



As we all know, many changes occur in the human body as we advance in age. For instance, the bones become harder and more

The eye begins to change at around 25 to 30 years of age. The crystalline lens begins to harden. This hardening

process, as with the bones, concomes most no-ticeable. When reading, the print tends

to blur and the reading matter has to be held at varying distances from the eye. This is because the lens is no longer as flexible as it was and cannot change its shape to focus for objects that are closer.

Heart diseases rank first ahead of cancer as cause of for over 60 percent of the deaths in Texas. About 30 percent are attributed to heart diseases.

The term "heart disease" actually covers a broad range of heart and blood vessel diseases. They are linked together because sooner or later they impair heart functioning ability.

Most common among cardiovascular ailments is coronary heart disease, a condition precipitating heart attacks. It is a condition of the arteries, affecting mainly middle - aged

Another well known cardiovascular condition is high blood pressure, i. e. hypertension.
Over a long period of time, increased blood pressure can cause the heart to overwork and to lose efficiency.

Rheumatic heart disease strikes another note of familiarity in the line-up of cardiovascular ailments. The chain of events leading to rheumatic heart disease has been discovered within the last few years, and with the advent of penicillin it can be proved an important disease preventive.

Research efforts for heart restoration and rehabilitation methods continue, but definite preventive measures are already







The season classing total now stands at 318,738 New Joy To samples, which is about 80 per-cent of the expected total for this season.



At present about 100 local water authorities — municipaliwater districts and river authorities — have jurisdiction over reservoirs in Texas of 5,000 acre feet or more, but lack legal authority to prescribe water recreation facilities.

Nine state agencies and nine federal agencies play some part in water recreation programming, but there is no central plan. Many have policies which conflict with those of cooperating agencies.

Babcock said, "The Governor's committee will endeavor to pull all efforts into the uniform state plan which can be operated by state agencies." Minnesota has incorporated all efforts under one agency, and the U.S. Congress is making a move in this direction on the federal level.



Mr. Gossett said he has written to trust officers of all banks throughout the state reminding them that fiduciaries can invest up to the annual limit for each separate fund, such as estate funds, personal trusts; pension, retirement, employee savings plans; corporate trusts, investment trust fund for organizations, among other.

Mr. Gossett has also written Texas employers reminding them that savings bonds make ideal Christmas gifts or an annual bonus for employees.

Both series E and H bonds return 3-3/4 percent interest to maturity. Series E bonds are appreciation bonds with interest added to cash value every six months. E bonds mature in seven years nine months and carry a ten-year extension privilege. Series H bonds pay current interest by semiannual Treasury check and mature in ten years. H bonds issued from June 1952 through January 1957 can be held an additional ten years after maturity.

Series E bonds are issued in denominations of \$25 up to \$10,-000 and are purchased at three-fourths of their value. Current interest series H bonds are issued in denominations from \$500 up to \$10,000 and are purchased at face value.


