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"Fly Factory" Expands

Mission — The fight to eradicate the bothersome screwworm from the Sou'hwest is receiving increased momentum as the plant in which sexually-sterile screwworm flies are reared is being modified to facilitate production of more than 130 million flies per week.

Officials of the Southwest Screwworm Eradication Program announced that the increase in sterile flies should be available by mid-July. The additional flies will be used to combat isolated screwworm outbreaks outside of the area where the insect can normally survive winter temperatures, as well as to eliminate native flies in the southern parts of Texas and New Mexico which comprise the overwintering area.

No increase in building space is required in order to expand production, officials stated. Some modifications of existing equipment are necessary and an increase in personnel and cost of production and distribution is empected.

The plant near Mission was completed in June 1962 and was designed to produce an average of 50 million flies per week with a top production of 75 million. As a result of experimentation that developed many improvements in fly-rearing techniques, more than 100 million flies have been produced each week for several months with little change in original plant and equipment.
