### WHAT IS A LEADER?

A leader is a man who acts upon his conviction — who has the courage to step out and be himself, the man he knows himself to be — who refuses to sit quietly and allow evil to dominate his life.

A leader is a man who turns to himself for his strength, his security, his daily bread — and who would never turn to government for help under any circumstances, knowing that all government can offer is what has been taken away from others.

A leader is a man who changes people by example, not by force. He never volunteers advice, nor does he advocate laws to require others to conform to his standards. Instead, he proudly lives his own philosophy of life, and those who see and understand will follow and emulate him.

The leader is the opposite of the politician or military man who uses the power of government to compel others to conform — and thus the widespread use of the word "leader" with regard to politics is totally inappropriate.

#### You

Who is the real leader — the man to show the way for you — to give you the inspiration and direction to step up to a higher and more productive existence?

#### You are!

You have within you the strength, the courage, the wisdom, the talent and the ambition to be a leader. You have the capacity to change the course of the world — right where you are now.

You do not need to acquire the attributes of leadership — you need only to realize them; they are already within you.

When you get acquainted with yourself — when you begin to understand the powerful energy within you — when you begin to ask "What is it I believe?" instead of "What do others believe?" — when you take your principles down from the shelf and apply them to your daily life — then you will be as great a leader as any man who ever lived.

A committee composed of Albert F. Brown, Elgean Harris and Ed Hartman was appointed to study the possibilities and appoint a Scoutmaster and assistant.

Albert Brown, minister of the Northside Church of Christ, accepted the appointment as Scoutmaster. Bill Day was appointed as his assistant. Others in town will be requested to act in an advisory capacity to the group.

Boy Scouts are boys between the ages of 11 to 14. The Explorer Troop is composed of boys 14 to 18. It is hoped that both groups can be organized and the complete Scouting program carried out here.

Parents of boys in this age bracket and the boys themselves are requested to begin thinking about the organization and making plans to attend the first meeting, which will be announced soon.

## Bangs To Get Housing Project

Public Housing Regional Director Marshall W. Amis, Fort Worth, announced approval of a Federal loan which will provide for the construction of 20 low-rent homes at Bangs, Texas (967 population, Brown County, 130 miles southwest of Fort Worth). Eight of the homes are scheduled to be designed and built specifically for elderly persons.

Average construction cost for the new homes is estimated at \$8,493 each, including equipment.

Construction is to be undertaken by the Housing Authority of the City of Bangs, which awards all contracts on the development.

The loan, totaling \$222,948 together with interest, will be repaid by the Local Housing Authority from the proceeds of the sale of its long-term bonds to private investors.

In addition to construction and equipment funds, the loan will provide funds for site acquisition and improvement, utilities, planning and design fees, space for Local Authority management and maintenance, interest on loan, and administrative costs.

The contract between PHA and the Housing Authority of the City of Bangs provides also for annual contributions by the Federal Government to help keep rents within the means of low-income families.

The 20-unit low-rent project is part of a long-range program developed by the City of Bangs to eliminate slums and blight there. This "workable program" is a prerequisite before Federal assistance for public housing may be made available to a community. Bangs is also eligible for other types of Federal Urban Renewal assistance in carrying out its civic improvement program.

## Water Shortage Hurts Hatchery

San Angelo — Despite chronic water shortage in the San Angelo Hatchery, 375,000 bass fry have been delivered this year to all major lakes in this area, reports Hatchery Superintendent Al Pettit.

Since the Hatchery's water supply from Lake Nasworthy was cut off in 1963, auxiliary pumps have been used to pump water into five of 20 existing hatching ponds maintaining partial production.

Another 300,000 bass fry will be distributed soon in west Texas as lakes increasing hatchery production to 675,000 fry this year.

# State Capital NEWS

Austin, Tex. — A study of the recent party primaries and runoff elections reveals that the number of Republican candidates on the upcoming General Election ballot, in the grassroots area, will strengthen the ever-growing trend toward a complete two-party state. For example, 18 Democratic

nominees for sheriff will face Republican opponents in November.

Also, the Republican party is engaged in one county judge race (in Lubbock County); seven races for county attorney; two for county clerk; 12 for county tax assessor; two for county superintendent of schools; and 78 for county commissioner.

GOP also has candidates for most top state posts and for more than half of the 150 House of Representative posts. In addition George Bush will carry the Republican banner in the U. S. Senate race against incumbent Democrat Ralph W. Yarborough.

### WATER POLLUTION

Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr's opinion committee on the oil-field-waste disposal question may postpone its decision meeting indefinitely now that Superior Oil Company has filed suit against the Texas Water Pollution Control Board, asking for a declaratory judgment against the agency.

