AN OPEN LETTER TO THE TENNESSEE VALLEY

To the taxpayers of the Tennessee Valley:

Senator Goldwater's idea to sell TVA to private enterprise has stirred up a lot of resentment in your valley.

But before you jump to conclusions, consider a way by which you can capitalize on his suggestion — and increase your own take-home pay by hundreds of dollars a year. Here's how:

**Liberty Amendment Benefits**  
The proposed Liberty Amendment to the Constitution will require the Federal Government to give up every economic enterprise not specified in the Constitution. This means TVA would have to be sold to private enterprise — but it would also mean an end to foreign aid, farm subsidies and hundreds of other pork barrel projects that cost us billions of dollars a year.

In fact, the Liberty Amendment will cut more money from the Federal budget than is collected by the personal income tax. So the Amendment also provides that your personal income tax will be repealed.

Imagine: a life without income taxes!

Isn't this beginning to sound more appealing?

**End Waste**  
Present revenues to the government from corporation, excise and other taxes will more than cover the cost of national defense and other constitutional functions of government. But the waste will be gone — and with it will go the income tax.

Because TVA is exempted from paying most of your local and state taxes, your electricity bill is slightly lower than ours. You save a dollar or two a month as a result.

But wouldn't you be willing to pay the same power bill we do — if it meant having your income tax to spend as you see fit?

If you make \$6,000 per year, chances are you're paying about \$600 yearly in income taxes. At \$10,000 earnings yearly, your tax is around \$1,300. This money could help you buy your own business, own a farm, provide for your children's education, enable you to buy a new car every year.

But to get it, you have to be willing to give up the dollar-a-month you save on your light bill.

Actually, it doesn't make sense to hang onto your subsidy when you stand to gain so much. And there's no risk involved. By promoting the Liberty Amendment, you won't lose TVA unless the income tax is repealed. Just as the farmer will not lose his subsidy until he gets his entire income tax back.

**Make It Seven!**  
We all stand to gain greatly from the Liberty Amendment. It has already been approved by six states. And when you announce you're ready to trade your own subsidy for it, the rest of the country will have to fall in line with you.

So if you're ready and willing to see prosperity unleashed in America, new jobs for all who want them, constitutional limitations on government spending, and your income tax money to spend as you see fit — then get busy and make your state the 7th to approve the Liberty Amendment.

## Mountaineers Tie For Fourth In District Race

The Mountaineers ended the 1963 football season with a percentage of 417 and in a tie with Burnet for fourth place. Burnet scored 12 more points than the Mountaineers did, and gave up 47 fewer points than the Mountaineers did. Both teams had a 2-3-1 record.

## Guideline For Sales Tax Deductions

District Director Ellis Campbell, Jr. announced today that Internal Revenue will again provide guidelines for taxpayers residing in Texas for estimating sales tax deductions for 1963.

The guidelines which will be provided for taxpayers in each of the 38 states with general sales tax laws are set out in tables showing residents' average sales tax payments. Taxpayers who itemize deductions on federal income tax returns form 1040 may use the tables.

Sales tax tables will be available in the District Directors' offices on or about December 1, 1963.

## Farm Road 567 And 1176 To Be Connected Soon

Thomas Wristen Jr., Precinct No. 2 County Commissioner, said early this week that plans were being made for Farm Road 567 and 1176 to be connected sometime in the near future.

Wristen is working now on getting right - of - way deeds signed on the five pieces of property involved in the 1.3-mile project.

The actual pavement will be put in by the state through their State Maintenance Fund, but the county will be responsible for clearing the right-of-way and moving the fences back. Wristen said the county does not build the new fences now, but allows the property owner payment for the fence at the rate of \$600.00 per mile.

He said plans call for construction to get underway soon after the right-of-way deeds are signed. The new road will be from the south end of 567 in the Liberty Community to a junction with 1176 in the Cleveland Community near the home of Mrs. Manley Blanton.

## Weekly Report From Abilene Cotton Office

Completion of the cotton harvest in some localities and rain caused a further decline in sample receipts at the U. S. D. A.'s Cotton Classing Office in Abilene, Texas. According to B. B. Manly, Jr., Officer-in-Charge, receipts totaled 29,656 bales for the week ending November 15, 1963. This brought the season's total to 282,105 bales as compared to 148,034 bales at the same date last season. Mr. Manly estimates the cotton harvest in the area served by the Abilene Classing Office, to be about 70 percent complete.

The area surrounded by Dickens, Sterling, Rannels, and Jones counties composes District 2. This area accounted for about 21,000 of the samples received last week.

Grades remained about the same as the preceding week, with 9 percent of the cotton classed as White cotton, 86 percent was Light Spotted, and 5 percent was Spotted. Middling Light Spot was the predominant grade, making up 63 percent of the total samples classed.

A slight increase was noted in staple length. Three percent was called 7/8 and shorter; 64 percent was 29/32; 32 percent was 15/16; and 1 percent was 31/32 and longer.

Micronaire readings were as follows: One percent, 3.0 through 3.4; 6 percent, 3.5 through 3.9; 41 percent, 4.0 through 4.4; 45 percent, 4.5 through 4.9; and 7 percent, "Miked" 5.0 and higher.

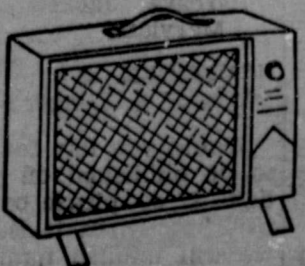

# Mounties Take 30-14 Win Over Early

The Mountaineers played their hearts out in the second half Friday night and defeated the Early Longhorns and the officials 30-14 in a tough game.

This win gave the Mounties a fourth place in season standing and a tie with Burnet for fourth place in district standings.

