Control of Winter Grain Mites

It is almost time for farmers and ranchmen to seed small grains, says H. A. Turney, area entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The entomologist reminds that fields which have been planted in small grain for the past three to four years should not be replanted to this crop, because of the possibility of winter grain mite damage. The rotation will help to control the destructive pest, he said.

The winter grain mite builds up to damaging populations in late winter and early spring, Turney explains. The necessity of chemical control can be eliminated or decreased to a great extent by the use of rotation, he adds.