A decision by former Atty. Gen. Will Wilson ruled that the board has jurisdiction over disposal of oilfield wastes under the Water Pollution Control Act passed by the 1961 Legislature.

Railroad Commission asked Carr to issue a new opinion after a group of oil companies raised strong objections to the board's regulatory actions. Superior's filing of the suit may change the picture entirely on any new opinion.

### CONNALLY HONORED

Gov. John Connally returned from the national Governors Conference in Cleveland, Ohio, with an important new appointment. His selection as first chairman of the Democratic Governors Caucus was a unanimous one by the 50 Democratic state chief executives.

Reportedly, Connally also was given some consideration for chairman of the 1965 Governors Conference, although he is in his first term. The governors will hold their first major caucus just before the National Democratic Convention in Atlantic City, N. J., during August.

### NATIONAL GUARD CONCERNED

Texas National Guard Association expressed concern over reports that U. S. Department of Defense would stop logistical support to the so-called "reinforcing reserve."

These units, said NGAT, would provide a mobilization base on which the country would build its force in event of large-scale war.

Texas' 49th Armored and 36th Infantry divisions are both part of this "reinforcing reserve," as is the 90th Reserve Division.

### MANUFACTURING PLANTS TOTALED

Texas had a total of 10,325 manufacturing plants which added \$6,400,000,000 of value by processing raw materials into finished goods in 1962, according to the "Annual Survey of Manufacturers", recently released by the Bureau of Census.

Figures represent an addition of \$589,000,000 capital expenditure for new plants during a single year. Some 500,000 plant workers earned a total of \$2,700,000,000 for the year, while 350,000 production workers earned \$1,600,000,000.

Food processing was the largest employer with 80,239 employees. Biggest investment was made by the chemical industry, with \$167,000,000 in new capital expenditures. The petroleum refining industry spent \$155,000,000 for plant construction and improvement.

### RAILWAY AUTHORITY

U. S. Representative Henry B. Gonzales has asked support from Governor Connally, Lt. Gov. Preston Smith and House Speaker Byron Tunnell on his recently introduced bill which aims at creating a multi-state railway authority for Texas.

New Mexico, Arizona and California.

Gonzales told them, "This is truly a states' rights program. States involved would jointly investigate and determine their own needs in the area of passenger rail transportation. He further stated that "In my judgment, passenger rail transportation has not been adequately developed and is not presently competitive with other modes of transportation — particularly in the Southwest."

### FIRE INSURANCE

After July 1, it will be illegal for an insurance company to charge less than 6 percent interest per year on delayed premium payments for fire insurance, a new State Board of Insurance ruling decrees.

Several years ago, the board issued this same rule, but withdrew it when an objection was made by a company which charged no interest at all for deferred payments. An attorney general has held on two previous occasions that the board has no authority to set minimum interest rates on delayed payments, but Attorney General Carr has advised the board to take a new tack.

However, litigation is entirely possible on the part of insurers who would prefer to deviate from the ruling by charging less than the new minimum.

### APPOINTMENTS ANNOUNCED

Governor Connally named Tom Pegues of Mineola and Charles T. Wickersham of Orange to the board of directors of the Sabine River Authority. He reappointed Gus Orsborn Jr. of Emory. Appointments extend until July 6, 1969.

Col. Homer Garrison Jr. has chosen Norman V. Suarez of Austin as legal counselor for the Texas Department of Public Safety. He succeeds the late Bill Kavanaugh of Round Rock.

### TRIAL PUBLICITY EXPLORED

Representatives of Texas' four major press associations met here with State Bar officials for the first of a series of discussions about news coverage of trials.

Texas Press Association, Texas Daily Newspaper Association, Texas Associated Press Managing Editors Association, and United International Managing Editors Association participated. Talbot Rain of Dallas served as chairman of the panel.

Future conferences on the subject will be conducted for radio and television broadcasters and law enforcement officials.

### COURT CASE ARGUED

The State of Texas has asked the Texas Supreme Court to reconsider its decision that the Sunday closing law does not prevent customer buying any article of merchandise on Sunday if they sign emergency certificates.

### EMPLOYMENT PICTURE


Texas Employment Commission reports that in April total unemployment declined for the third straight month, some 39,300 jobholders increased the employment total to 3,590,000. Farm employment rose 17,800 to reach 309,700 by mid-April as

seasonal workers were hired to plant a variety of row crops. This brought the total of seasonal workers to 105,800 or 3,500 more than at this time in 1963.

