highest in our history. The course of action is sim-ple: either the Congress must reduce spending to conform with the ceiling it establishes --or it must raise that ceiling to accomodate the increased

spending. The way it looks now there is not much hope for reduced spending in the foreseeable future. The legislative calendar is bristling with new spending projects. The civil rights legisla-

tion, if enacted, will expand government spending throughout the future. A Mass Transportation bill, to subsidize the cost of modernizing the roads and streets and other transpor-tation media in the big metropolitan areas, is now before Congress. The first year it would cost a half billion, and no telling how much after that. A half-billion dollar salary






