The relatively small handful of local people who are bitterly
fighting the progress of Santa Anna by fighting the bond issuence, are being more than somewhat inconsistent in their posi-

inal plan of the Medical Center to hire 35 to 40 new employees on June 1 , to begin training for jobs at the new Medical Center.
These people were going to be hired here in Santa Anna, with an These people were going to be hired here in Santa Anna, with an
emphasis on recent Santa Anna High School graduates. Because
of the delay caused by the election contest suit, this hiring of local employees had to be delayed until Janurary 1 , 1966 at the earliest. These 35 to 40 jobs would have meant an additional
monthly payroll in Santa Anna of $\$ 8,000$, or almost $\$ 50,000$ for the six months lost.
Because of this rather foolish election suit, Santa Anna has lost employement for 35 to 40 local citizens (many of whom
won't be able to wait until the opportunity again presents itself,
and will have to go elsewhere for work, probably never moving and will have to go elsewhere for work, probably never movin
back to our community), and about $\$ 50,000$ in wages down th back to our community), and about $\$ 50,000$ in wages down the
drain. Does this sound like this minority group really has the

It is a sad situation when a small group, to satisfy their own