\$997,147,000 was paid by social security as monthly benefits in Dec. 1963 to 14,715,400 retired

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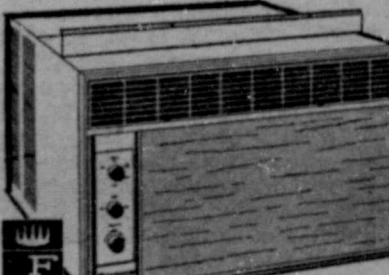

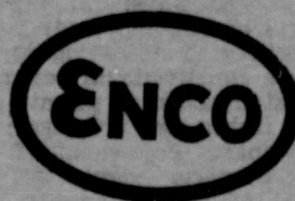

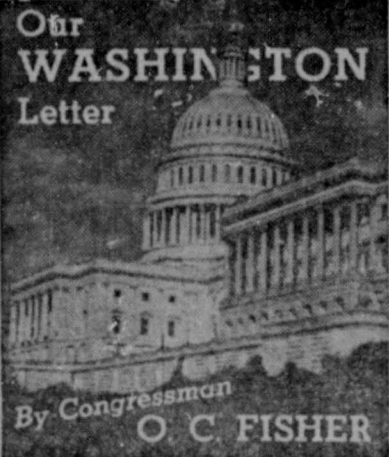

**THE SENATE MADE HISTORY** last week when by a 4-vote margin the so-called Civil Rights bill was cleared for final passage.

Twenty battle-weary southern democrats, aided by a few from border states and only six Republicans (including Senator Goldwater), went down to defeat after holding the line against the radical measure for 2½ months.

Senator Richard Russell of Georgia, who led the southern forces, even in defeat emerged as the nation's leading champion of freedom and constitutional government.

Border state Oklahoma's two Senators voted for the bill on the cloture test. So did Senator Anderson from the border state of New Mexico. But Anderson's vote was off-set by the other Senator from New Mexico — Senator Meacham who voted with the southerners. The two Texas Senators also split — Yarborough voting for cloture and Tower lining up with Russell and Co.

Early passage is now assumed. This is election year, and the Negro bloc vote has a tremendous appeal to the politicians.

Described as "the most liberal package bill ever proposed in the Congress," the measure contains 7 bills lumped into one, each advancing the philosophy of the modern-day liberal. As the answer to the liberal's dream, the proposal (1) concentrates unprecedented power in the federal government; (2) restricts individual freedom in a dozen ways; (3) expands federal bureaucracy; (4) makes a mockery of states' rights; (5) ignores constitutional restraints against invasion of private property rights and privileges; (6) subordinates enjoyment of private property rights to the whims of federal agents; and (7) casts Uncle Sam in the role of deciding who may be hired or fired in many stores and factories.

Regardless of what may be said for or against the bill, America will be quite a different place after its passage. For example, Mrs. Murphy, the widow who converts her small home into a guest house as a means of eking out a living, will run a dangerous risk if she refuses to rent a vacant room to a suspicious traveler who knocks on her door at 2 o'clock in the morning — provided the applicant is a Negro. If she is reported she may have to go to jail as a result.

**TSCRA Directors Ask For Beef Import Legislation**

Bay City — Directors of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association meeting here today passed a resolution strongly supporting legislation to restrict beef imports to reasonable levels.

The resolution reaffirmed the Association's previous position of strong support for legislation now under consideration by Congress which would restrict future foreign importations of beef to the average of the five immediately preceding years. This would be about seven and one-half percent of domestic production.

Fred Wulff of Brady, TSCRA president, emphasized that beef imports are a threat not only to the cattle industry but to the economy of countless communities and related industries.

The resolution pointed out that the Association applauds and pledges its cooperation to the efforts of groups such as President Johnson's team of ranchers, feeders, packers and government officials which are engaged in efforts to develop outlets for American beef in the European market. However, the Association is convinced that these programs, as valuable and important as they are, will not provide a total, immediate or long term answer to the problems facing the domestic beef cattle industry.

In other action, the TSCRA directors passed a resolution opposing the proposed USDA regulation that would permit frozen semen to be imported into the United States, declaring that it had been proven that Foot and Mouth and other livestock diseases could be

brought into this country through this semen.

The cattlemen also were brought up-to-date on the status of the screwworm eradication program. Dolph Briscoe Jr., of Uvalde, president of the Texas Animal Health Research Foundation said that on Feb. 14 it had been declared that eradication was complete and the program now was one of preventing reinfestation. He said this makes it an International program and as such it could be carried on only by the Federal government.

