

# Is Christmas Too Religious?

Some characters have come up with one of the champion idiocies of all time recently. They are conducting a publicity campaign to prevent schools from mentioning anything of the religious nature and background of the holiday in the Christmas

Take any position, no matter how intelligent and logical, and carry it out to its ulitmate conclusion, and it will become ridiculous. The movement to ban the religious content of Christmas is an example. Apparently working from the Supreme Court decision concerning prescribed prayer in school (which does not ban prayer, despite the widespread misunderstanding to the contrary - just prayers which are set down by the state or an agency of the state as being required), thsee people have decided that they now have license to eliminate all religious references in all aspects of our school programs.

Carry their program to its logical end, and you will ban all reference to the United States during the celebration of the Fourth of July, or of the calendar during New Year's festivities, or of the working man during Labor Day observances.

These people cannot realize, apparently, that without religious background there would be no holiday. In fact, the very word "holiday" comes from "holy day." Perhaps the advocates of antireligious thought control would ban that word from the language.

Millions of words have been written about the question of the Supreme Court decision and what it means. There is no intention of going into that here. But it would be well to remember that even for the nonbeliever, a study of the religious aspects of our society is an important part of education. Our English literature has been influenced more by the King James version of the Holy Bible than by any other factor. Our whole civilization has been molded and shaped by its underlying religious philosophy, as have all civilizations and societies been products of their religious thought. So no student can actually understand the society in which he lives unless he knows something of the religious factors that have gone into its creation.

And let us all remember even more this year the real meaning of Christmas, and see to it that our children remember it too.


Cotton Classing reached a season high at the USDA Cotton stolen from a Type "B" lot (at a Classing Office, in Abilene. Eight classers processed 24,366 samples season total to 137,654.

About 17,400 samples came from District 2 last week and grades were unchanged from the previous week. Eleven percent of the cotton was classed white, 77 percent was light spotted and 12 percent was spotted. The amount of cotton reduced in grade due to bark, grass and rough preparation was down to POLLUTION one percent of the total.

# Taxes Taught To **Local HS Students**

Santa Anna High School is among the 1,700 schools in Texas that are training students in how to prepare their income tax returns this year. Principal Roy B. Mathews says that 35 students will receive several hours income tax instruction early in February. In Texas, 235,000 students will get this training. The free material furnished by the Internal Revenue Service will be taught by teachers A. D. Pettit, Mrs. Winnie McQueen, and Virginia Sikes.

Ellis Campbell, Jr., District Director for Internal Revenue in the northern half of Texas, feels that the schools and teachers are doing an outstanding job with the simple tax course. He explained, "Taxpayers pay 97 percent of all Federal taxes through voluntary compliance. Teaching taxes teaches the student to pay all the taxes he owes. It also teaches him to keep records and take all the reductions he has coming to him. This course teaches students to pay the right amount - no more, no less. We started offering free materials to our nation's schools 12 years ago. Last year 88,000 teachers taught three and one half million students in approximately 25,000 schools throughout the nation. Students taking this course make only one fourth as many errors as their parents make on their tax returns."
