



Screwworm Threat May Loom Again

Birmingham, Ala. - The Progressive Farmer magazine de-clares in the June issue that the screwworm may reinfest the Southeast and Southwest this year unless Congress acts to provide funds for operation of the screwworm barrier in Mexi-

"The Southeast faces infestation because the only sure protection they have is a screw-worm-free Southwest," states the magazine. "In spite of a Mississippi River inspection line, screwworms re-entered the Southeast three years ago. However, not a single case has been reported in Louisiana or the Southeast since the Southwest Eradication Program got

underway." Screwworms have been successfully pushed out of the Southwest and most of the eradication operations are now in Mexico. Southwest producer and state funds which paid for half of the program have largely been expended. "Only U.S. Government has authority to operate in Mexico," The Progressive gressive Farmer emphasizes. "Screwworm eradication program, therefore, faces abandonment unless Congress acts to keep the international program going after July 1."


