HOW TO GET
MORE BARGAINS

In order to succeed in a truly free economic system, you have to offer a product or service that others need or want and at a price they're willing to pay.

It takes two to make a sale—a buyer and a seller. If the seller produces a shabby product or keeps the price too high, the buyer just won't buy. On the other hand, every sale made is an indication that the seller has satisfied someone's desires.

Intervention

But government doesn't see it that way. When any company satisfies a lot of people—and acquires a large share of the market in a particular field—the "trust-busters" force the company to limit its sales, or raise its prices, or diminish its service. So the customers of the company are made to suffer.

The company was supplying a product or service at a price people were willing to pay. Both buyer and seller were getting a fair shake. The only loser was the company's competitor—who couldn't provide the customer with an equally good bargain. The government's intervention means that the customer will now have to pay more or get less.

In a free society, business monopolies are not to be feared. Even a company without competition has to choose between providing good bargains (to retain its monopoly position) or "price-gouging" (which invites a competitor to come in and steal his business from his unhappy customers).

If the company finds a way to prevent any competition from entering his industry, it is an invitation for some ambitious, inventive man to produce a newer, less expensive product to do the same job. Many of our most progressive products have been created to circumvent monopolies.

Control

But governments traditionally reject such "supply and demand" laws. They try to force prices downward with rent controls, marketing quotas, anti-trust legislation, and regulatory agencies. When they do manage to keep a particular price artificially low, they prevent newer and better products from coming into existence. Because the new products could never compete with the unrealistically-low price of old product.

Governmental intervention stops progress, injures the ability of sellers to provide bargains for buyers, and is a dangerous step on the road to totalitarian control of all of our affairs. And it invariably costs us more money than the problem it intended to solve.

We should never forget that in free enterprise, the buyer must satisfy the seller to make a sale or earn a profit. The more freedom the seller has with which to satisfy the buyer's whim's, the higher standard of living we shall have. But the more government intervenes, the less opportunity the seller has to satisfy the buyer.

Possibilities

There are multitudes of bargains that could be offered, services that could be provided for us, and new products that could be invented for our benefit. Holding them back, however, are our unrealistic anti-trust laws, regulatory agencies, and welfare-state controls.

Let's repeal these backward, dictatorial roadblocks, and move forward toward the abundance that awaits the free society.

First Bale of Cotton Gets Nice Premium

Jim Rutherford of Rockwood brought the first bale of 1963 cotton to Santa Anna on July 30, but because the gin was not ready to operate, it was not ginned until Tuesday of last week. He also took the first bale to Coleman on July 31, but it was not ginned until Wednesday of last week.

This is the earliest there is any record of cotton being brought in for this county. Mr. Rutherford said he gathered the cotton from about 10 acres with the gross weight being about 2100 pounds. About the same amount went to Coleman, with the bales here weighing 450 pounds and the Coleman bale weighing 470 pounds.

The cotton was planted April 17 and just happened to be just right for the rains this area received in late May and June, then matured rapidly when the weather got so hot. Both bales were gathered by hand labor. Mr. Rutherford said he did not expect to make an average of but very little cotton this year because of the dry weather.

The Santa Anna bale brought a total of \$385.95, with the Santa Anna Co-op Gin paying 50c a pound for the cotton. The gin also ginned the bale free and paid a premium for the seed.

Drivers Urged To Use Caution With New Higher Speeds

Austin — The director of the Texas Department of Public Safety warned motorists today "not to take the new, higher speed limits too literally" when they go into effect August 23.

Col. Homer Garrison Jr. reminded that "there are a multitude of circumstances and situations under which even the old limits were too fast for safety."

"With more than two-thirds of the Texas highway system under a 70-mile-per-hour daytime maximum speed for passenger cars and 65 miles per hour at night, we wish to appeal to all Texans to exercise keen judgment and drive reasonably and prudently regardless of what the signs say. The law prohibits driving a vehicle too fast for existing conditions."

"The Department of Public Safety believes that the objective of speed legislation is to contribute to the efficient movement of traffic on the highways. We feel the new law will help to accomplish this, and our objective of enforcement is to secure substantial compliance with the speed law by all users of the rural highway. The prima facie speed limits fixed by the Legislature or established by zoning authority will be construed to be the maximum permissible speeds under normal conditions, and speeds in excess of such limits will be considered illegal."

"Our enforcement personnel will stop and initiate appropriate enforcement action against all persons observed by them to be committing clear-cut and substantial violations of the speed law."