However, financing of the program remains a problem. "It is my hope and belief that producers will not again be asked to contribute," he said. "But if this is asked, I believe that it behooves all in the livestock industry to lend support to a statewide meeting where a program of action could be planned."

**Snooping Snake Scares Scouts**

When a Parks and Wildlife Department information-education officer showed a wildlife program to 150 Camp Fire Girls on Lake Fannin near Bonham, the cast of characters almost came to life.

During the slide sequence on poisonous snakes, a particular picture of the copperhead snake was spotlighted at length, and was thoroughly discussed. Returning to their cabins, some of the girls almost stepped on the real-life counterpart of the reptile.

Some thought the snake came to see the show. Others wondered if it was all part of the act. Never was a snake better illuminated by flashlight for adults to safety climax the grand finale.

**All Texas Endangered By Screwworm**

Mission — Screwworms penetrated into central and west Texas during May for the first time this year and are now in an excellent position to swoop into any area of the state where farmers and ranchers are not watching and treating animal wounds.

Screwworm eradication officials warned that infestations have been reported as far north as Coryell County in Central Texas and as far west as Presidio County in the Big Bend.

The number of cases has remained relatively low, with only 36 cases reported in May as compared to 451 a year ago.

However, with many livestock producers failing to take adequate precautions in handling their animals and weather conditions favorable for screwworm development prevailing over most of the state, the insect could easily spread into any area of Texas, eradication workers said.

Emergency eradication measures initiated wherever a screwworm infestation is reported are credited with keeping the native fly population down. Large numbers of flies, reared and sexually sterilized in the Mission plant, are dispersed in areas where infestations are discovered. Sterile flies mating with fertile female flies prevent offspring from being produced. Campaign workers also spray livestock in infested herds and flocks to prevent further infestations.

These measures are started only after a sample collected by a producer has been positively identified as screwworms at the Mission laboratory. Handy collection kits are available through county agricultural agents' offices for producers to use in collecting and mailing larvae specimens.

Stockmen can also aid the program by treating animal wounds and spraying their livestock before they become infested, eradication officials say. Spray solutions containing Corral or Korlan will give protection against other external parasites as well as screwworms, they pointed out.

**Finding Lost Arrows**

### Antelope Aerial Count Underway

San Angelo — A low-flying light airplane skims the ridges and zooms low over the plains day after day now as the annual antelope aerial counts are underway in the Trans-Pecos.

The census, all preliminary to setting regulations for fall harvest, will be completed by July 1. The counts provide information on herd conditions, distribution and reproductive success in addition to the number of bucks available.

Once tallies are complete, antelope hunting permits will be distributed among landowners on whose property antelope herds occur. Landowners may then issue hunting permits to hunters at their own discretion.

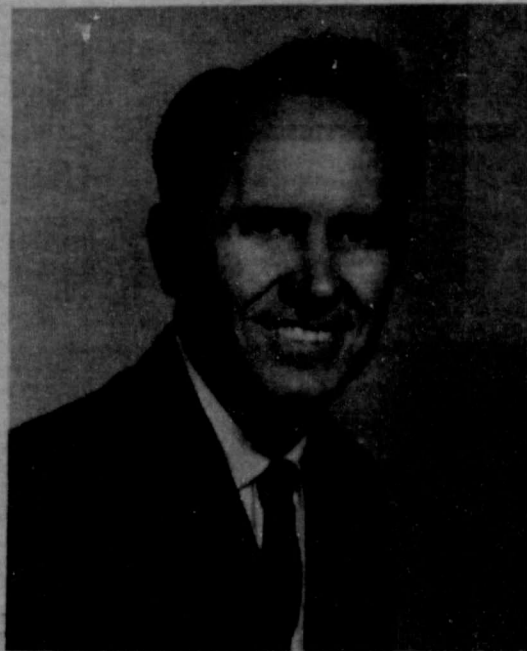

### Wild Animals Not For Pets, Say Wardens

Austin — Warnings that individuals who catch young wildlife for pets or harm protected birds will be prosecuted, have been issued by the law enforcement division of the Parks and Wildlife Department.

"We get complaints every day that persons have been picking up young of the wild, particularly fawns," says J. B. Phillips, coordinator of law enforcement for the Parks and Wildlife Department. "This is strictly against the law and wardens have been instructed to make arrests and file cases."

Every day complaints come in that fawns have been picked up, some of them when the mother deer is close by. He pointed out that the wild animal usually takes care of itself much better if left alone. Permits are required for raising wildlife in captivity and the permit must be held before the animal is captured.

Numerous arrests have resulted from pictures appearing in newspapers of persons displaying a baby animal. This is strong evidence which stands up in court when cases are filed.
