### Social Security Benefits Up Over 1962 In This County

About one out of every 6 residents of Coleman County is now receiving a monthly social security check according to figures released by R. R. Tuley, Jr., Abilene, social security district

Tuley's report listed the num-ber of Coleman County bene-liciaries as 2,052 at the end of 1963, an increase of 163 over the corresponding figure at the beginning of 1963. The dollar benefit amounts total more than \$1,318,872 yearly.



Measles comes in two differ- their principal food. ent varieties. Rubella — often called 3-day measles - or German measles - is of shorter duration than rubeola. Normally, rubeola is considered more serious in nature, with one exception. When rubella occurs during the first four months of pregnancy, it is thought to trigger malformation of the unborn child.

In any case, measles may not lightly dismissed as childhood disease. Measles (rubeola) claims 34 lives per year, half of which are

under two years of age.

Quarantining a measles patient — of either variety — doesn't help the situation. A person is most contagious before the tell-tale red spots appear when symptoms simply re-

semble a cold. Recently, a vaccine for rubeola was put on the market. The American Academy of Pediatrics recommends that any child over nine months of age, who has no history of the disease, be given the vaccine.

Children with special prob-lems, such as cystic fibrosis, asthma or heart disease, are particularly advised to take ad-vantage of this protective measure. If any symptoms are suspected a physician should be contacted immediately.
