You will need a valid poll tax receipt in 1964 to vote in the Democratic or Republican primary, elections for school trustees and city aldermen, and any special elections that might be called.

People over 60 years of age in this county do not have to have an exemption; 21-yearolds can get their exemption now or in anticipation they will be 21. They must have the exemption 30 days before any election they wish to vote in. Deadline for paying you poll tax is January 31, 1964.

The campaign continues throughout January and culminates with the Mothers' March during which some 15 million homes are visited from coast to coast. In addition, a total of 36 million mailters" are distributed nationally to inform families of the health aims of the March of Dimes and they alse serve as a means of returning contributions to local chapters. 
