





"The Cotton Trade has made the micronaire such an integral part of their business that they also buy according to the 'mike' USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service is furnishing this service to provide the farmer with an additional aid in marketing his cotton," says Manly.

Applications have been mailed to all gins in the Abilene and Munday areas so ginners can apply for the service. "Deadline for applying is July 1, 1963, so the Office will know about how many samples to prepare for," says Manly.

Ginners must apply for the service and pay the 8 cents per bale fee charged for the service. All cotton is eligible for the
