# Employment

Employment in Eastland County, Rose 4 percent be-tween March, 1934, and March, 1965, according to one of the nation's economic indicators, "County Business ed recently by the U. S. De-partment of Commerce's Bureau of The Census.

County Business Patterns, now published annually, uses payroll information gathered for the first quarter of each calendar year by the Social Administration co ering employment in most kinds of business and industry but excluding notably agricultural and government workers and the self-employ-

Number of employees in the county, in businesses covered by the report, for March 1965 totaled 3,004 as against 2,894 for the same month a year earlier. First quarter payrolls for the two years were 2.4 million and 2.4 million respectively.

Retail trade, the large s t group of employers in the County, reported a March, 1965 total of 751 employees and 3-month payrolls of 478,

000, service firms. The County's second largest group of employers, had a total of 549 employees and 271,000 in quarterly payrolls.

The County ranked 78 th among the 254 Counties in the state in March, 1965 in number of employees in businesses covered in the report.

Comparable figures for State's employment rose some 5 percent from 2,197,331 to 2,313,891 between March, 1964 and March, 1965. Total January-through-March, 1965 payrolls amounted to 2,607.2 million as against 2,461. 2 million for the previous year's first quarter. For the state, manufacturing led with 5,654,36 employees and a quarterly payroll of 795.6

#### HOMEMAKERS HINTS

Eastland Conty Home Demonstration Agent By JANET MEYERS

The annual Home Demonstration Club Christmas dinner and party was held at Fellowship Hall here in Eastland. Some for ty women were present for the day's activities.

The Home Demonstration

Council met that morning with Mrs. L. B. Mayhew, chairman, presiding. Highlight of Council was Mrs. Lon Horn modeling her garment that won first place in the "Make It With Wool" contest. Mrs. W. V. Fenter,

T.H.D.A. chairman, reported to the group that the annual training and planning meeting for council and T.H.D.A. Chairmen in District 8 would be held in Gatesville on January 16.

You maybe interested to know that many flowering bulbs can be forced to produce flowers ahead of schedule. To do this use only the best bulbs available for indoor forcing. Avoid the temptation to purchase bulbs at the bargain table for this purpose. Bulbs that are good for indoor forcing include crocus, grape hyacinths, daffodils, tulips, and hyacinths. Make your purchases of those bulbs as early as possible so that you can be sure of obtaining good strong bulbs.

Pot the bulbs as soon as they are available. Any good putting soil mixture will do providing it contains sufficient peat moss for good drainage. Place a one inch layer of gravel in the bottom of the pot, firm the soil around the bulbs leaving the tips of the larger bulbs showing just above the soil surface.

Move the potted bulbs to a cold storage temperature of 40 to 50 degrees. An old refrigerator works fine for this purpose. Success with forcing bulbs depends upon good root development during the cold storage period. Keep the soil moist, but not wet. Leave the bulbs in cold stoarge for a period of six to ten weeks or until they have made good root growth.