Garrison urged motorists to be particularly cautious in assuming the higher night speed limit of 65 miles per hour. He said research by the U. S. Bureau of Public Roads shows that increasing night speeds from 55 MPH to 70 MPH doubles the accident involvement rate, and that the severity of accidents increases rapidly at speeds over 70 MPH.

"We repeat that serious problems may develop with the new speed laws unless the driving public accepts and applies them with a high degree of responsibility to themselves and their families and others," he said.

"And we would like to emphasize at this time that traffic deaths are running far ahead of last year already, with an increase of about 100 deaths. Unless we can hold the line against this trend, we will wind up with an all-time high traffic death toll in 1963."

A city license for a dog to be allowed to go unleashed in town costs \$1.00 per year, plus a vaccination for rabies. Records at the City Hall indicate that only one dog has a current license in Santa Anna.

The City is making preparations to have all unlicensed dogs picked up. The dogs will be held for 48 hours and if not claimed in that time, they will be disposed of. In order to claim a dog that has been picked up, he must be vaccinated and licensed.

Dr. J. Ray Martin of Coleman, County Veterinarian, said he would be happy to come to Santa Anna and vaccinate dogs, provided enough people were interested. If you are interested, contact the City Hall and have the secretary to add your name to the list wanting dogs vaccinated.

The dogs will begin to be picked up in the near future.

Having attended the Eastern Instruction Training Course for Rural Civil Defense in Brooklyn, N. Y., he has taken an octave part in training Texas defense.

State Capitol NEWS

Austin — Texas Youth Council's parole division will triple in the next six months or so. But the problem of trying to help "reform school" graduates become useful citizens is still great.

Until September 1, five state parole officers are responsible for some 1,800 juvenile parolees spread out over 169 counties. That's a ratio of one parole

officer to about 357 parolees, compared to national standards of one officer to 40 parolees.

Staff will increase to 10 on September 1 — a ratio of one to 178. On March 1, 1964, when five more are added, ratio will be down to one officer to 119 parolees, spread over the Lone Star State.

Biggest number of parolees is centered in big cities where the general rate of crime is always higher. More than a third of the paroled children are in Dallas, Harris and Bexar counties; another 288 in El Paso, Jefferson, Tarrant and Travis counties.

About 154 are in Nueces, McLennan, Bell and Lubbock counties.

But sizeable juvenile parole populations are centered in smaller counties, such as Cameron, Grayson, Brazoria, Ector, Galveston, Gregg, Hale, Hidalgo, Howard, Hunt, Midland, Navarro, Potter, San Patricio, Smith,

Taylor, Wichita and Williamson. Some counties only have one paroled child. But the state is responsible for every one it has "retrained."

FIRST AID

State Regulatory Loan Commissioner Frank Miskell appointed Robert C. Duke, Houston attorney, as Deputy Commissioner and General Counsel for the new state agency.

Duke formerly served as acting Securities Commissioner in the Secretary of State's securities division.

Regulatory bill takes effect on August 23. Some 2,000 loan companies operating in Texas will have to file for state licenses at the same time.

INSURANCE HEARING

A State Insurance Board hearing on proposed rules for regulating credit insurance — which pays off a man's debt if he dies; or makes the payments when he is disabled — drew a big crowd.

One controversial point was a ceiling rate of 90 cents per \$1.00 of insurance.

Some insurance company executives insisted the ceiling should be no more than 60 or 65 cents per \$100. But one spokesman thought the 90-cents per \$100 rate was too low and recommended \$1.

Some loan companies said they now give credit insurance free. They feared the proposed rules might outlaw this practice.

A second hearing with new proposed rules will be aired on September 10.

MONEY MEN

The Legislative Budget Board, lawmakers who make the Legislature's financial decisions between sessions, recommended \$4,644,000 worth of state building to Gov. John Connally.

Plans approved included one by the State Hospitals Board to equip a genetics lab and follow-up clinic on mental retardation in the State Psychiatric Institute at Houston; new dormitories for Gatesville School for Boys, Gainesville School for

Girls and Crockett School for Negro Girls; and several prison system units.

Authorization was recommended for \$25,000 worth of partitioning to provide 23 new offices in Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr's department.

But the board balked at Texas A&M University's request to spend some \$100,000 on a home — exclusive of land and furnishings — for A&M President Earl Rudder, to replace the one destroyed by fire.

A compromise recommendation of about \$60,000 for a 4,500 square-foot home was the outcome.

CITIES GROWTH FORMULA

About 200 city attorneys, city engineers and city councilmen gathered in Austin to hear a Texas Municipal League explanation of the Texas Municipal Annexation Act, which will become effective on August 23.

