Point Rows

We drove down to Waco this past Saturday and on the way back some mechanical trouble in our vintage Plymouth stationwagon necessitated a stop-over for repairs in Gatesville. While we were waiting, we struck up a conversation with a fellow who was also waiting for the garage to get through with his car. Turns out he was born in Eastland County, and was quite familiar with Santa Anna and this part of the state. He used to know a former editor of **The News**, one Dan Boone (not the same one who "cilled a bar" we hope) who edited this paper around 1909. He also recalled Sam Collier, who had tried to sell him a farm near Santa Anna at one time.

The man's name was Norman Fleming if we caught it right (the rain was coming down in sheets and the garage had a metal roof, so we couldn't hear too well), and he gave us a copy of a booklet he had with him. The booklet was distributed by the Gatesville bank, and it was a pictures-and-text history of the city. He also told us about his work at the state reformatory there in Gatesville, and if he is typical of the people who work with the boys there, the school is fortunate. It was obvious from his comments that he was very much concerned with the present and future wellbeing of the boys.

We spent an interesting couple of hours talking with this gentleman during what could otherwise have been a dull lay-over. We're sure glad Santa Anna is as famous as it is, nearly everybody knows enough about it to talk about it.

During the jaunt to Waco, we needed to run over to Groesbeck, about 40 miles to the east, Saturday evening. It was raining so hard that we were forced to stop three times due to lack of visibility, and much of the rest of the trip was driven at speeds around 30. After we got to Groesbeck it rained an estimated two inches in about the two hours we were there. We just knew Santa Anna was getting a good soaking. Soon as we got back, we rushed to the rain gauge and found that our fair city had received a total of only seven-tenths of an inch during the weekend. We think there is some discrimination going on somewhere, and suggest a clause in the next civil rights bill stating that rain has to fall in equal amount everywhere. In fact, maybe we should get a special bureau set up for that purpose, call it the Equal Amounts Commission, with the power to withhold Federal funds from areas which get more than their fair share of rain.

Mrs. H. B. Monroe, our neighbor across the street, called Tuesday morning to tell us she had found a set of false teeth (lowers) in her backyard. We had taken a couple of our beagle pups over to visit Mr. and Mrs. Monroe for a few minutes Monday evening, and Mrs. Monroe wondered if one of our hounds was either using false teeth or had found the plate and carried it over her backyard, although where a dog would find a set of false teeth none of us could figure out. Anyhow, if you are missing a lower plate, (Mrs. Monroe reported that they were a nice looking set of teeth) call Mrs. Monroe at PB-3893.

Santa Anna Junior Rodeo To Be Held For Library

Final plans are being made for the Labor Day Junior Rodeo, to be held at Buddy Neff Arena, north of Santa Anna, and sponsored by the City Library Board. Fifteen junior events are planned, including calf riding, steer riding, barrel racing, cow milking, stump races, cow riding, calf scramble, rescue race, and boot scramble. Adult events will be a cutting horse contest, calf roping, and team tying. Probably the feature event of the day, will be the teacher-preacher goat sacking contest. There is no age limit in this two-man team contest.

Local organizations represented on the City Library Board include the City of Santa Anna, PTA, Epsilon Sigma Alpha Sorority, Self Culture Club, Garden Club and the school system. The fund raising event will be to help pay for redecoration of the Library Building.

The Labor Day Rodeo will begin at 1:00 p. m. Monday, September 7, and admission prices will be 50 cents for adults and 25 cents for children. Entry blanks will be available soon, with junior event entries to be in by September 5, and adults entering upon arrival.

It has been many years since Santa Anna has had a rodeo, and it is hoped that all local and area people will plan to attend the one on Labor Day, a library spokesman said.

Coleman County Youth Compete In Exciting Events

The ninth annual Coleman County Junior Rodeo will get underway Thursday, August 20, with a parade in downtown Coleman beginning at 5:00 p. m. Rodeo performances will start at 8:00 o'clock each night, Thursday through Saturday. More than 150 entrants are expected, according to Stanley Blackwell, senior president of the sponsoring organization.

For the first time this year, a rodeo stock producer will furnish animals for the competition. Harold Heath, Grosvenor producer, is scheduled to handle this chore.

Daily parades will be held, starting at 5:00 p. m., and everyone is invited to ride in the parades. Presiding over the parades and rodeo performances will be this year's Junior Rodeo Queen, Leta Faye McClure, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H. C. McClure, of Shields.

