> There is no vaccine or immunization known for the disease. and Dr. Murrell pointed out that the best preventive is to eliminate mosquito breeding areas, and to take other steps to avoid contact with mosquitos, such as spraying the house with insecticide, and sleeping under mosquito netting.

> And the next time you see a bat flying out of one of the buildings in Santa Anna, be grateful for all the mosquitos he has eaten.

# **1964 Enrollment Below Expected Figure Says Perry**

An enrollment 23 less than the number of students enrolled by October 11 last year, and 48 less than the estimated total for this year, was marked up Monday by the Santa Anna Independent School District.

After the first day of classes, Monday, August 31, there was a total of 383 students enrolled. Of this total, 129 enrolled in the four top grades, with 254 in the elementary grades.

Breakdown by grades: Forty enrolled in first grade, 26 in second, 26 in third, 39 in fourth, 33 in fifth, 29 in sixth, 32 in seventh, 29 in eighth, 37 in ninth, 35 in tenth, 36 in eleventh, and 21 in twelfth grade.

According to Superintendent Cullen Perry, additional registrations may be forthcoming, but probably not enough to make up the deficit. Perry noted that attendance at the present enrollment level will result in Santa Anna losing two teachers next year under the ratio established by the state.

# Let's Have A Safe Labor Day

Labor Day is a youthful institution, as national holidays go. But its place in the national life is secure and honored. It provides a formal and well-earned salute to all working people, within and without the unions. And this is a tribute that goes beyond the changing problems and controveries that have to do with labor legislation and labor's rights and privileges.

Too, Labor Day has another special characteristic. It gives most of us a three-day holiday in this age of the five-day work week. And millions of people take advantage of it to journey in search of new sights and scenes, or to go again to favored vacation spots. Labor Day has become a day of fun, relaxation and sports.

Unhappily, however, that bright prospect is often not realized for an appallingly large number of us. They are the victims of Labor Day's toll of deaths and injuries. The mishandled automobile becomes a killer of almost warlike dimension. The toll of drownings steadily mounts and ignorance or disregard of the rules and precautions that are essential to safe boating are big factors in this.

The tragic part of it all is that the vast majority of these and other accidents are totally unnecessary. They don't just happen - careless, thoughtless and uninformed human beings make them happen. If all of us this coming Labor Day period would use just rudimentary caution wherever we go and whatever we do, the expected accident toll would be reduced spectacularly, How about it?

**Pocket Boroughs In The United States?** 

The English have a system for electing party hacks to the House of Commons. Each party has certain boroughs, or voting subdivisions, that are sure things due to strong local political bosses. These "pocket boroughs" as they are called are used to electing anyone to Commons that the party wishes elected, since there is no requirement that a borough's representative must reside in that borough. Often, the members of Commons representing such a borough has never seen the place or people he represents, knows little or nothing of their local problems and needs. This has long been considered a weak point in the English system of representative government.



But the move by Bobby Kennedy is purely a political power play.

One of the basic strengths of our system has been the fact that the legislator is a member of the community he represents, familiar with its people and problems.

Bobby Kennedy may or may not have the qualities of a good Senator, that is beside the point here. The precendent he is trying to establish could cause serious damage to the structure of our form of government if the voters allow it to take place.