Annexation act sets out "extraterritorial jurisdictions" dictating the extent of a city's growth in any three-year period. For cities of less than 5,000 population, the extraterritorial area extends a half mile beyond city limits; cities 5,000 to 25,000 one mile; cities 25,000 to 50,000 two miles; cities 50,000 to 100,000 three and a half miles; and cities 100,000 and up, five miles.

But a city would not have to expand all the way around its rim. It could swing arcs or "fingers" out to "desirable areas for growth," and obtain the annual area allocation of 10 percent of its square acreage in these areas.

For example, officials of a city of 20,000 acres could annex up to 2,000 acres of "desirable" land one year; 2,200 acres the next, etc., without ever annexing undesirable new territory.

SCHOOL LAND BOARD

Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler, Governor Connally and Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr, members of the State School Land Board, make and revise leases on public school lands, including river beds, bays and inlets of the Gulf of Mexico.

Attorney General requested that he be removed from the land board. After August 23 he will be replaced by a private citizen of his choosing.

Before Carr leaves the board he will sign the deed which conveys state-owned land on Padre Island to the federal government for a national seashore.

SHORT SNORTS

Rep. Sam F. Collins of Newton asked to be allowed to serve as a state representative without pay, when he accepted a job as assistant to General Manager John W. Simmons of the Sabine River Authority.

Governor Connally appointed Hudson Davis of Borger as Canadian River Compact Commissioner, and R. Leighton McKinney Jr. of Denison, Interstate Compact Commissioner for the Red River.

The State General Revenue Fund finished July with \$19,500,000 in the black.

USDA Leaflet on Quality Control of Machine Harvested Cotton Announced

Careful management of mechanically harvested cotton is necessary to get top quality lint and seed, a new U. S. Department of Agriculture publication points out.

"Preserving Quality of Mechanically Harvested Cotton" (L-522) emphasizes the importance of maintaining cotton quality and says growers share with ginners the responsibility of producing top quality cotton.

This 8-page illustrated leaflet discusses cultural practices, defoliation, time of day to harvest, harvester operation, and loading trailers. Because cultural recommendations vary from area to area, the publication suggests that growers check with their State agricultural experiment station or county agent for advice on selection of varieties; insect, disease, and weed control; fertilizer recommendations; and irrigation requirements.

It is important for growers to have moist cotton ginned as soon after harvest as possible, the publication says. The quality of trailer-stored seed cotton can deteriorate in one day if its moisture content is 12 percent or more. Other pointers include the importance of keeping harvesting equipment properly adjusted and in good operating

condition. Single copies of the leaflet, points out B. G. Reeves, cotton ginning and mechanization specialist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, may be obtained from the Office of Information, U. S. Department of Agriculture, Washington 25, D. C.

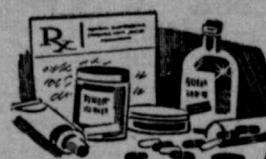

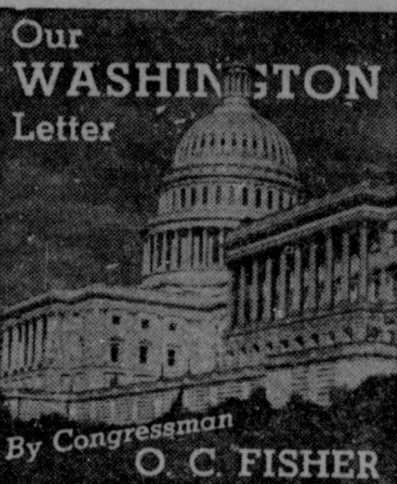

Our WASHINGTON Letter

The UNITED STATES does the strangest things at times. Now sort of "hepped" on the idea of going overboard with every possible scheme to force integration in all aspects of every-day life, we are now spreading our program to far away South Africa.

Adlai Stevenson told the UN the other day that because the USA does not like the racial policies followed by South Africa, this government would refuse to sell that nation any more military weapons.

It would seem that we would do well in this country to tend to our own business, try to solve our own domestic problems, without injecting ourselves into those of other nations. South Africa has fought on our side in several wars and has stood with us and the west in practically every contest that has developed in the United Nations. That country, instead of being a so-called neutral, is a committed country — committed to fight and die, if necessary, on the side of the free world in this great struggle against communism.

It hardly makes sense for us to now gratuitously take it on ourselves to insult a great nation in an attempt to placate Ghana and other African countries. Yet, that is just about what it amounts to.

If we were in a hot war with Soviet Russia, we can be sure that the United States would sell and give South Africa all the weapons they could use in the struggle for survival. Yet now we do the stupid thing of attempting to prevent a friendly ally from maintaining military strength when a hot war could break out at any time.

