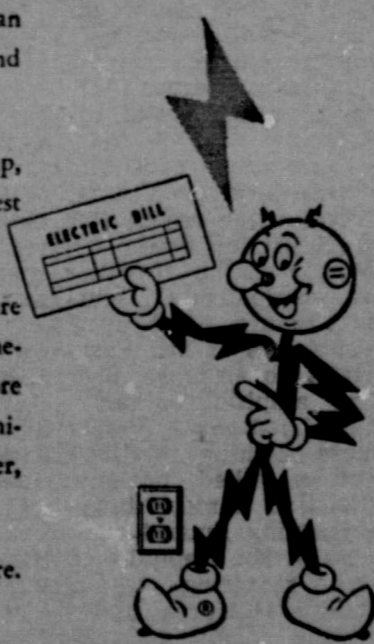

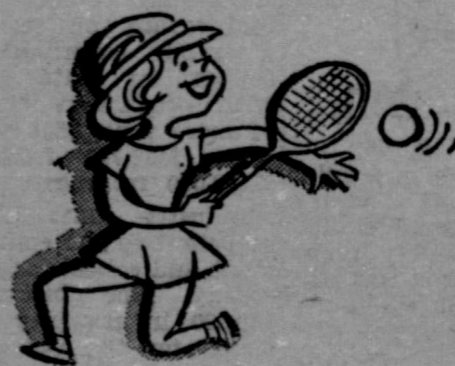

WHAT IS SEEING?

Although the phenomenon of seeing is instantaneous, we don't realize the great amount of interpretation required of the brain to "unscramble" what is seen.

The driver of a vehicle involved in an accident views the mishap quite differently than the "eye-witnesses." There are so many variables that occur in an accident that the actual facts are often obscured.

Your eye doctor will tell you how different patients interpret the images and letters on the eye chart in his office. There are many valid reasons for this misinterpreting. You may not be looking directly at the object in question, your gaze was wandering. The angle of view may affect your interpretation. You may have had your mind fixed on something else. You may be tired, or your eyes are not focusing. Perhaps you need visual correction. Seeing is a very complicated process and it is exceedingly important that you are properly trained to see.

The current and very intense interest in reading courses give ample evidence of the value of accurate reading. Many executives are trained to read their material more rapidly and with greater understanding. Schools have intensified this also and we are again being taught that reading is a very vital part of learning.

**State Capitol NEWS**

Austin — Supporters of the proposed billion-dollar Trinity River development plan won the first round on the opening day of hearings when the Texas Water Commissioners turned down the railroads' motion to delay the Austin hearing.

Gov. John Connally's approval of the Commission's proposed plan was expected. He had long since pledged his support. Connally called the navigation project, "a major step in one of the most important water conservation, flood control, and navigation projects in the history of Texas."

Texas Highway Department's 420-seat capacity auditorium overflowed during the two-day hearing as every community in the vast Trinity watershed was represented.

Spokesman for the railroads was Walter Caven, counselor for the Texas Railroad Association.

Plan of the U. S. crops of Engineers calls for development of the entire watershed for navigation, flood-control, water conservation, water quality control, drainage, irrigation, hydroelectric power, fish, wild life and recreation.

Thirteen reservoirs are included in the long-range plan. Locks and other features to make the river navigable from the Gulf to Fort Worth would claim more than \$515,000,000. That's more than a million dollars a mile for the 500 mile project.

Barge-line navigation of the Trinity from the Gulf of Mexico to the Dallas-Fort Worth market was the target of railroad objections. Railroads claimed that Army engineers "greatly overestimated" traffic potential, future growth and benefits to be derived. Caven said the 20 railroads would have to spend more than \$25,000,000 to relocate lines and bridges in the Fort Worth area. Then they would lose \$6,500,000 annually in freight business to the barge lines.

**NEW SPEED LIMIT OKAYED**

Some 41,500 miles of state-maintained highways will be zoned for the 70-mile per hour speed limit when the law becomes effective on August 23.

Texas Highway Commission approved the daytime maximum for passenger cars for more than two-thirds of the state's highway system. But the old 60-mile per hour maximum still applies to 18,640 miles. Engineering studies indicated that these roads couldn't handle faster traffic.

A large percentage of the Farm-to-Market Road system will come under the 70-mph maximum. Lower limits will apply where conditions warrant. District engineers are expected to release news of re-zoning on a local basis.

