sperry-Sun Surveying Company to run a slant-hole survey on an L&G well in the East Texas field was illegal.

The 126th District Court in Austin had supported the Railroad Commission's order.

But while the Supreme Court affirmed the right to give the order, it said it was improperly worded and sent the case back to the trial court.

Two members of the high court, however — Associate Justices Meade F. Griffin and Joe Greenhill — disagreed with their colleagues.

"To allow a citizen or corporation — a potential foe in litigation — to go upon and take notice of another's property without even so much as an opportunity to be heard, is a clear violation of the due process clause of the Texas and Federal constitutions," they stated.

Date Mix-Up

On or about August 1, Secretary of State Crawford Martin has to start publishing proposed amendments to the constitution that will be up for a vote in a special election on Saturday, November 9.

Martin checked out the first three amendments scheduled for the ballot: One to decide whether to abolish the poll tax; one asking whether to extend the Veterans' Land Program and increase bonds; and one asking voters whether the state should increase from \$54,000,000 to \$60,000,000 state funds that can be spent each year on federal-state assistance for old folks, children, the blind and disabled.

Then he came to a fourth — a proposed amendment to authorize a retirement and benefit program for Jefferson County drainage district employees. One cause referred to a November 9, 1963, election. Another set the election for November, 1964.

Martin couldn't decide which date was right, so he referred the matter to Attorney General Waggoner Carr.

Former Speaker Lands Job
James A. Turman of Gober, former speaker of the House who ran for lieutenant-governor in 1962 and was defeated by Preston Smith of Lubbock, was around Austin for a long time after his term as speaker ended on January 7.

Many political potentates predicted he would be named Secretary of State — he wasn't. Then they said he would head Governor Connally's proposed Commission on Excellence in Higher Education, but that bill didn't pass.

Turman came out fine in the run. Last week, he joined the U. S. Office of Education in Washington, D.C., as a Special Consultant-Expert to the Commissioner of Education.

Turman once was assistant to the president of Texas Woman's

University in Denton.

Stocks Sales Granted
State Securities Commissioner William M. King announced a sharp rise in the number of companies registering stocks with his board in April.

Sixty-three companies — 21 Texas firms included — were granted permits to issue \$22,634,384 worth of securities in the state.

Highway Contracts Record Set
A \$5,200,000 contract for construction of a 12-mile stretch of Interstate Highway 20 in Kaufman County broke all records for the State Highway Department.

Contract was one of 64, representing \$33,000,000 worth of road improvements let by the

State Highway Commission on May 27.

Unemployment Down
Economic pictures drawn by state agencies this week began to look like "Texas Brags."

Texas Employment Commission also had a glowing report. It announced that the number of job-seekers dropped from 191,000 in March to 171,500 in April. Number of employed was 3,543,100 — 56,100 more than the March figure.

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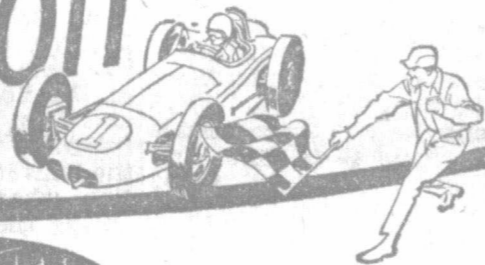

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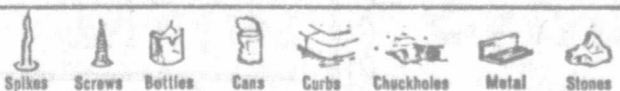

New Development Offered Cotton Farmers

An important new development will be offered this year to all cotton farmers by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, according to B. B. Manly, Jr., chairman of the local Cotton Classing Office.

This will be in the form of a "mike" service to give farmers another test of the quality of their cotton.

"The Cotton Trade has made the micronaire such an integral part of their business that they also buy according to the 'mike'. USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service is furnishing this service to provide the farmer with an additional aid in marketing his cotton," says Manly.

Applications have been mailed to all gins in the Abilene and Munday areas so gingers can apply for the service. "Deadline for applying is July 1, 1963, so the Office will know about how many samples to prepare for," says Manly.

Gingers must apply for the service and pay the 8 cents per bale fee charged for the service. All cotton is eligible for the

"mike" service, but it must be on an all-or-none basis from any one gin as the local Office cannot separate those who do not desire it.

Last year, 52 gins in this area applied for this service which came into effect after the harvest began. The Abilene Classing Office miked 89,243 samples and Munday, 6,138 under this program last year.

"If we have the cotton this year, it seems certain that the number of bales miked will increase considerably," says Manly.

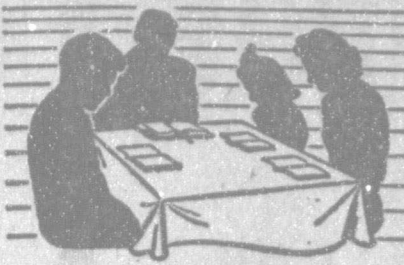

Tuberculosis victims in the
U.S. increased in 1962 over 1961.
That was not true in Texas,
but figures from several Texas
counties followed the national,
not the state, trend.