Purpose of the annual event is to obtain funds to provide scholarships. To date, more than \$3,000 has been granted in scholarships to seven recipients. Winner of this year's scholarship will be announced during the last performance, Saturday night. Each scholarship is valued at \$500.

Among the events scheduled are bareback bronc riding, ball riding, calf roping, pole bending, ribbon roping, girls barrel racing, boot scramble, and steer riding.

The placings of the winners were announced at the Annual Membership Meeting of Texas Electric Cooperatives, Inc., statewide association of the rural electric systems.

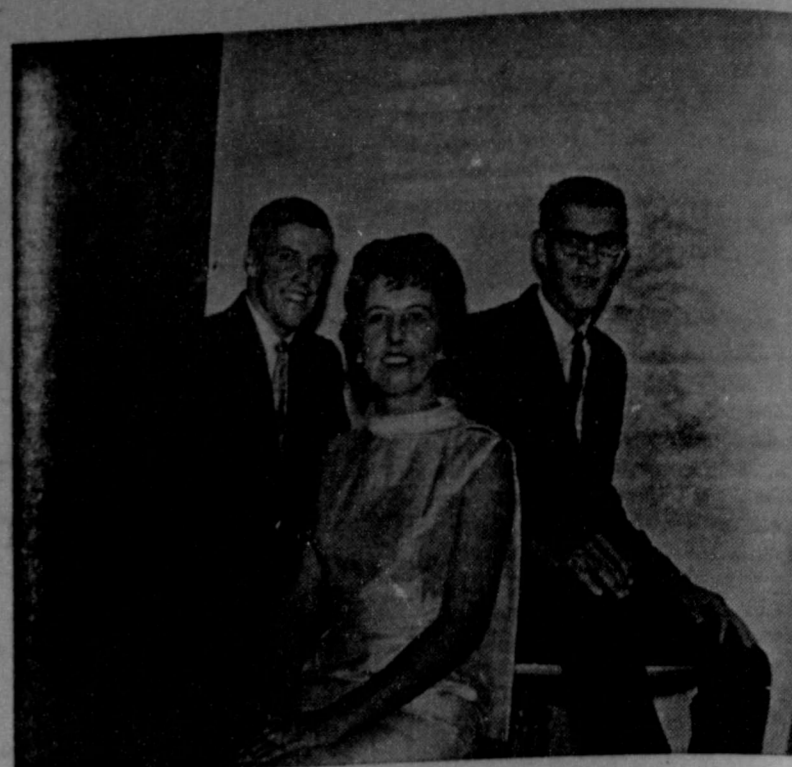

Cattlemen Plan Sale For Children

The annual Cattlemen's Roundup for Crippled Children is now underway. This event, which was started in 1961 by Coke County rancher Conda Wylie, is a principal source of support for the West Texas Rehabilitation Center, of Abilene, furnishing about one-third of the annual funds needed by the Center.

The Center, a private, nonprofit organization, serves about 1,300 patients, with about 200 receiving daily treatment. It is dedicated to rehabilitation of the handicapped, including victims of polio, strokes, cerebral palsy, muscular dystrophy, multiple sclerosis, and other neurological and orthopedic disorders.

The Roundup works like this: Cattlemen donate a calf, colt, or some other type of livestock to be donated, which is collected and transplanted without charge to the site of the sale. All types of livestock are accepted, and the donor will receive a receipt for the sale value of the animal, making the donation completely tax deductible.

Cattle and horses will be sold in Abilene on Saturday, September 26, at the Abilene Auction Company. Sheep will be held in Coleman on Monday, September 28, at the Coleman Auction Company. No commission is charged on these sales by the auction companies.

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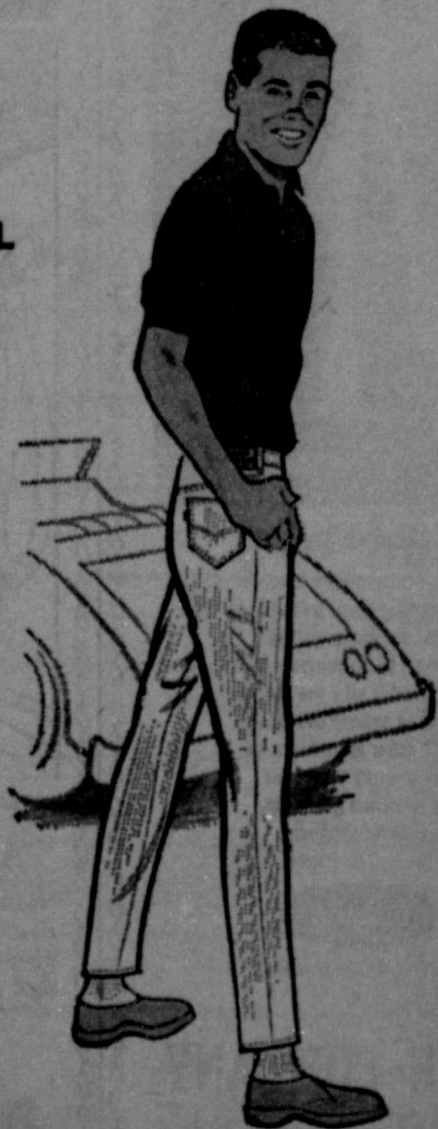

