

A Marine from Coleman County was killed recently while serving in Viet Nam. His parents have been quoted as saying that they felt that it was useless for him to be there, that Viet Nam is an unimportant conflict, and that their son's death had no meaning.

We would like respectfully to differ with them. Two conflicts immortalized in the first lines of the Marine Corps Hymn, "From The Halls of Montezuma, to the Shores of Tripoli," were both minor actions, parts of relatively unimportant wars, but they have gone down in history as guideposts to man's struggle for dignity and freedom. And the reason is because Marines were there to oppose injustice and tyranny. The threats to freedom are not always found in the big impressive wars. Oftentimes, the greatest dangers to liberty lie in the little, seemingly unimportant conflicts. 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

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

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

In addition to church and school construction, new commercial buildings, a \$206,000 new home program and major utility expansions, the city has a record breaking \$209,000 street paving and sewer improvement program. Stamford is one of the many towns in our service area engaged in community develop-ment programs of this type. The Stamford record is a PATTERN FOR PROGRESS showing what can be done in community development, improving the chances of continued economic growth and attraction of new industry to the town.
