Dun & Bradstreet, Inc., international business information agency which has been celebrating its 125th Anniversary, has released latest statistics on the business popu-lation of Eastland County. Mr. A. J. Traditional wedding music was presented by Mrs. William Austin, organist, and Mrs. George Owens, soloist.



4-H Club News


What do you think of when ou hear 4-H? Head, Hear Hand, and Health? Or think of boys and girls feed ing and showing cooking and sewing? of these are a very ant part of the 4-H Club program — but there is more — One of the many and varied projects which a 4-H member may be interested in is an electric project. The purpose of the electric program is to develop leadership a m ong 4-H Club members and encourage the efficient use of electricity.

February 25, the County 4-H Contests will be held. If you were to visit the county contest you might see an electric team composed of two 4-H members; either boys and-or girls. The demonstration, a maximum of 12 minutes, will pertain to some phase or a spect of electricity. Charts, photographs, and other exhibit materials will be used to teach the use of electricity.

4-Hers interested in conducting a team demonstration in electricity should contact one of the Assistant County Extension Agents soon.

The 1967 edition of the Eastland county 4-H livestock show team is getting off to a thundering start. Approximately 15 individuals who will be attending major livestock shows have begun to show their livestock.

Following the Odessa show San Antonio (Feb. 10-19), Houston (Feb. 22- Mar. 5), and San Angelo (Mar. 8-12) Livestock Shows. Eastland County 4-H Clubs will have representative at each of these major livestock shows as well as at the local Gorman Youth Achievement Day (Mar. 4), Cisco Livestock Show (Mar. 9-11), and the Eastland County Livestock Show (Mar. 16-18).

2,443 Texas Families Obtain Farm Home Loans During Year

More than 2,443 Texas families - some 70 percent more than that of the previous year - during fiscal 1966 used \$16,787,304 of Farmer s Home Administration credit for construction and improvement of homes, L. J. Cappleman, the Agency's State Director, with offices at Temple, Texas, has reported.

Some \$1,733,590 of this mount was advanced directly to Texas Senior Citizens

for improved housing facilities, a 400 plus percent increase over credit extended the previous period to rural residents of 62 years or over, Director Cappleman explained.

Rural housing loans to Texas individuals other than Sen-Citizens totaled \$15,053, ior 714 during 1966 - 66 percent more than that of the previous twelve months. These loans ranged from

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small amounts for minor repairs to loans for building modest, but adequate homes. Some of the funds were used to improve or construct essential farm buildings.

"Farmers Home Administration's rural housing program has resulted in untold benefits to scores of Texas communities as well as to the hundreds of rural people involved," Director Cappleman emphasized. "That is only part of the story, for improvements made by borrowers to their homes have increased the tax base which makes it easier for local communities to finance schools, road improvements







and other needed community facilities.

More than 90,000 rural American families throughout the 50 states, the Virgin Islands and Puerto Rico have borrowed more than \$799.1 million since the program was expanded five years ago.

"It is important to note that many Farmers Hom e Administration rural housing loans are repaid ahead of schedule to the extent that payments of principal and interest throughout the nation equal 104 percent of the total amount due since the pro-gram began," Director Cappleman pointed out. "Losses on rural housing loans are less than two one-hundredths of one percent of the total loaned since the program started."

Farmers Home Admini stration housing loans are made to applicants unable to obtain credit from privat e lenders at reasonable rates and terms. They are tailored to individual needs and accompanied by assistance in farm and financial management.
