The sports pages carried the news last week that Fred Hutchinson, manager of the Cincinnati Reds in the National League, had died of cancer. Hutchinson had known for some time that he was suffering from cancer of the chest, had undergone treatment in the Seattle hospital where his brother was a doctor. Although he knew that the chances were not good, he never gave up, never asked for sympathy, but rather asked only the opportunity to continue doing his job as long as possible. When the cancer was discovered and treatment was begun last winter, Hutchinson said that he would be back with his team for spring training, and he was. He stayed with the team until late in the season, when his illness became too severe to allow him to continue.

Hutchinson was known as a man with a heart of gold who tried to hide it behind a gruff exterior. 

EDITORIAL

Of Sand, Cities, And Boll Weevils

News that the Santa Anna Silica Sand Company, an important part of the local economy for the past 20 years, has been sold to sand mining interests in Arkansas came as a shock to the city this week.

According to officials of the Santa Anna firm, their competitive position become impossible with the discovery and development of silica sand deposits much nearer Waco, location of the local company's principle customers. The Santa Fe Railroad worked closely with the Santa Anna Silica Sand Company in an attempt to get freight rates lowered for the local firm, so that they could sell their product competitively (prices of local sand FOB the point of origin were lower than those of competing firms), but some of the other railroads, all of which must okay the rate change, refused to agree.

The News would like to make three observations about this situation:

In the first place, we would like to commend Bob Markland, who has put out great efforts during the past two years to keep the local firm afloat. Naturally, he was motivated by a desire to keep his company going, but even more he was motivated by a desire to keep the sand company in operation in Santa Anna, for the benefit of the people here, even if he were no longer connected with it. He should receive great credit for his efforts on behalf of our City.

Secondly, we would like to remind Santa Annans that even though it may not be actively exploited at the present time, we still have a great potential asset in the deposits of high grade silica sand in the Mountain, and that it is very possible that future developments may again put the Santa Anna sand in a competitive position.

And thirdly, we would point out that even though Santa Anna may have temporarily lost this round in the progress of the City, one battle never made a war, unless the soldiers on one side gave up. The possible loss of the sand operation should spur us all on to greater efforts to obtain additional, and more diversified, industry for Santa Anna.


