





EDITORIAL

A Tale Of Two Cities

This is the story of two cities. It is a story that holds a moral for all small cities, and for the people who live and work in these

In the 1930 census, two cities in Williamson County, in central Texas north of Austin, seemed to have the natural and manmade attributes for growth. Georgetown, the county seat, and Granger. Both were on major highways, both were served by the main line of a leading railroad.

But there was one difference. The people in one of these cities were willing to meet the future halfway, were willing to accept the changes that would come, and were willing to work to make their city grow.

Among other things, they organized an industrial foundation, an organization of local businessmen and citizens dedicated to obtaining new industry for their city.

Today, that city's population has increased by 66 percent over the 1930 total. It is a bustling, growing city, offering its citizens the prospects of good living in the small city environment. The other city has decreased by 20 percent, it has lost many of its businesses, and it is on the decline. And this happened mainly because its people were satisfied to stand still. Now the young people, finding no opportunity, are leaving - the city is doomed unless drastic steps are taken soon.

In 1930, the population of Santa Anna was 1,883. In the 1960 census it was 1,316. It will continue to drop unless the citizens of the city are willing to make an effort to make our city go and

An industrial foundation is not only needed, it is essential. There is no good reason why Santa Anna should not have an industrial foundation.

The people have shown, in the recent city election, that they want progress and a better city. Let's get an industrial foundation organized.



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

a two point safety for Rising Star, A pass to Dalton Hughes was good for another TD.




