





> ico. The animals sometime drift across the border from Mexico under the regulatory responsibility of the Department," explained Phillips. "It is illegal to kill bear in these counties."

> So, if you had in mind to rush out and kill a bear, check the laws first. You'll find that this animal is protected by law in most border counties. The season for hunting bears in counties under the General Laws ended December 31. In counties under regulatory authority, there is no open season.


The income reports must be filled out completely and returned to the VA by January 31, 1964, to avoid removal of the recipients name from the pen-