**HEART OF TEXAS**

A roadside park some 20 miles north of Brady on U. S. 377 is the geographical center of Texas.

It will be so designated when the Highway Commission erects a brilliant aluminum "Heart of Texas" marker.

Other \$600 aluminum markers are scheduled for Pilot Knob in Travis County, location of the state's only exposed submarine volcano; the Llano Estacado in Garza County; and Old Tascosa in Oldham County. The latter is famed for its Boot Hill Cemetery.

Commission figures each marker will earn more than 10 times its original cost in added tourist revenues.

**CHEMICALS KILL CROPS**

"Weekend farmers" and "absentee owners" not acquainted with the dangerous potential of hormone-type herbicides (such as 2, 4-D and 2, 4, 5-T) have contributed to a new pattern of crop damage, says Agriculture Commissioner John C. White.

He estimated 7,000 to 8,000 acres of crops, principally cotton, have been affected by damaging doses of the herbicides.

"Fortunately, most of the effect has been only light to moderate on the cotton," White said, "and the yields are not seriously threatened."

"But we've been lucky so far," he added. "When carelessly applied, herbicides are capable of wiping out crops several miles away from the sprayed area."

**HOT WEATHER TOLL**

Four consecutive weeks of

100-plus degree weather plus drying wind took a toll of crops over the state, according to the Texas Crop and Pastures and Livestock Reporting Service. Early harvesting was used to beat the heat in many places.

Reporting Service predicts that general rain in all areas still could revive pastures.

**POLIO FADES TO FOUR CASES**

Polio, the dread disease that kept parents stiff with fear for many summers, has declined to the point that the State Health Department has received only four reports of cases so far this year.

Total caseload for the state last year was only 114. Credit for the decline of the crippling is given Salk and Sabin vaccines.

But health officials continued to warn Texans not to be complacent. People of all ages are urged to follow up with booster shots.

**PEACE PRECINCTS PUZZLE**

Ector County's Commissioners Court had a plan to provide offices for the county's four justices of the peace in the new county courthouse, to be completed early in 1964.

Plan was to rezone the four peace precincts so that all would intersect at the new courthouse. Current justices would keep their present offices.

But Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr ruled it cannot be done that way. "If the commissioners' court alters the boundary lines of any justice precinct," Carr commented, "a vacancy exists in the office of justice of the peace and constable, which the court must fill by appointment until the next general election."

**LEGISLATIVE 'RIDER'**

A legislative "rider" on the 1964-65 state budget to cut physical training programs in 20 State colleges to little more than "mass calisthenics" was declared invalid by the attorney general.

Carr said that while "riders" — i. e., restrictions on legislative appropriations — usually get by, this one went too far. It would have kept colleges from spending all their allotted budget if compulsory physical training programs were offered.

Commission on Higher Education asked for the attorney general's opinion, after physical training directors claimed the "rider" would have crippled their work.

**INDUSTRY GAINS**

Lt. Gov. Preston Smith is a staunch defender of local-versus-state programs for bringing in industry.

He told Kiwanis: "Texas does not have to rush headlong into any unwise scheme to bring industry to the state. And as long as we can do this locally, there will be less bureaucracy." Smith said the privately-sup-

Austin — Because of change in the law, the Texas highway Department will no longer require an "Affidavit of Bills Paid" from contractors of highway jobs before making final payment on contracts.

The Highway Department said payment bonds are still required under the law of all contractors awarded highway construction contracts. Responsibility for payment of vendor of materials or equipment attending contracted highway construction rest solely with contractors and bonding companies, it said.

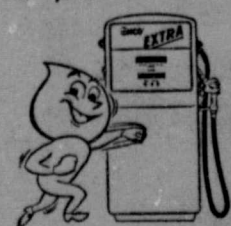

**HAY FEVER HEALTH AND SAFETY TIPS FROM THE AMERICAN MEDICAL ASSN.**

Here comes the hay fever season!

If you're one of the several million in this country who have annual bouts with hay fever, or other millions who undergo severe asthma attacks during the hay fever season, watch out, says Today's Health, the magazine of the American Medical Association. It's rough sledding ahead.

From the middle of August through mid-September, those sensitive to ragweed pollen suffer their most agonizing time. That's when the ragweed pollen count is highest.