There is, however, a precedent for this. We did about the same thing in our dealings with

Portugal, except that we did not go this far. By voting against Portugal with respect to the Colonial Policies in Africa, we antagonized the valuable and friendly nation, and did it on an issue that is really none of our business.

The result is that our relations with Portugal are very strained, and there is a possibility the Portuguese may refuse to renew our arrangements in the use of the Azores.

It would seem that the United States would learn to keep its nose out of other people's business, particularly out of the business of our own loyal friends and allies.

International Trade Fair To Be State Fair Attraction

Texas International Trade Fair, virtually a world super-market, will present a super-sized array of products at the 1963 State Fair of Texas October 5 through 20 in Dallas.

Exhibits will range from the newest in machinery, gadgets, food and clothing to rare historical antiquities.

Several thousand more square feet of space have been reserved by exhibiting nations for the 1963 exposition in the World Exhibits Building than previously, according to Kenneth W. Erickson, Trade Fair manager.

Newcomer to this October's show is Canada with one of the larger exhibits. Japan again will be the largest exhibitor, with Brazil the second largest.

Israel and Sweden, not in the Trade Fair last year, will rejoin the exhibition this October.

France again will sponsor a sidewalk cafe, Le Cafe de Paris, overlooking the Esplanade and adjoining the World Exhibits Building. The cafe will be in addition to the French exhibit.

Other countries showing their newest products and travel attractions will include Italy, Germany, Finland, Belgium and the United Arab Republic.

23rd Annual REA Meeting Being Held In Houston

More than 500 rural electric leaders from all parts of Texas will meet in Houston August 14-16 for a program centered around the theme, "United for Progress."

Highlight speakers on the program will include U. S. Senator Ralph Yarborough, Congressman W. R. (Bob) Poage, and Norman Clapp, administrator of the Rural Electrification Administration.

The meeting is the 23rd annual convention for Texas Electric Cooperatives, statewide association of the rural electric systems in Texas. It will be held in the Rice Hotel.

Members will hear reports from officials of the state association and also Jerry Anderson, special assistant to the manager of the national association, the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association.

Attorney Tom Reavley of Austin, general counsel for TEC, will also be one of the main speakers.

Both attorneys for the rural electric and power use advisors will hold separate sessions devoted to discussions of their particular problems in their work with rural electrification.

Wives also will have a separate program including a style

show with Tonda Curry of Ropesville, currently Miss Rural Electrification of America, as one of the models.

Entertainment feature of the convention will be the annual banquet Thursday evening. Leaders in groups such as 4-H, FFA, FHA, Young Farmers, and Young Homemakers, will be introduced and honored at the banquet.

Winners of the top three places in a statewide contest for the best essays on the history of rural electric cooperative will also be announced at this time.

Presentation of awards to four men for outstanding contributions to rural electrification will climax the banquet program.

Members will also have the opportunity of visiting more than 400 feet of displays of electrical equipment and supplies, accounting equipment, and advertising products. Thirty-two business firms are setting up the displays.

In their business session members will elect three new members of the board of directors of TEC. Nominees for these positions are V.B. Shaw of Quitman, Raymond Hampel, Jr. of Corsicana, and Seth Kennedy of Victoria.

Members who will continue on the board are W. J. Parks of Comanche, Curtis Maynard of Navasota, W. C. Casparis of Azle, and D. L. Knight of Spur.

26 Major Crimes Committed Each Hour In Texas

AUSTIN — An average of more than 26 major crimes were committed every hour in Texas during the first six months of 1963 as crime continued to outstrip the population growth throughout the state and nation.

Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, reported that crime in the state increased 6.2 percent in the period January through June, compared to the same period of 1962.

The DPS six months report showed that murder and homicide were up 13.3 percent, rape increased 27.5 percent, robbery increased 14.8 percent, burglary 6.0 percent, theft 7.0 percent, and auto theft was up 4.4 percent. Aggravated assault, the only major crime to decrease, was down 2.9 percent.

Overall crime in rural areas showed an increase of 13.1 percent, while the increase in urban areas was 5.2 percent. By population groups, the greatest increase was 25.7 percent in cities between 2,500 and 5,000 while the largest decrease was 13.3 percent in county with under five rural population per square mile.

"The 1963 figures prepared by our Statistical Services Section," said Garrison, "means that on the average there was one major crime committed every 2½ minutes, one murder every 7½ hours, one rape every 6 hours and 12 minutes, one robbery every 2 hours and 42 minutes, one aggravated assault every 40 minutes, one theft every three minutes and 48 seconds, and one auto theft every 32 minutes."