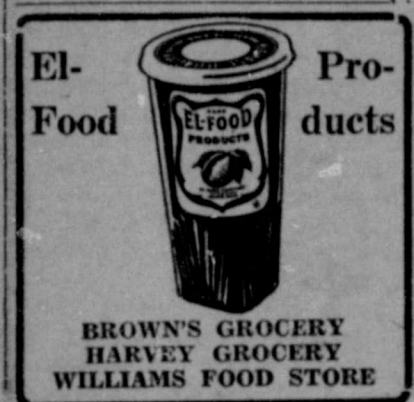

State Police Seek Young Men For Training, Career

Opportunity for an advanced education with a regular monthly income while preparing for a career in outstanding public service as a patrolman is being offered by the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Fifty young men who can qualify will be selected to attend school at the Department of Public Safety Law Enforcement Academy in Austin. Upon graduation they will fill vacancies in one of the Department's four uniformed services — Highway Patrol, License and Weight, Motor Vehicle Inspection, or Driver Licensing.

Examinations will be given on August 8, September 12, and October 10. Applications for these examinations must be received by 5 p. m. on the Mondays preceding these dates.

Only young men between the ages of 21 and 35 will be accepted as applicants. Full information can be obtained by contacting any patrolman or the nearest DPS station.

Col. Homer Garrison Jr., Director, urged interested young men to submit applications early to insure enrollment and to allow time for processing.

The four-month school will begin on November 19. Courses include 95 subjects which consume some 800 hours of classroom and other activities. Students will receive a broad education, ranging from law enforcement and investigation to table manners and from physical conditioning to the art of professional driving.

While in training, students earn \$375 per month. Upon graduation they become commissioned officers and receive salaries ranging from \$438 to \$453 per month, depending on branch of service. In addition, they receive longevity pay of \$10 per month extra for each five years of service up to a maximum of \$50 per month. Promotions are given on the basis of annual competitive examinations.

Other benefits include two weeks paid vacation, 12 or more

holidays each year as provided by the Legislature, 12 days per year sick leave which may accumulate to a maximum of 36 days, retirement system based on age and/or years of service, social security benefits, travel expenses when away from station as prescribed by law, group hospitalization and life insurance plan (optional), uniforms and the necessary equipment to perform duties.

"Each patrolman answers the call to serve with the opportunity to participate in a constant developing effort to curb the dual menace of increasing crime and traffic accidents," Garrison said. "He becomes a part of the law enforcement team which is dedicated to the task of holding the line against these evils which sap the strength of our state and nation."

To qualify as a student-patrolman, applicants must be not less than five feet, eight inches tall; not less than two pounds nor more than three pounds per inch of height; sound physical condition; 20-30 vision without corrective lenses; cannot be color blind; must have a high school education or the equivalent; and must be a United States citizen and a resident of Texas for at least one year immediately prior to date of application.

Milk is plentiful and listed as one of the week's best food buys. By adding fresh fruit purees or canned juices as well as ice cream to it, milk becomes a filling, nutritious and inexpensive snack or addition to any meal.

The dry weather is continuing to put plenty of fresh beef in meat counters. Among some of the more favorite beef buys are rib cuts, chunks, rounds and loins. Smoked hams and picnics are also showing good trends; as are fryers.

An excellent plum crop this year will make plums an inexpensive snack and dessert item for many tables. Prices of grapes are down and more blueberries are coming out of Michigan, so

plenty of fresh fruits should be eaten during the hot weather. Overlapping supplies of celery and lettuce are making these vegetables good buys while most others have only fair to good choices.

During summer months, the homemaker especially needs to be concerned about the purchase, storage, preparation and use of fresh fruits and vegetables to get the most from her food dollar.

