## **No Choice**

Santa Anna has no choice about constructing a new sewerage system. The present system is inadequate, unsanitary, a health and pollution hazard, and has been on the brink of being condemned by the state for a long time. The city has been putting the state health authorities off for several years, but the time is running out.

A bill introduced into the state legislature recently will outlaw the type of sewerage treatment system now used by Santa your city by this Department on Anna.

The Federal water pollution agencies have been given enforcement powers to make cities close down sewerage treatment will improve the potability of plants such as that used by Santa Anna.

A city about the same size as ours, in this part of the state, was recently given 90 days to close their old sewerage treatment system - the same kind that we have in Santa Anna now - and sewage treatment facility. construct a new one.

# THE MISSION OF YSLETA The Church that changed sides!

When the Indians revolted against Spanish rule in 1681-2 in the upper Rio Grande Valley in New Mexico, refugees sought safety at the mission at El Paso del Norte (now Juarez). One group settled on the Mexican river bank and named its community Ysleta del Sur (South). This settlement was established in 1681 and a mission was completed the following year on a small island in the Rio Grande.

The Rio Grande changed its course and the site is now in Texas. Ysleta and its mission are generally given the distinction of being the oldest permanent settlement in Texas . . . truly a church that changed sides!
