Santa Anna Burglary Fails, Suspects Arrested

Alertness and quick action by two Santa Anna officers Friday night, August 7, prevented what could have been, in the words of Sheriff John Smith, "a very serious thing."

Late Friday night, Santa Anna city night watchman Jim Lovelady noticed a back door at Harvey's Grocery, corner of First Street and Wallis Avenue, standing open a short time after he checked the store. His approach frightened off the would-be burglars, and after spotting their car some distance down the alley behind the store, he notified Deputy Sheriff Nick Buse, who in turn contacted Sheriff Smith.

Lovelady and Buse staked out the suspected automobile, and a short time later apprehended Larry Lee Jones, of Coleman, owner of the car, as he attempted to recover it. Jones was taken to Coleman County jail by Sheriff Smith, where he implicated J. D. Templin and Tommy Jackson, both of Coleman. Templin and Jackson were arrested later in Coleman, after having walked back to that city from Santa Anna by way of the Santa Fe Railroad tracks.
