





## Some Claims Are **Denied By Social Security Offices**

"More than once I have been asked, "Does everyone who ap-plies for social security benefits get paid?" says R. R. Tuley, Jr., Abilene district manager for the Social Security Administration. "The answer, of course, is 'no', something diffi-cult at times to say to someone who believes he is due payment.'

"However, the Social Security Administration has an obliga-tion to the public," Tuley went on, "particularly to the contributors to the social security trust funds, to make certain that benefits are paid only to persons entitled to them. The fact that a claim is denied re-flects no discredit upon persons who file in good faith and make no attempt to deceive or mis-lead the Administration."

"We have other protective re-sponsibilities," he added. "We must make sure that benefits paid to one person for the use of another are actually used to benefit the other person. This situation arises in several ways. A minor child, or an incompetent adult may not have a parent to act on his behalf. We are careful in selecting someone to act as payee in such cases. Once a person is selected, he is informed of his responsibility in properly expending funds for the use and benefit of the child or incompetent adult. We do not just start the payments and then forget the matter. Periodic checks are made to make sure the funds are handled properly and benefit the claimant.



Q - Can a veteran be paid an additional amount of compensation for a dependent parent? A - Yes. If service-incurred disabilities are rated at 50 percent or more. There is no additional allowance payable by reason of a dependent parent if the veteran is receiving pension for disability not the result of service.

Q - Has World War II entitlement expired for GI home loans?

A - Not for all World War II veterans. Entitlement may be used for ten years after discharge plue one additional year for each 90 days of active wartime duty. However, all World War II entitlement does expire on July 25, 1967.

Q - I am receiving pension from the VA, and must report my income each year. In March I sold some property. Should I keep the figures on this sale to report at the end of the year? A - No, this should be reported at once to the VA Regional Office that has your records. Any increase in income from that estimated at the be-ginning of the year should be promptly reported to avoid possible overpayment. Q — Since the Civil War is

now 100 years ago and all the veterans on both sides are dead, how come more than 1,000 widows are still alive to collect pensions?

A - Many of these old veterans married women many years their junior.

Q — Are veterans of World War II and the Korean Conflict entitled to the same pensions as World War I veterans? A - Yes, the basic require-


ments for payment of pensions apply equally to all veterans of World War I, World War II and

the Korean Conflict. Q — Can I allow my annual GI insurance dividend to re-main on deposit to meet future premium?
