





EDITORIAL

Those Radical Teachers

There has been a radical idea raised down in Austin. It is so revolutionary that it has the Governor and many of the legislators all perturbed. Those well-known agitators, the teachers, have dared to suggest that they should be paid a living wage for the job of attempting to instill intelligence and learning in the youngsters of our state.

No wonder the Governor is upset. This is almost anarchy. Of course, our teachers are now paid far below the national average, \$774 below the national average to be exact. The Governor has offered to raise the salaries of our teachers by an average of \$48 to \$126 per year, while national average teachers salaries are climbing \$254 per year. If the Governor has his way, we will not only not catch up, we will be dropping further be-
