



### Does This Make Sense?

The relatively small handful of local people who are bitterly fighting the progress of Santa Anna by fighting the bond issuence, are being more than somewhat inconsistent in their posi-

A number of these people supported a slate of candidates in had no wife and no children. the recent city elections, a slate of candidates opposed to the issuance of the needed bonds. One of the planks of this group's platform was a call for more jobs in Santa Anna, so our young people will not have to leave town to find employement.

This is a good point. But how do they put it into action? Because of the bond election contest suit, being pushed by this handful of local residents, the beginning of the new Santa Anna Medical Center has been delayed six months. It was the original plan of the Medical Center to hire 35 to 40 new employees on June 1, to begin training for jobs at the new Medical Center. These people were going to be hired here in Santa Anna, with an emphasis on recent Santa Anna High School graduates. Because of the delay caused by the election contest suit, this hiring of local employees had to be delayed until Januarry 1, 1966 at the earliest. These 35 to 40 jobs would have meant an additional monthly payroll in Santa Anna of \$8,000, or almost \$50,000 for the six months lost.




