People who live in glass houses shouldn't throw stones. And they also should be aware it's necessary to slide open the glass door before walking briskly through it to the patio.

An estimated 40 thousand persons each year try to walk through glass doors, glasswalls and picture windows. There are many more actually, but at least this number is injured so severely that they show up in accident records. Almost six thousand wind up in the hospital and some even die from severe cuts and loss of blood.

The problem of glass door ac-cidents has become so widespread in this era of extensively used glass in new buildings and homes that many localities have adopted building codes requiring that safety glass

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

To illustrate the increasing importance of farm mechanizafarm tractors has almost doubled and the total number of tractors on farms has almost tripled. This same trend has got been operating in all aspects last of mechanized agriculture.

Tansy Mustard Can Cut Dryland Wheat Yields

FFA Week is a fitting time to recognize the importance of farm mechanics instruction in vocational agriculture as a means of "Learning to Do and Doing to Learn."

Recent studies at the Southwestern Great Plains Field Station indicate that a single tansy mustard plant per square foot in dryland wheat fields reduced yields by about 10 per-

Agronomist A. F. Wiese and Assistant Economist J. S. Wehrly of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station staff conduct-ed the studies and developed a guide farmers can use to determine whether control of tansy mustard will be profitable. Tansy mustard is the most common weed over much of the Texas dryland wheat producing

It has been known for some time that the weed did not com-pete with wheat for moisture when controlled with 2, 4-D ester. The recent studies thus pinpointed the damage caused

by the weed in dryland wheat.

The scientists suggest that
farmers watch their wheat fields in February or March, count the weeds - on a square foot basis — and make an estimate of potential wheat yield. Then by taking the 10 percent

counted and using an assum-ed value of \$1.75 per bushel for the potential yield and figur-ing the cost of applying a half pound of chemical per acre at \$1.50 (custom rate), farmers can determine whether control of the weed would be profitable, wiese and Wehrly explain.



Austin — A new map showing he locations of fifteen artifical fishing reefs in Trinity and Galveston Bays is now available from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department offices. Under supervision of the department, these reefs have been built to grow oysters and serve as easily found fishing spots for sports fishermen. The reefs vary in size from six to thirty-three acres and each is marked with a tripod of creosoted poles. A sign giving the name of the reef and a platform carrying a navi-gation light is on each tripod.

Oyster reefs are well known to pe good fishing places. Trout, drum, croakers and other sports fish tend to congregate on reefs to feed. Fishermen are invited to make full use of these free, public fishing grounds.

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
