

and a discussion on mohair improvement and marketing are among the highlights of the Sheep and Angora Goat Field 9:00 a.m. and end at 3:00 p.m., Day to be held April 15, at the Livestock and Forage Research Center, McGregor, Texas.

Geneticist Maurice Shelton, who is in charge of sheep and goat research at the Center, says sheep reports will concentrate on current work in a three sheep production.

The sheep intensification system involves early weaning of lambs, use of high concentrate or high grain rations, and multiple lambing, according Shelton.

The discussion on mohair marketing was scheduled at the suggestion of producers. In a planning meeting, one producer told Texas A&M University officials that mills look to other regions for quality mohair and keep their employees busy during slack seasons sorting Texas mo-




