Income Tax On
Sick Pay Outlined
Some payments recerved by a
taxpayer on account of illness or personal injury are not tax
able income for Federal tax purabe income for Federal tax pur-
poses, Virgil W. Newman, Administrative officer of Internal Re
venue for the Brownwood offic venue for the Brownwood office
said today.
The law allows (subject to certain limitations) a taxpayer to exclude from income amounts
received under a wage continuareceived under a wage continua
tion plan financed by his em ployer, when he is absent from
his job due to injury or sickness In this case the taxpayer must attach a statement to his return showing computation of
the amount excluded, the dat of absence, and whether or not he was hospitalized.
Other types of payments that Other types of payments that
are not taxable are those made: 1. For damages under a suit or I settlement of a claim under Workman's Compensation Acts,
and under an accident or health and under an accident or health
insurance policy on which the taxpayer pays the premiums.
2. On account 2. On account of a taxpayer's

health plan jointly financed by him and his employer.