The number of new active
cases of TB reported nationally
to health authorities in 1962 was
54,652, compared with 53,726 in
1961. The number of new active
cases reported to Texas health
authorities was 3,199 in 1962;
the total for 1961 was 3,480.
Medical men seek full reporting
of TB, though some suggest
that more TB cases are not re-
ported than are reported. TB
is transmitted from one person
to another, so the knowledge of
who has TB is important.

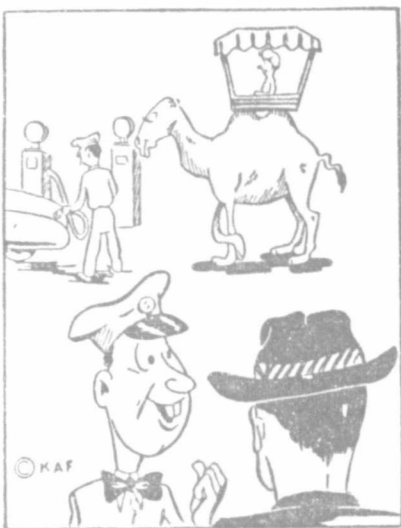

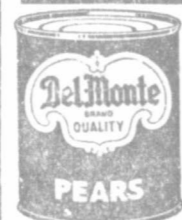
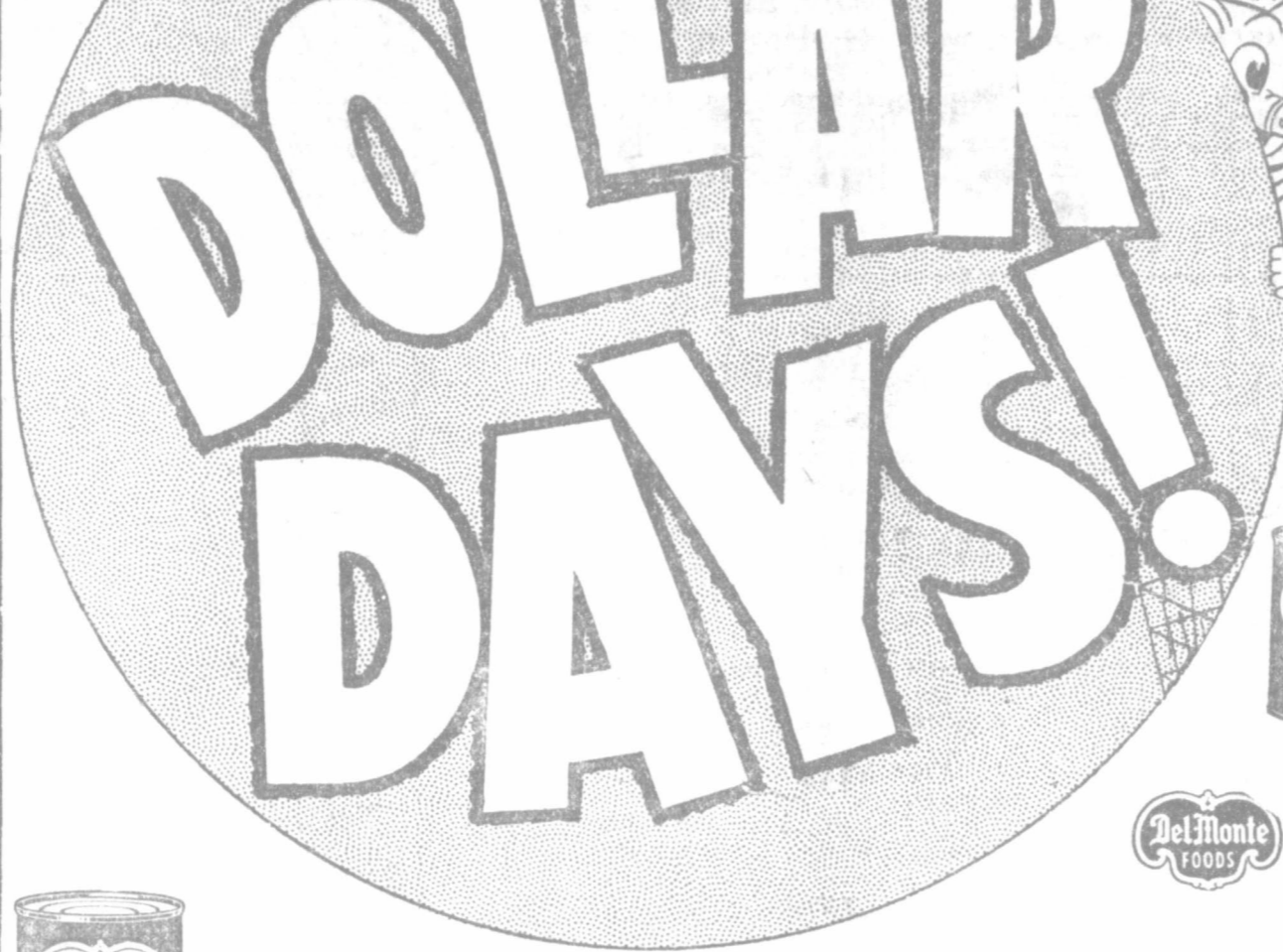