Hay fever is not caused by hay and it isn't a fever.

Hay fever is an allergy. Your body becomes sensitive to a foreign substance. This can be almost anything for various individuals, but is most likely to be ragweed pollen. The results also vary, but most commonly are sneezing, watery eyes, runny nose and general miserable discomfort.

Tolerance to pollens sometimes can be built up by injecting a dilute solution of them under the skin. These shots must be medically prescribed to meet individual needs. In some cases your doctor may prescribe one of the antihistamines for temporary relief.

The most common preventive measures against hay fever are:

- Get specific anti-hay fever shots well ahead of the season.
- Avoid exposure to ragweed pollen by keeping away from areas where it is prevalent.
- Air condition the home and work in air-condition surroundings, if possible.
- Antihistamine drugs to lessen the nasal and sinus congestion.
- Keep the home as dust free as possible during the height of the hay fever season and throughout the rest of the year.

**Texas Residents May Obtain Proof of Age From Census Bureau**

Last year, more than 14,000 residents of Texas turned to the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce, for help in proving where and when they were born, the Bureau reported today. They needed proof of age to collect social security and other retirement benefits. They needed it to obtain passports. They needed it to qualify for jobs carrying certain age or citizenship requirements. They needed it for some form of insurance.

These persons who requested assistance from the Census Bureau last year were among an estimated 20 million United States residents who are without proof of age or birthplace. The historical records of the Census Bureau provide the only acceptable source of this information for many of these people. Since its beginning in 1790, the U. S. Census has recorded identifying data for almost 350 million persons, many of them listed several times in separate censuses. The Bureau has provided copies of these records to about three and one-half million people, as legal proof of age, place of birth, citizenship, or kinship.

Persons seeking such a record for social security purposes should go to the local Social Security Office, or, for other purposes, write to the Personal Census Service Branch, Bureau of the Census, Pittsburg, Kansas, for an application form. A fee of \$3.00 is charged for a search of not more than two censuses for one person and for one copy of the information found. Additional copies cost \$1.00 each. An expedited search costs \$4.00. Expedited searches are usually completed within a few days while the routine \$3.00 search may take up to 30 days, depending upon the backlog of requests.

The personal information in the records of the 1900 and later Censuses is confidential by law and may be furnished only upon the written request of the person to whom it relates or, for a proper purpose, a representative such as a guardian or administrator of an estate. Information regarding a child who has not reached legal age may be obtained upon the written request of either parent.

**Commerce Dept. Exhibit on Display In Dallas Soon**

The United States Department of Commerce will open its 60th Anniversary Exhibit in the lobby of the Love Field Terminal Building, Dallas, Texas on Monday, August 12, 1963. The exhibit will be on display 24 hours a day and is open to the public for the week of August 12 to 19.

It is on tour to 18 cities throughout the county. The purpose of the exhibit is to give the public a better understanding of the Commerce Department's major agencies and how they serve U. S. businessmen and the American people. It was in 1903 that President Theodore Roosevelt signed the act creating the U. S. Department of Commerce and Labor, which ten years later was divided into two separate departments of the Federal Government.

The seventeen sections of the exhibit illustrate Commerce Department activities ranging from advanced underseas exploration to the use of space satellite pictures for improved weather forecasting. Included in it are models ranging from the Wright brothers' 1903 ship, lighted maps showing progress of the interstate highway system; a display of worldwide Commerce Department promotion of exports; and samples of valuable manganese found on the Pacific ocean bottom during oceanographic surveys.

U. S. Department of Commerce agencies represented in the exhibit include the U. S. Weather Bureau, U. S. Coast and Geodetic Survey, Maritime Administration, Bureau of Public Roads, National Bureau of Standards, Office of Technical Services, Patent Office, Bureau of the Census, Office of Business Economics, Area Redevelopment Administration, Bureau of International Commerce, Business and Defense Services Administration, U. S. Travel Service, and Office of Field Services.

**1964 Feed Grain Program Announced**

Major provisions of the 1963 Feed Grain Program have been announced by the U. S. Department of Agriculture and basically will be the same as in 1963.

The major change is an increase in the top limit on diversion from a farm's base acreage with an increase in rate of payment for maximum diversion. This, the USDA said, is intended to encourage producers to divert additional feed grain acres and their income.

