Fertilizing Grain Sorghum Pays

College Station — Fertiliza-tion of grain sorghum has paid dividends for the past six years at the Blackland Experiment Station at Temple, according to Dr. E. D. Cook, station agronomist

On the Houston Black Clay continuous cropping of soils, sorghum has shown grain little increase in yields from phosphorus alone, he says Nitrogen alone gave some increase in yields but the greatest in-crease was produced with a combination of nitrogen and phosphorus. Thirty pounds each of phosphorus and nitrogen in-creased yields about 700 pounds per acre, while an additional 30 pounds of each element gave 200 more pounds of grain. This last 30 pounds of each fertilizer element was just about paid for by this increase in yield, says Dr. Cook.

Results of fertilization were even more pronounced at Hillsboro on Houston soils, says the agronomist. In these tests 30 pounds of nitrogen and phos-phorus gave 1,400 pounds additional yield, and another 30 pounds of these two elements produced 500 more pounds per acre
