# Programs

Approximately 60 per cent of the Title One program, which is currently budgeted at \$106,239, has been collected by the county, County School Superintendent O. L. Stamey

reports.
The Neighborhood Y o u t h Corp program is bring in g \$157,980 in federal money into the county, Co - ordinator Tip Arther reports. The NYC program includes five other adjoining counties and is presently budgeted for helping 150 youngsters, he said.

The Title One pregram has as its goal, the enrichment of teaching, for the purchase of teaching aids and supplies. Appropiation of the Title One money is based on the 1960 census of families under certain fincial guidelines. The school district breakdown for the county is like this:

Carbon, \$2,779; Cisco, \$17,-071; Eastland, \$15,558; Gorman, \$9,613; Olden, \$6,133; Ranger, \$6,463; Rising Star, \$14,365; and Desdemona, \$2-

The present Title One program is about 85 per cent as great as last year, Supt. Stamey said. There had been some hope that the other 15 per cent might be re-instated, but apparently it will not be.

The first NYC program was initiated here Nov. 15, 1965, originally for the one county, then in May of 1966, Shackelford and Palo Pinto counties were added, with the original quota set up for 230 students to work part time and go to school. This was cut back to 150, with a total budget for the first year of \$96,000.

The current NYC program began Sept. 6, and included the original three counties, plus Throckers 6, Sephenard Young counties, for 1 0 0 students. In October, the number was increased by 50, bringing the total to 150, with \$157,980 to be supplied by the federal government, and \$38,-000 to be supplied in in-kind support in the form of supervisory costs, etc., bringing the total program to a budget