Under the 1964 program a producer may divert as much

as 50 percent of his feed grain base acreage compared with a top of 40 percent in 1963. Those who divert from 40 to 50 percent will receive diversion payments at the maximum rate for all acres diverted. As before, the maximum acreage diversion will be 25 acres if this is more than 50 percent of the base.

Producers who divert at least 20 percent of their feed grain base will be eligible for payments computed by multiplying the number of acres diverted times 20 percent of the normal yield times the county total price support rate for the grain diverted. For acres diverted between 20 and 40 percent of the base, payments will be based on 50 percent of the normal

yield times the total county support rate. A diversion from the base between 40 and 50 percent (or 25 acres if this is larger) will earn payments for the producer of 50 percent times the normal yield times the total acres diverted times the total county supply rate. Payments may not exceed 20 percent of the value of the land diverted.

The total national average price-support levels in 1964 will be the same as in 1963, but a slightly larger proportion of the support will be made available through loans. Payments-in-kind for both diversion and the non-loan part of price support will again be made in the

form of negotiable certificates. The sign-up period for both fall and spring sown crops is expected to be early in 1964.

**Water Safety  
Alert Issued By  
Safety Ass'n.**

Austin, Tex. — The Texas Safety Association today issued a "water safety alert" warning the public of potential water hazards and citing an apparent increase in drownings.

"Drowning is the fourth leading cause of accidental death in Texas, with approximately 300 fatalities a year," J. O. Musick, TSA General Manager, said.

"Reports for the past six weeks indicate an increase in the number of drowning over the same period last year, and unless water enthusiasts start putting safety first, fatalities will continue to increase." Noting that many drownings are occurring in lakes, the safety director said anyone planning to swim, boat or water ski on a lake, should familiarize himself with the hazards of that particular body of water.

He also stressed that it is not just the persons who are already "in the water" who drown.

"Nearly two out of three drownings in the nation are non-swimming deaths — people fall into water from docks, bridges and shores. Small children step into deep water when wading and some fall out or may be thrown from boats," Musick explained.

"Of course, the first and most important thing to do to prevent drowning is for everybody to learn to swim and if you are going to enjoy water recreation with any degree of safety, this is a 'must'."

He said anyone going "near the water" should remember and practice these basic rules:

- 1) Keep an eye on small children.
- 2) Never go swimming alone.
- 3) Choose a safe place to swim, with clear water - know the depths, tides and currents.
- 4) Non-swimmers should stay in shallow water.
- 5) For the home pool or farm pond, build a fence around it with a gate that will lock to protect small children.
- 6) When launching your boat, take special precautions to see that the boat does not pull your car into the water before you can get it off the trailer.
- 7) Carry a life preserver for every person in your boat and see that it is worn.
- 8) Keep right when driving a boat and be courteous to other boatmen.
- 9) When water - skiing, stay

### RARE BIRD REPORTED IN VALLEY

Rockport — An extremely rare bird has paid a visit to Texas Magic Valley and lost his life there, according to Game Warden Raymond Davee of Edinburg.

Only July 9, two boys, Gregory Moodle and Gene Kelley, were out on their paper route in the southeastern section of Elsa. It was early in the morning when the boys found a strange looking bird dead beside the road. Game wardens identified the bird as a Jacana, a resident of Central and South America who very rarely visits Texas. They surmised that the bird had flown into telephone wires in the darkness and broken his neck.

The Jacana, sometimes known as "Lily-trotter," is built somewhat like a shore bird and has extremely long toes. He is about 8½ inches long with a deep rusty colored body and a blackish head and neck. The best field marks are the conspicuous yellow frontal shield on the forehead and the large, pale, greenish yellow wing-patches. On the elbows of the wing the bird has a short, very sharp, spur and when the mouth is opened there is a sharp spine, almost like a spear, exposed. During the fall seasons an occasional immature Jacana wanders into Texas. At this stage he is gray-brown above with whitish underparts and a broad white stripe over his eye. He is sometimes mistaken for Wilson's Phalarope but the very long toes, the lemon-yellow wing patches and rail-like flight distinguishes him from any shore bird.

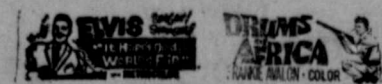

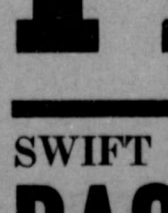