Proper use and storage combined with careful buying practices can hold food nutrient losses to a minimum and provide the family with more nutritious and attractive meals, says Mrs. Clyatt.

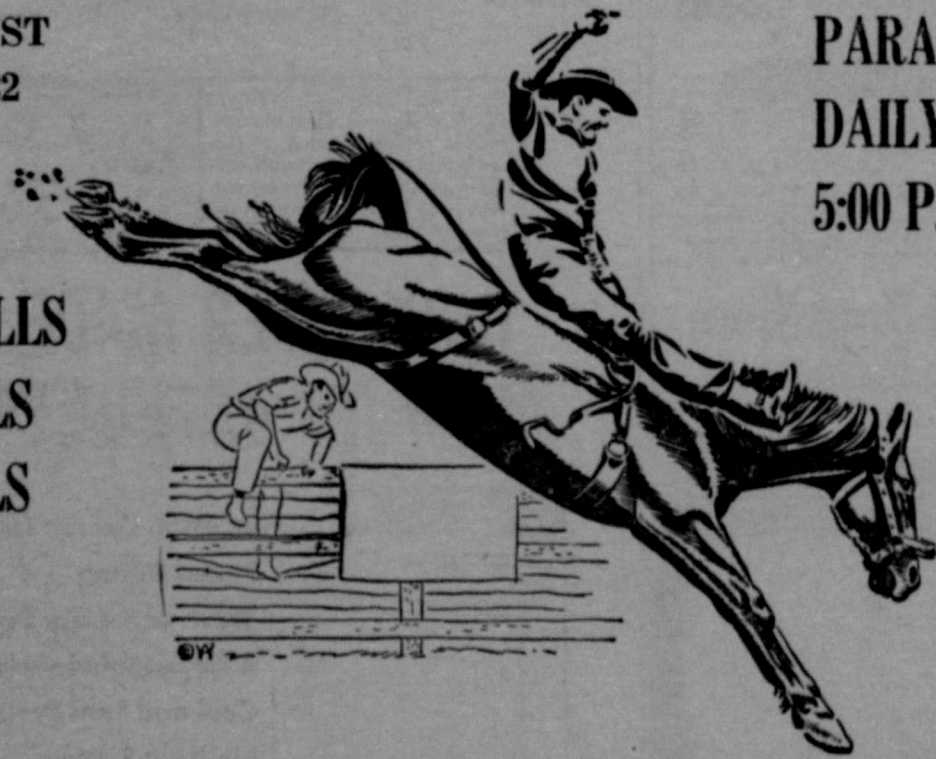

Santa Fe To Offer Special Fare Reductions Next Month

Major off-season reductions in round-trip passenger fares will be made by Santa Fe Railway from September 15, 1964 through April 30, 1965, Ernest S. Marsh, president, announced.

Round-trip fares from Houston to Chicago for coaches under the new rate will represent a savings of \$14.55, and a savings of \$18.40 for first class; Galveston to Chicago will repre-

sent a coach savings of \$15.20, first class of \$19.15. Fares between Houston and Los Angeles will represent a savings of \$24.63 in both coach or first class.

Dallas or Fort Worth to Chicago and return will represent a coach savings of \$11.70 and first class savings of \$14.80. Round-trip passengers from these points to Los Angeles or San Francisco will have savings ranging from \$17.65 to \$26.08.

Similar savings, averaging a reduction of about 20%, will be effective between most points on the railroad. Tickets so sold will be good on all trains every day.

The plan is similar to one introduced between January 10 and April 30 this year.

"The interest shown by the

public, as evidenced by many favorable comments, leads us to believe that further tests of the plan on a long-range basis are warranted," Marsh said. "As the traveling public becomes more aware of the bargain these fares represent, we believe we will show an increase in such revenue during the off-season when our trains do not run to capacity."

Passenger business has been very good this summer, Marsh said, with passenger count on transcontinental trains during June and July running nearly 8 percent ahead of last year. Advance reservations are also running ahead of last summer.

