March is Hard Month on Game

San Angelo — Birds and ani-mals in the Texas Panhandle and Trans-Pecos are now in their most critical period of the year, according to Pierce Uzzell, wildlife supervisor.

While most sportsmen are comfortably dreaming of warm spring months just around the corner, quail, deer, antelope and other wildlife are enduring cold nights with only partially filled stomaches because food grown last summer is now

scarce and hard to find. Early spring plant growth as well as early insect hatches are the salvation of wildlife populations that have endured hard winter months.

In 1963 the Trans-Pecos Area had a dry winter and wildlife be desperately awaiting early green foods to ready them for their big job of rearing young this summer.

Since the Panhandle has had frequent snowfall this winter, early spring plants should soon be available for wildlife that need to build their strength before producing a new wildlife
