SBA Streamlines Loan Procedures

Robert E. West, Regional Director of the Small Business Administration, Dallas, Texas, announced today a "streamlining" of SBA lending programs to speed the handling of loans to small businesses.

New procedures, tested in a pilot operation in the New England Area, have been ordered put into effect in all SBA Regional Offices throughout the country.

"By eliminating red tape, reducing paperwork, re-alignment of personnel, easing technical requirements, and acquiring the necessary financial data promptly, the SBA Office in Boston was able to reduce the time formerly elapsed between receipt of a loan application and disbursement of funds by nearly 1/3" Mr. West said.

"Because of the success of the streamlined procedures in New England, I have directed all of our Branch Offices to put them into effect immediately," the Regional Director said.

Mr. West stressed that the new procedure will in no way weaken the soundness of the SBA business lending program.

"We will continue to insist on a thorough evaluation of each loan application," he said. "We are merely eliminating some of the less essential paperwork and speeding up the operation."

Today's action is another step in SBA's continuing program to stream-line its operations to provide maximum assistance to
