

Not in more than 50 per cent of the cases, says Glyndon Hague, Manager of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Waco, as the result of a recent survey.

The VA had directed a reminder letter to GI policy holders 60 years of age and older to check on the beneficiary choices the veteran had originally made as well as his selection of a lump settlement or payments over a period of time.

Mr. Hague revealed that in 55 percent of the veterans' replies, changes were requested to bring the insurance settlement in line with the veterans' current wish-

Mr. Hague said the VA will continue to send a reminder to all GI policyholders 60 years or older and will notify other policyholders as they reach their 60th birthday.





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

A. For doors taller than one foot, use 4" Peg-Board, tempered hardboard or one of the beautiful woodgrained hardboards available under the name Royalcote at lumber yards. Hardboards of 1/8" thickness are satisfactory for doors of smaller heights. Doors over 30" high should be framed or made by laminating two 1/4" pieces to-

#### COON FENCE

Are the raccoons getting more of your roasting ears than you are? Do the raccoons raid your garden each night? If so you might like to try to even up the score.

The control of the raccoon population has been a problem for a long time. When they find roasting ear size corn it seems to attract them, until either the corn or the raccoons are gone. Many times people protect their crops by hunting the coons with dogs or with lights at night. Steel traps have proven beneficial in controlling raccoon populations and keeping them out of the gardens. However, one of the newest control methods which has been called to my attention is an electric fence. A two wire fence is constructed to encompass the corn, peanuts or garden which is being destroyed by the raccoons. The wires are placed one above the other, three inches apart and three inches from the ground. It is important to place the post or stakes, which hold the wire, close enough together to keep the wires near enough to the ground so the coons can not crawl under, yet not close enough for it to touch the ground. A standard electric fence charger is used to make the fence "hot".

John R. Wood, Conservation Chief in Brownwood, reports a fence of this type which is doing a good job protecting come sweet corn in Brown County. After noticing considerable damage by these night hunters, the electric fence was installed and after some additional adjustments and replacements, it appears that the raccoons are not doing any more damage to

he corn.
