The Santa Anna City Council voted in its last session to raise the basic water rate to Santa Anna users by 50 cents.

Purpose of the increase in water rates is to raise funds for the cleaning of the water mains

in the City, now in progress. The cleaning operation will cost the city \$10,000 to \$12,500 when completed. This is the first complete cleaning of the entire local water distribution system since its installation. Without the water rate increase, the City would have to issue bonds to pay for the cleaning operations, which would be much more costly to the City and to individual taxpayers.

Cost of the cleaning operation is based on a rate of 221/2 cents per foot of pipe cleaned. The City has 40,000 to 50,000 linear feet of water mains.

Even with the increase, the local water rate will be considerably lower than that in sur-

rounding communities. The cleaning was necessitated by a condition that develops in pipes of the type used in the City system. Known as a tuberculous condition, it causes the gradual closing of the pipe through the growth of deposits of rust and minerals from the water. Some of the six inch diameter pipe in the local system has been reduced to less than three inches by these deposits, and four inch pipe has an inside diameter of less than two inches.

To clean these pipes, a trench is dug over the main, and a section of the pipe is removed. A small tractorlike vehicle is placed near the trench, and a long, flexible rod is inserted in the pipe, connected to a rotary power takeof on the tractor. The rod rotates at high speed, causing the cutting head on the rod to remove the deposits in the pipe. > The work is being done by Industrial Pipe Cleaning Company, of Dallas. Due to the nature of the operation, it is necessary for the water to be shut off through the main while work is in progress on that section. Residents of the areas affected are notified prior to the turning off of the water. Several hours are required for completing each section.

> Mayor Ford Barnes noted that the City Secretary has received several complaints about the rusty color of the water after service is restored. This is a natural reaction to the cleaning, the Mayor said, and in no way effects the quality of the water. It is a temporary condition, he noted, and it not something the City Secretary can remedy.