It is rather hard to understand why some officials apparently have it in for one team or the other. They are supposed to be strictly unbiased in their handling of the game, but two of the three on Mountaineer Field did not seem to be unbiased Friday night. This reporter has covered every game the Mountaineers have played since World War II with the exception of one game. We have seen some very poor officiating during that time, but right now we are of the opinion

the one Friday night just about took the cake. The officials continually made bad calls against the Mounties in our opinion, but some of the ones we thought were designed to hurt the Mounties the most were a pass interference call at the goal line in the second period, a clipping penalty in the third period that nullified a beautiful punt return by Jimmy Taylor and expelling Terry McIver from the game in the fourth period. Another close one was calling an attempted pass in the third period a fumble, which Early recovered and broke up a TD drive for the Mounties. Tension was running high in the game and there is little doubt but what the officials knew it. Instead of apparently agitating the situation as they did, they should have called time and talked to both teams, letting them settle down and playing the game as it is meant to be played. We do not think these officials should ever be allowed to work another game in Santa Anna.

After the officials expelled McIver in the fourth period, they should never have let tension pile up like they did, and then making it worse by expelling more Santa Anna boys. That was one of the sorriest spectacles we have ever witnessed and should cause the officials to be dismissed from the officiating business.

We can be thankful we won the game and that the Santa Anna fans did not do anything

to cast reflection on the school. Although we know there were a large number ready to, it is good that no altercations took place. The reflection would have been on the school.

Regardless of what the fans think, the officials have the authority to run the game as they see fit.

### THE GAME

The Longhorns took the kickoff to start the game, made a first down, then had to punt. McIver lost a couple of yards on his run-back and on the first play from scrimmage the Longhorns recovered a Mountie fumble on the Mountie 22-yard line. A 5-yard penalty put the Longhorns on the 17. A third period pass gave them a first down on the 4-yard line. They lost back to the 6-yard line and a fourth period pass to LH Joe Tongate was good for the TD. The pass try for extra points failed.

Freddie Cullins took the kickoff back 12 yards, to the Mountie 41-yard line. McIver, Boyet and Horne drove to the Longhorn 40 and McIver hit Cullins with a nice pass that covered the distance. Horne went through left tackle for the 20 yards, putting the Mounties ahead 8-6. Taylor took the kickoff but gained very little. The Mounties fumbled again on first down with the Steers recovering on the Mountie 34-yard line. Taylor intercepted a long Steer pass on the 4-yard line. The Mounties drove out to the 14-yard line as the quarter ended.

The Mounties made a first down, lost yardage back to their 14, gained to their 25 and punted to their 48-yard line. The Steers made 3 first downs and attempted a TD pass that the Mounties had interference call against them on. The officials put the ball on the 1-yard line and on first down Allen Driskill went through center for the TD. Bagley passed to Tongate for the 2 extra points, putting the Steers in the lead 14-8.

Cullins took the kickoff back 27 yards, but a 5-yard penalty and a big loss put the Mounties back on their 23-yard line. Failing to gain a first down, the Mounties punted to the Longhorn 16-yard line. The Longhorn failed to gain a first down and punted to the Mountie 44-yard line. With less than a minute left in the half, the Mounties pulled their famous McIver to Horne to Cullins to McIver pass that went to the 6-yard line. Cullins picked up a yard, Horne 4 yards and McIver kept through center for the TD with 10 second left in the half. The run try for extra points failed and the half-time score was 14-14.

During the half-time Sandra Davis was crowned football sweetheart and Cheryl Fitzpatrick was crowned band sweetheart. The 12 graduating senior members of the band were recognized.

The Longhorns attempted an on-side kick to start the second half, with Stanley Hartman taking the kick on his 48-yard line and returning to the Steer 43-yard line. The Mounties drove to the Steer 21, lost back to the 29, gained to the 25 and McIver connected with Horne for the first down on the Steer 10. They lost back to the 16, gained back to the 10 and attempting a pass, lost back to the 18 where the official said the pass attempt was a fumble and the Longhorns had recovered. The Steers drove to their 45-yard line and punted to the Mountie 34-yard line, with Taylor taking the ball and behind good blocking went all the way to the goal line. One official called a clipping penalty on the 34-yard line, which nullified the run-back and the TD and put the Mounties on their 19-yard line. The Mounties drove to their 44, were penalized back to their 39 and as the quarter ended McIver connected with

Cupps for a 24-yard pass.

The Mounties drove to the Steer 31, lost back to the 42 and a punt was partially blocked, with the Mounties recovering the ball on the Longhorn 27-yard line. An Early youth touched the ball and Santa Anna recovered it. With 7:55 left in the game McIver went wide around right end for the last 4 yards. Horne went through center for the 2 extra points, putting the Mounties ahead 22-14.

The Steers returned the kickoff to their 29-yard line, gained a first down on the 39, then their second penalty of the evening put them back on their 34, gambling on fourth down, they failed to make the first down and the Mounties took over on the Longhorn 39-yard line. The Mounties made a first down on the Steer 26, lost a half yard and Horne went through right tackle, cut across the field and crossed the goal line standing up. Boyet went around right end for the 2 extra points, making the score 30-14.

The Steers returned the kickoff to their 31-yard line, could not gain and punted to the Mountie 26-yard line. At this point McIver was expelled from the game and the Mounties penalized 15 yards.

They gained a first down on the 24-yard line, another boy was expelled and were penalized back to the 16-yard line. They lost a yard and a Santa Anna and Early boy were expelled, then another Santa Anna boy was expelled, making four Santa Anna boys kicked out of the game in just a few minutes. Meanwhile the clock was run-


ning and time was running out. The game ended with the Mounties in possession of the ball on their 24-yard line.