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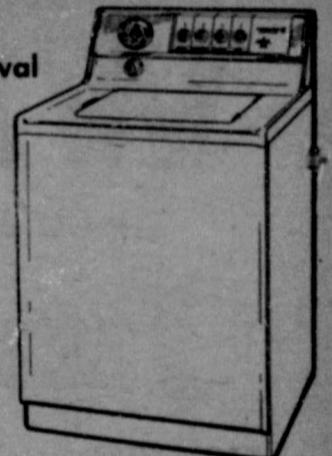
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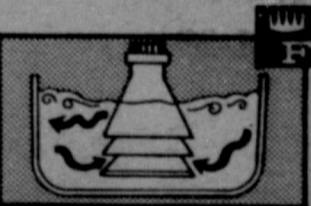
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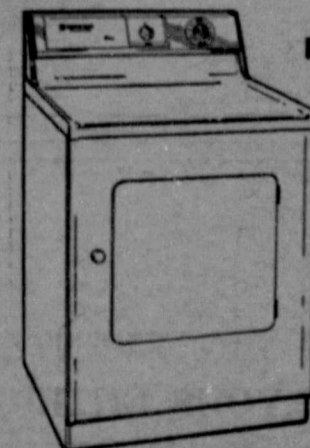

New Game Birds Released South Of Santa Anna

Increasing evidence that the gray francolin experiment may succeed is heartening restoration technicians in the Parks and Wildlife Department, said E. A. Walker, assistant director for wildlife.

"We are getting some reports indicating that this latest effort to supplement our upland game bird resources has a pretty good start," said Walker.

The first consignment of 300 francolins, wild-trapped in India, were released between Santa Anna and Brady in McCulloch County.

Walker said some young birds have been seen in the original stocking area and that there have been other indications of progress.

The assistant director added that the most impressive report came from Joe B. Davidson, department biologist. Davidson described how from a location at the small community of Lohn in McCulloch County, he could hear the gray francolins calling in nearly every direction.

Walker said the current dry weather doubtless has had a retarding influence on the new game birds, although they ordinarily prefer a dry, warm open scrub or weed desert. The range of tolerable temperature ranges from 20 degrees to 120 degrees.

The assistant director pointed out that a major factor favoring francolin as a new Texas game bird is their reproduction capability with two and sometimes three broods being raised each year. They nest right on up until winter with the average clutch of eggs numbering from seven to ten eggs.

Francolins resemble bobwhites when they flush but, like scaled or blue quail, run for long distances on the ground before flying. It is dusty tan or beige in color and about twice the size of bobwhites. It roosts in low trees and shrubs and thus is safer from predators than ground nesting birds.

John Wood, District Conservation Chief at Brownwood, reports successful surgery to save a deer fawn injured by a grain harvesting combine near San Saba.

Rancher Worth Parker was harvesting small grain near San Saba and accidentally ran over a young fawn. An eight inch gash in the young deer's abdomen resulted.

Parker contacted Game Warden Norman Henk and the victim was taken to the San Saba Hospital.

Dr. R. C. Felts and Dr. Bob Trotter quickly repaired the injury and the male fawn was returned to the accident area where it was reclaimed by the mother. Later observations indicated the fawn was recovering.

Football Team Has First Practice Drill

"These boys really want to play football, and with a team like that, anything can happen." This is Coach James R. Cobern's analysis of the Mountaineers football prospects after three practice sessions.

With only 26 boys out for the first drills, a coaching staff that is two-thirds new to Santa Anna, and a team that is somewhat light in weight and in experience, the matter of desire will be an important factor.

"These boys hit hard and then they come back for more," said Cobern, "they certainly lack nothing in enthusiasm."

Drills will continue, with the first game of the season, with Baird, scheduled for Mountaineer Stadium, Friday, September 4.

Hunting And Fishing Licenses Due Soon

The new hunting and fishing licenses required for the state fiscal year beginning September 1 should be in the hands of dealers by August 14, it was announced by J. Weldon Watson, executive director for the Parks and Wildlife Department.

He said they will be ready in ample time — 2,350,000 licenses for hunting and fishing and for assorted commercial fishing uses. Approximately 2,800 official deputies handle the licenses which are available generally where sporting goods are available and at Departmental offices.

All persons 17 years and under and 65 and over are exempt from the regular hunting and fishing licenses but they need to get a regular exempt license if they hunt deer or turkey. Hunting licenses cost \$3.15 and fishing licenses cost \$2.15.

The only new provision in the licenses is that persons obtaining exempt licenses for hunting deer or turkey on their own land where they actually reside must present an affidavit along with their application. "In other words," said Watson, "just the mere verbal statement that they will hunt on their own land of residence is no longer adequate."

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

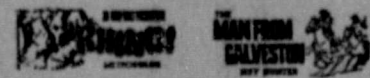

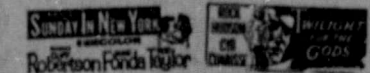
