OUTLOOK FOR MOHAIR continues to be favorable. There has been a sharp rise in both export and domestic sales, with more mohair being used in bulky type fabrics.

After the price drop in 1962, mohair bounced back with demands picking up steadily after September of 1962. In addition to foreign demand, the U.S. knit trade became interested, and large quantities of mohair was purchased for that use.

Fashion often determines mohair demand, and the growers are reaping benefits from that fact at this time. A trend toward bulky, shaggy type fabrics in women's clothing has stirred demand for mohair in brushed and looped-yarn type fabrics. Indications are this trend will gain momentum during the next year.

A recent survey indicated that mohair and wool-mohair blend sweaters were leading in fall buying preferences among retailers throughout the country. Mohair is also in demand for tropical and summer suits, both in the U.S. and abroad. There has been a steady increase in summer weight suits that use mohair.

Mohair production in Texas is keeping pace with the increased demand; production in 1962 was more than double than what it was ten years ago. Last year it amounted to 26.4 million pounds compared to 11.7 million pounds in 1952.
